GR120 Exhibition (Class or Demonstration)

- 1. An Exhibition may be held as a recognized but unrated class or demonstration, as required by division rules. See DR136 for rules pertaining to exhibition classes and demonstrations at Dressage Competitions. See HJ 500 for rules pertaining to exhibition classes and demonstrations at Hunter, Jumper or Hunter/Jumper licensed competitions.
- 2. Exhibition classes must be advertised in the prize list and may be judged and ranked. At any USEF licensed competition, Exhibition classes may not be restricted to Friesians.
- a. However, results may not be counted for high score awards or championships.
- b. If published, the rankings report must be clearly separated from competition results and noted as being from an exhibition.
- c. Judges for breed, hunter, jumper, or Western exhibition classes held at Licensed Competitions are not required to be licensed by USEF.
- d. Judges for Western Dressage exhibition classes must be licensed as described in WD123.1.
- e. At Federation licensed Hunter, Jumper or Hunter/Jumper competitions, only one exhibition or demonstration class may be held per licensed competition day and the results of such classes cannot be counted for Federation or Federation affiliate awards.
- 3. Exhibition demonstrations may also be held using horses individually, in groups or in entertainment acts. Such demonstrations cannot be held as a class.
- 4. Horses used in exhibitions, demonstrations, and retirement ceremonies are subject to the provisions of GR839, but are exempt from the dress and saddlery rules of the competition.

SUBCHAPTER 2-C NON-MEMBERS

GR205 Participation

A non-member, who wishes to participate as a rider, driver, handler, vaulter, longeur, owner, lessee, agent, coach or trainer at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions at the Preliminary Level or above, Dressage Competitions, Endurance Rides, Reining Advanced Level, must pay a Show Pass fee for each competition in which competing. Lessees are considered owners in connection with this membership requirement. In the Competitions, Vaulting Competitions, and Combined Driving Competitions at the event of an entry under multiple ownership, only one owner need be a Member or pay a Show Pass fee. The competition is responsible for listing either the active member or the owner that paid the Show Pass fee in the results. The competitions will be responsible for forwarding copies of all Show Pass forms completed at the competition to the Federation with the post competition report. Payment of Show Pass fees for purposes of competing does not entitle the individual to any other privileges of USEF

SUBCHAPTER 2-A MEMBERSHIPS

GR202 Membership Requirements

- 1. To be eligible to participate as a rider, driver, handler, vaulter, longeur, owner, lessee, agent, coach or trainer at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions at the Preliminary Level or above, Dressage Competitions, Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level, Endurance Rides, Reining Competitions, ParaEquestrian Competitions, and Vaulting Competitions, persons must be Members of the Federation as provided in Bylaw 201. No organization, other than the USEF and its Recognized Breed and Discipline Affiliates, may require mandatory membership or a non-member fee as a condition of participation in a USEF Licensed Competition. (See GR1210.13 for further information regarding the collection of mandatory participation fees at USEF licensed competitions).
- 2. All Life, Senior Active and Junior Active Members of the Federation must designate a primary breed/discipline affiliation upon joining or must do so annually upon renewing. A member will be deemed to continue his or her primary designation unless prior to the record date (November 30 of each year) such Life Member notifies the Federation in writing of change. This shall be considered the member's affiliation for the purpose of allocating Voting Director seats as provided in Bylaw 211.
- 3. Lessees are considered owners in connection with this membership requirement. If a horse(s) is owned by multiple individuals, only one owner need be a Member or pay a Show Pass fee.
- 4. If a horse(s) is owned by a farm or any other entity, only one principal owner of the farm or entity needs to be a member or pay a Show Pass fee. (To be eligible for Horse of the Year Awards, a farm or any other entity that owns a horse(s) must also obtain an exhibitor registration pursuant to GR1106.)
- 5. Non-members must pay a Show Pass fee of \$30.
- 6. The competitions will be responsible for forwarding Show Pass forms with the names of individuals who pay Show Pass fees at the competition to the Federation with the post competition report. Payment of Show Pass fees for purposes of competing does not entitle the individual to any other privileges of USEF membership.

SUBCHAPTER 2-D FEDERATION FEES AND DUES

GR206 Show Pass Fee

1. Federation Show Pass fee. The amount of the Show Pass fee will be established annually by the Federation. Unless otherwise established, the fee will be \$30 and must be collected by all appropriate competitions and remitted to the Federation (for exceptions see GR901.9). Non-US citizens who are members in good standing of their National

Federations are exempt from payment of the Federation Show Pass fee.

1. 2. Recognized Affiliate Association non-member fee. A Federation Recognized Affiliate Association as defined under Bylaw 222, Section 1 (1) and 1 (2) may establish a non-member fee for their respective breed or discipline. If established, the amount of the non-member fee will be determined annually by the applicable Recognized Affiliate Association. This fee must be collected by all appropriate licensed competitions and remitted to the Recognized Affiliate Association (for exceptions see GR901.9).

SUBCHAPTER 3-C LICENSED COMPETITION STANDARDS

GR311 Restrictions on Local Competitions

- 1. The total cash prizes shall not exceed \$500. Except Open Western Division(see ratings chart GR313), 100% sweepstakes and Reining Competitions; not including value of trophies offered.
- 2. The designation Local Competition must be stated on the cover of the prize list.
- 3. The Federation and applicable Federation Recognized Affiliate Association non-member/Show Pass fee will not apply.
- 4. Local Competitions benefit from all the general rules of the Federation and must abide by applicable division rules unless class specifications are printed otherwise in the prize list.

SUBCHAPTER 5-A CONDITIONS

GR503 Required Measurements and Re-measurements

2. All animals that have been assigned a card prior to March 1, 1982 must be re-measured. If the owner, either member or non-member, is in possession of a measurement card issued prior to the aforementioned date, there will be no fee for re-measurement.

SUBCHAPTER 6-A FILING AND CONTENTS OF PROTESTS, CHARGES AND ATHLETE GRIEVANCES

GR603 Protests

- 1. Any rider, driver, handler, vaulter, longeur, exhibitor, owner, agent, trainer or the parent of a junior exhibitor, or any Life, Senior, or Junior member present at the competition may file a protest with the Show Committee of a Licensed Competition or The Federation Hearing Committee alleging violation of any Federation rule(s). The protest must contain all information as specified in GR602.1 and must be:
- a. in writing,
- b. signed by the protester,
- c. addressed to the Show Committee of the competition at which the alleged violation occurred, or to the Hearing Committee,
- d. accompanied by a deposit of \$200 if made by a Federation member or the parent of a junior exhibitor member or \$300 if made by a non-member (if check, payable to the competition or to the Federation); said deposit will be refunded in the event the protest is upheld

SUBCHAPTER 8-C COMPETITION AND CLASS CONDITIONS AND ELIGIBILITY

GR821 Opportunity Classes

- 2. Opportunity Classes:
- a. do not count towards Horse of the Year Awards and the results from Opportunity Classes may not be used by any entity for a national awards program. Only with permission of the respective recognized affiliate organization may results from Opportunity Classes be used for regional awards.
- b. cannot be used as a qualifying class for any championship class held at the competition except an Opportunity Class championship at the competition.
- c. cannot be considered in reckoning Competition Championships awarded on points except an Opportunity Class championship at the competition.
- d. do not count towards the minimum number of classes nor amount of prize money offered when determining the rating of the competition.
- e. Dressage classes can be offered as Opportunity classes at Dressage Competitions or Regular/Local Competitions with "Open" Dressage classes as described below:
- 1. Classes are limited to the following competition levels and dressage tests:
- a. Level 1 competitions may offer two tests and only two classes per level per day at Introductory Second Level one of which can be the Riders Test at

Training - Second levels.

- b. Level 2 competitions may offer two tests and only two classes per level per day at Introductory First Level one of which can be the Riders Test at Training and First levels.
- c. Level 3 competitions may offer two tests and only two classes per day at Introductory Training Level one of which can be the Training Level Riders Test. BOD 1/17/15 Effective Immediately.
- d. Level 4 and Level 5 competitions may not offer Opportunity classes.
- 2. Opportunity Classes are for entry level riders.

- 3. Freestyles may not be offered as Opportunity classes. Opportunity classes cannot be offered as "Test of Choice" classes.
- 4. If opportunity classes at Dressage Competitions or Regular/Local Competitions with "Open" Dressage classes are restricted to amateurs, riders are required to have an amateur status with USEF.
- 5. All rules and regulations in GR821 must be followed, except for GR821.6.
- 6. Horses, riders, owners, trainers, and coaches participating only in Opportunity classes are exempt from Federation and affiliate organization membership and Horse Identification (HID) requirements and non-member/Show Pass fees, but are required to list the Federation membership number if the participant is a

SUBCHAPTER 8-C COMPETITION AND CLASS CONDITIONS AND ELIGIBILITY

GR821 Opportunity Classes

5.Riders/drivers/handlers entered only in these classes are exempt from the Federation membership requirements and are not required to pay a Show Pass fee but are required to list the Federation membership number if the participant is a member.

SUBCHAPTER 9-A PRIZE LISTS

GR901

9. The following statement must be published in BOLD TYPE for all Regular Competitions; Eventing Competitions at the Preliminary Level or above, Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level, Dressage Competitions, Endurance Rides and Vaulting Competitions:

(See GR828.4 of the Federation rules).

Life, senior active and junior active members shall be eligible to participate in all classes at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions at the Preliminary Level or above and Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level, Dressage, Reining and Vaulting Competitions and Endurance Rides. A non-member may participate as a handler, rider, driver, owner, lessee, agent, coach or trainer at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions, Dressage Competitions, Reining Competitions and Combined Driving Competitions upon payment of a \$30 Show Pass fee.

11. Statement as to entry fees, prizes offered in each class and Show Pass fees pursuant to GR206 which the Federation is assessing certain participants who are not current members of the Federation. If a licensed competition's prize list does not state whether or not the competition will refund entry fees in the event of cancellation of classes due to severe weather or other emergency, refunds of entry fees must be made upon written request by the exhibitor within 30 days of the cancellation. See GR832.

SUBCHAPTER 10-C CLASSIFICATIONS - JUDGES

GR1011

- 5. For guest judge cards to be issued in classes where the Federation does not have division rules and does not license judges, and the applicant is not a Federation member, a full membership fee is not required in such instances provided that a Show Pass fee of \$30 for each such guest judge accompanies the application in addition to the guest judge fee.
 - 5. 6- An FEI licensed judge does not need a Guest card to judge at any level at a Federation Licensed Competition in the discipline for which he/she is licensed by the FEI. However, foreign FEI 2* Dressage Judges are eligible to judge only through the Prix St. Georges level.

SUBCHAPTER 10-H REGULATIONS GOVERNING OFFICIALS

GR1034

- I. To observe and report or charge in accordance with Chapter 6:
- 1. To see that each entry blank has been signed by a trainer;
- 2. To see that every rider, driver, handler, vaulter, longeur, owner, lessee, agent and trainer participating in any Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions at the Preliminary Level or above, Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level or above, Dressage Competitions, and Vaulting Competitions is a member of the Federation as required by the provisions of Bylaw 203; BOD 1/17/15 Effective Immediately.
- 3. To see that each Federation membership number appears on the entry blank or that a Show Pass fee has been paid; and

SUBCHAPTER 12-D DUTIES CONCERNING COMPETITION RECORDS

GR1213

5. Collect and remit promptly to the Federation and its applicable Recognized Affiliate Associations as defined under Bylaw 222, Section 1 (1) and 1 (2), the

Show Pass fee, if applicable, as provided in GR205 and GR206 for each rider, driver, handler, owner, lessee, agent and trainer who is a non-member and participates in any Regular Competition, Eventing Competition at the Preliminary Level or above, Dressage Competitions, Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level or above, Endurance and Vaulting Competitions who has not produced a valid Federation membership card or copy thereof. Lessees are considered owners in connection with this membership requirement. In the event of an entry under multiple ownership, where no owner is a Member, only one owner need pay a Show Pass fee.

5. 6. When classes or divisions are recognized by The Federation under the same competition number, duplicate Federation fees (drug, Show Pass, etc.) may not be charged to exhibitors, regardless of whether different competition secretaries officiate in these classes or divisions. See GR407.

SUBCHAPTER 12-D DUTIES CONCERNING COMPETITION RECORDS

GR1214 Results

1. All competition results and other data as specified by USEF in the license agreement may be electronically transmitted to USEF within 10 days following a Licensed competition including all corrections, changes and additions to the prize list. All results must meet the criteria and format of the Federation result template as published by USEF and must be submitted as outlined in the license agreement. A fee may be assessed for any required data not received electronically. Full results are defined as the names and Federation numbers of all horses, riders and owners in all classes. In the event of an entry under multiple ownership, only one owner need be a Member of pay a Show Pass fee. The competition is responsible for listing either the active member or the person that paid the Show Pass fee in the results.

SUBCHAPTER 13-A RESPONSIBILITIES

GR1301 General

- 2. Obtain Federation membership or pay a per-competition Show Pass fee if competing at Federation member competitions. (See GR202 and GR205-GR206.)
- 4. Any member or non-member who fails to pay sums owing to the Federation or who makes payment for fees to the Federation which is not negotiable will be notified by the Federation of his or her indebtedness and warned that unless settlement is made within two weeks he or she will automatically be fined the sum of \$250 to be paid to the Federation; and further, that he or she and any horses owned by him or her and any horses and/or persons for which payment has not been made or for which the non-negotiable sums have been paid will automatically be barred from taking any part whatsoever in Licensed Competitions until payment or settlement is made of the total indebtedness to the Federation. Publication of the suspension will be published on the Federation's web site.

SUBCHAPTER 13-A RESPONSIBILITIES

GR1302

c. If an exhibitor does not submit the proper membership documentation to the competition and the competition cannot verify such information, (with the exception of Federation measurement cards) the exhibitor will be responsible to pay a \$30 Show Pass fee which is non-refundable. for a competing membership at the competition which will not be refunded should the member have already renewed but not brought the proper credentials to the competition.

SUBCHAPTER 13-C MEMBERSHIP AND DOCUMENT REQUIREMENTS

GR1308 Membership and Document Requirements

- 1. To be eligible to participate as a rider, driver, owner, handler, vaulter, longeur, lessee, agent, coach or trainer at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions at the Preliminary Level or above, Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level, Dressage, Endurance and Vaulting Competitions, persons must be Members of the Federation as provided in GR202 or if not a member, must pay a Show Pass fee as provided in GR206 (for exceptions see GR901.9). Exception: Applications for Federation Individual Membership and Horse Recordings submitted at Licensed Competitions:
- c. Lessees are considered owners in connection with this membership requirement. When an entry is under multiple ownership, only one owner need be a Member or pay a Show Pass fee. When an entry is under a minor's ownership and training, the parent who must sign will be exempt from *membership* requirement the Federation Show Pass fee. Only a parent will be exempt from the Federation membership Show Pass fee if signing as coach for his/her minor child.
- b. If an exhibitor does not submit the proper membership documentation to the competition and the competition cannot verify such information, (with the exception of Federation measurement cards) the exhibitor will be responsible to pay for a *for a competing membership at the competition which will not be refunded should the member have already renewed but not brought the proper credentials to the competition.* a \$30 Show Pass fee which is non-refundable.

SUBCHAPTER AL-2 HALTER CLASSES

AL105 Conduct and Specifications

- 1. Emphasis shall be placed on type, conformation, quality, way of going, substance and manners. Half Andalusians will be judged on conformation, quality, way of going, substance and Andalusian type, in that order. The Half-Andalusians may show characteristics of any other breed. The foregoing first three qualities shall take precedence in adjudication of in hand classes over breed type.
- 2. An Exhibitor is any person who holds, walks or trots a horse in the competition arena. No Exhibitor may hold more than one horse at a time in the arena.
- 3. Every exhibitor is required to sign an entry blank and must be a Federation member or pay a Show Pass fee.

DR202 General Regulations

8. When Dressage Sport Horse Breeding, Dressage or other classes or divisions are recognized by the Federation under the same competition number, duplicate Federation fees (drug, Show Pass, affidavit, etc.) may not be charged to exhibitors, regardless of whether different competition secretaries officiate in these classes or divisions. See GR407 and GR1213.6.

SUBCHAPTER DR-2 DRESSAGE SPORT HORSE BREEDING

DR203

15. Assistant Handler—Any person, other than the Handler, who holds or walks a horse in the competition area or ring during a class, whether or not it is being judged. An Assistant Handler is permitted only for call-backs after In-Hand or Group classes, for Championships and for handling non-competing mares or foals which accompany another entry in the competition ring. Assistant Handlers may not show a horse at the trot (except for horses not being judged but accompanying a mare or foal that is being judged), and if not Federation members, are exempted from the Federation Show Pass fee-membership, but are otherwise subject to all rules regarding Handlers.

SUBCHAPTER DR-2 DRESSAGE SPORT HORSE BREEDING

DR205 Entries

5. Any and all handlers (including Assistant Handlers) of horses in the competition ring are required to sign an entry blank (see GR908.2). Handlers must be Federation members or pay a Show Pass fee. Assistant Handlers need not be Federation members and are exempted from the Show Pass fee. Only handlers and assistant handlers may act as whip assistants in the competition ring.

SUBCHAPTER EQ-3 SADDLE SEAT EQUITATION SECTION

EQ120 Saddle Seat World Cup Competition.

1. When the United States hosts the Saddle Seat World Cup in conjunction with a Federation licensed competition or as a stand alone Federation licensed competition, USEF Membership *requirement* and Show Pass fees will not apply to owners of donated horses and to international competitors.

SUBCHAPTER SB-1 GENERAL QUALIFICATIONS

SB101 Eligibility

- 1. In order to compete, all horses must be registered with the American Saddlebred Registry or the Canadian Livestock Records Corporation. They must be entered in their full registered names with registration numbers and under the names of the owner(s) of record with the A.S.R. or the C.L.R.C.
- 2. A copy of the registration papers showing recorded ownership, or a copy of the registration papers with a Certificate of Eligibility to Show issued by the American Saddlebred Registry must be submitted with entry form at the time of making entry or presented to competition office before competition number will be released unless the competition, at their discretion, confirms registration electronically with the American Saddlebred Registry or the Canadian Livestock Records Corporation; competition management is responsible for notifying exhibitors of this requirement. See GR1308.2a(5). Exception: Horses shown in any USEF Regular Competition prior to December 31, 1979, and American Saddlebred-type ponies. The ASR will provide the Federation with a monthly report of affidavits filed in violation of this Article. A copy of the registration papers will be returned when exhibitors pick up their numbers, if requested. In the event a person files a false affidavit or an affidavit to show change of ownership or change of name without having submitted all required paperwork and fees to the American Saddlebred Registry, the Federation will levy a fine against that person in the amount of \$200. See GR1302.2a(5), GR907.4, and GR1308.2a(5). If the foregoing \$200 fine is not paid within 30 days of receipt of the Federation's notice of fine, said person and any horses owned by him/her or his/her stable will be automatically suspended until the fine is paid. If the person disputes that the fine is not properly owing, he/she can request a hearing of these issues before the Hearing Committee provided a written statement specifying the grounds for the hearing is received at the Federation's office within 30 days of receipt of the Federation's notice of fine. The request must be accompanied by a deposit of \$100 made by a Federation member or the parent of a junior exhibitor member or \$200 if made by a non-member (check payable to the Federation). Said deposit will be refunded in the event the hearing is resolved in the favor of

GR 305 AGREEMENT [CHAPTER SUBCHAPTER 3-B COMPETITION LICENSES]

GR 305

- 1. All applications for a Federation license are accepted with the explicit agreement of competition officials that all classes (rated or unrated) to be held on a Federation licensed date must be recognized by the Federation and are governed by all applicable Federation rules, and that no unrecognized classes will be held on any date for which Federation recognition is requested, except that:
- a. Horse Trials at Eventing Competitions below the Preliminary Level,
- b. Eventing Tests at all levels
- c. Combined Driving below the Advanced Level
- d. Classes at Regular or Local Competitions restricted to breeds or disciplines whose rules are not included in the USEF Rulebook
- e. Non-affiliated National Breed or discipline association classes
- f. Vaulting levels/classes below A-Team, Gold, Silver and Pas de Deux
- g. Academy classes
- h. Qualifying classes for Youth Reining classes or Reining classes at USA Reining and NRHA approved competitions.
- i. Exhibitions for which there are no breed or discipline division rules
- j. Hunter/Jumper competitions designated "Outreach" competitions by USHJA and limited to either one competition day or one competition rings (one hunter ring and one jumper ring) per day.
- k. These above named classes/levels can be held as unrecognized only provided a separate entry blank is used and the prize list and/or Omnibus clearly states that the classes are not recognized by the Federation.
- I. Exception: FEI rules take precedence as to international classes and events over Federation rules at all FEI Sanctioned Competitions. Federation rules take precedence as to national classes and events which are not FEI Sanctioned at FEI Sanctioned Competitions. GR845 Equine Vaccination Rule [CHAPTER 8-F Welfare of the Horse]

- 1. At Federation licensed competitions, horses *more than 7 months of age*, entering the grounds must be accompanied by documentation of Equine Influenza Virus and Equine Herpes Virus (Rhinopneumonitis) vaccinations within six months prior to entering the stables. Horses not in compliance with this rule may be required to leave the competition grounds upon request by Competition Management. Documentation should consist of one of the following methods mentioned below. The frequency of vaccine administration should be per the vaccine manufacturers' or veterinarian's recommendations. It is recommended that vaccines are administered by or under the direction of a veterinarian.
- 2. In the case of vaccines administered by a veterinarian, the exhibitor, upon request by Competition Management, must provide documentation from the veterinarian on documenting that the horse in question received the vaccinations; name of the vaccines and date of vaccine administration.
- 3. In the case of vaccines administered by a person other than a veterinarian, the exhibitor, upon request by Competition Management, must provide a receipt of the vaccine purchase which is signed by the owner, or agent with care, custody, and control of the horse; name, serial number and expiration date of the vaccine; and date of vaccine administration.
- 4. In the case of a horse that is unable to receive either of the vaccinations due to a history of adverse reactions, the exhibitor, upon request by Competition Management, must provide a letter from the veterinarian on official letterhead stating that the horse in question cannot be vaccinated due to medical concerns and a log of temperatures taken twice daily for the seven days prior to entering the competition grounds. These horses must also have their temperature taken and logged twice daily while on the competition grounds. The log of temperatures should be provided to the Competition Management, steward, or technical delegate when requested.
- 5. Competition Management may not amend or enhance vaccination requirements without prior approval of the Veterinary Committee

- 2. A Licensed Competition is not limited to classes listed in the Rule Book. If a special class is offered which is not included in the Rule Book, the prize list or competition web site must furnish detailed specifications.
- 3. All classes (rated or unrated) to be held on a Federation licensed date are governed by all applicable Federation rules. No unrecognized classes can be held on any Federation licensed date, except
- a. Horse Trials at Eventing Competitions below the Preliminary Level,
- b. Eventing Tests at all levels
- c. Combined Driving below the Advanced Level
- d. Classes at Regular or Local Competitions restricted to breeds or disciplines whose rules are not included in the USEF rulebook
- e. Non-affiliated National Breed or discipline association classes
- f. Vaulting levels/classes below A-Team, Gold, Silver and Pas de Deux
- g. Academy classes
- h. Qualifying classes for Youth Reining classes or Reining classes at USA Reining and NRHA approved competitions.
- i. Exhibitions for which there are no breed or division rules
- j. Hunter/Jumper competitions designated "Outreach" competitions by USHJA are limited to either one competition day or multiple competition days with a maximum of two competition rings (one hunter ring and one jumper ring) per day.
- j k. These above named classes/levels can be held as unrecognized only provided a separate entry blank is used and the prize list and/or Omnibus clearly states that the classes are not recognized by the Federation. See GR305.
- ₭ *I*. Exception: FEI rules take precedence as to international classes and events over Federation rules at all FEI Sanctioned Competitions. Federation rules take precedence as to national classes and events which are not FEI Sanctioned at FEI Sanctioned Competitions. In connection with Endurance Riding Events, the Federation shall nationally enforce the prohibition of the gastric ulcer medications ranitidine and meprazole, in accordance with GR410. See GR305.

All such submissions shall-be strictly not be confidential, and shall be not be subject to examination by the applicant, and shall be made available only to Committee members and staff. All applicants specifically waive their rights to examine submissions.
- 4. All applications whether for intial enrollment, renewal, promotion or for change of status or recommendation to the FEI shall contain a statement to be signed by the applicant, indicating that the applicant **does not** waives his/her right to review confidential submissions. and the file, and has read and understands the rules governing the application process, and agrees to be bound thereby.

GR1004.1 Only licensed officials in good standing may officiate at Licensed Competitions in those divisions covered by the rules and specifications of the current Rule Book. With the exception of those who have been issued Guest and/or Special Cards (see GR1010, GR1011, and GR1016), only licensed officials in good standing may officiate at Licensed Competitions in those divisions covered by the rules and specifications of the current Rule Book.

- a. Unless stated otherwise, judges in the following classes are not required to be licensed by USEF nor is the competition required to obtain a guest card for the judge:
- 1. Exhibition classes for Breed, hunter, jumper or Western.
- 2. Opportunity Classes, with the exception of Dressage which must be judged by licensed Dressage judges.
- 3. Opportunity classes in the Western Dressage Divison which must be judged by either licensed Dressage judges with the exception of Western Dressage Suitability, Western Dressage Hack and Western Dressage Seat Equitation or licensed Western Dressage judges including Western Dressage Suitability, Western Dressage Hack, and Western Dressage Seat Equitation. Breed licensed judges are also eligible to officiate Western Dressage Suitability, Western Dressage Hack and Western Dressage Seat Equitation classes.
- 4. Academy Classes, with the exception of Dressage which must be judged by licensed Dressage judges.

- 2. A Recorded Dressage judge may officiate at Second Level and below and may not officiate at the Third Level and above. Recorded Dressage judges may not officiate in FEI or USEF Dressage Tests for 4 and 5 year-old horses or in FEI Pony Tests. Recorded Dressage judges may officiate in Eventing or FEI Para-Equestrian Dressage Tests equivalent to Second Level or below (Exception: Eventing Competitions).
- 3. A Recorded Eventing judge may officiate at the Preliminary level and below (see also EV171.1d). BOD 1/12/14 Effective 12/1/14.
- 4. Recorded hunter judges with Special judges' cards may not officiate alone at an "A" rated hunter section.
- 5. A Recorded judge may, however, officiate alone under the following circumstances:
- a. at a competition which is Local except in the Saddle Seat Medal Championship/ Finals;
- b. in any "C" division or section or "B" rated Hunter section in which he/she is a Recorded judge;
- c. in any American Saddlebred Division;
- d. in any Arabian Division,
- e. in any Friesian Division;
- f. in any Morgan Division;
- g. in any division (except Dressage and Eventing) for which a competition has requested in writing that the Federation grant a Special judge's card to a Recorded judge for that particular competition and provided the Federation approves the issuance of such card;
- h. Recorded Hunter judges can officiate alone in "B" and "C" rated Welsh Pony Hunter classes;
- i. A recorded (r) Andalusian/Lusitano judge may officiate alone in any Andalusian/Lusitano class except for Regional or National Championship competitions.
- j. A Recorded (r) Carriage Pleasure Driving Judge may officiate alone in any Carriage Pleasure Driving competition that does not exceed one day or an aggregate of eight (8) hours judging time.
- k. A Recorded (r) Vaulting judge may officiate alone or be President of the Jury at any Federation licensed vaulting competition.
- I. A Recorded (r) Shetland judge may officiate alone at any Federation licensed Shetland competition.
- m. in any National Show Horse Division.

- o. In the open Saddle Seat Equitation Division
- 6. A Recorded Dressage Judge may officiate at any level of Western Dressage with the exception of Western Dressage Suitability, Western Dressage Hack and Western Dressage Seat Equitation classes.
- 7. A Recorded Western Dressage judge may officiate Introductory and Basic Levels only and also Western Dressage Suitability, Western Dressage Hack and Western Dressage Seat Equitation classes.

Recorded Dressage judges may officiate in Eventing *Competitions at the Intermediate Level or below* or FEI Para-Equestrian Dressage Tests equivalent to Second Level or below (Exception: Eventing Competitions).
 - Eventing- A Recorded Eventing judge may officiate at the Preliminary level and below (see also EV171.1d). BOD 1/12/14 Effective 12/1/14.
 - 4. Hunter- A 'r' recorded judge may not officiate alone or independently in a 'AA' or 'A' division or section.
 - 5. Hunter Seat Equitation- A 'r' recorded judge may not officiate alone or independently in a Federation Hunter/Jumping Seat Medal Class at a National or Premier Rated Hunter competition
 - 6. Jumper- A 'r' recorded judge may not officiate alone or independently in a Jumper class offering more than \$2,500
 - 7. Paso Fino- A 'r' recorded judge may not officiate alone or independently in an 'A' or division or section

- 8. Welsh- A 'r' recorded judge may not officiate alone or independently in a 'AA', 'A' or 'B' division or section, however a licensed Hunter judge may officiate alone in 'B' and 'C' rated Welsh Pony Hunter classes

GR1034 Stewards and Technical Delegates [CHAPTER Subchapter 10H REGULATIONS GOVERNING OFFICIALS]

EXISTING GR1034 Stewards and Technical Delegates WILL BE DELETED and REPLACED WITH THIS LANGUAGE.

GR1034 Stewards and Technical Delegates

- 1. The following are required responsibilities and duties of Stewards and Technical Delegates:
 - a. Safeguard the welfare of the horse;
 - b. Protect the interests of competitors, judges and Competition Management;
- c. Notify the appropriate individual or official if they become aware of a potential violation of USEF Rules, and, if not rectified, report the alleged rule violation;
 - d. Assist Competition Management to insure that every effort is made to provide for a safe competition;
- e. Confirm that all judges are either licensed in the divisions to which they have been assigned or the competition has a Guest or Special card for the judge for the divisions not covered by his license, and if not, report the alleged rule violation.
- 2. Measurement: Measuring all animals required to be measured as provided for in Chapter 5 of the General Rules, Measurement of Entries, Chapter DR (DR135 Pony Measurement), Chapter DC (DC930 Height) and Subchapter HU-10 Measurement (HU170-HU181), and if necessary return Measurement cards to the Federation.
- a. Stewards and Technical Delegates are responsible for ensuring that measurements are conducted in accordance with the rules and that all required paperwork is completed in a legible manner.
 - b. Offenders could be subject to a fine or administrative penalty at the discretion of the CEO or his designee.
- 3. Forms The following forms must be submitted in a timely manner to:
- a. USEF (within 14 days after the last licensed day of the competition)
 - 1. Steward or Technical Delegate Report on the form furnished by the Federation
 - a. The Report must include any offenses or violations of the rules by the competition or any exhibitors.
- b. If the Federation does not receive the completed report and/or attachments postmarked and/or electronically submitted within fourteen (14) days of the closing of the competition, the Steward/Technical Delegate will be fined a fee of \$100. For the second offense and any offense thereafter in the same competition year, said official will be fined \$250. A third offense and any offense thereafter will result in an automatic suspension from office as Steward or Technical Delegate for 90 days, in addition to the fines.
- c. Failure to pay any fine within 30 days will result in a violation of rules and the Steward/Technical Delegate will be subject to an additional \$100 late fee.
- d. If the Steward/Technical Delegate disputes that the report was not timely filed, he/she may appeal in writing to the Federation within 30 days of receipt of the Federation's notice of the fine. The appeal must be accompanied by a check for \$50, payable to the Federation, which will be refunded if the appeal is upheld. The CEO or his designee and three members of the Licensed Officials Committee will consider the appeal and may waive a part or all of the fine upon finding of good cause of why the report was not timely filed and/or a finding that extreme hardship results from the automatic penalty. Note: only the fine may be waived. The rule violation will remain on record for the official.
- 2. Accident/Injury Report Forms on the official form provided by the Federation (details of injuries relating to both humans and equines) EXCEPTION: In the event of a fatality, the Federation or weekend on-call number must be notified as soon as possible but not later than 24 hours after the incident.
 - 3. Each competition's Accident Preparedness Plan as provided for in GR1211.5e.
 - b. USEF Office of Equine Drugs and Medications
- 1. Medication report forms, filed either with the Steward/Technical Delegate or Designated Competition Office Representative, must be sent to the USEF Office of Equine Drugs and Medications, 956 King Avenue, Columbus, OH 43212-2655,.
- 4. Except in Hawaii and Alaska, no steward may officiate for more than three consecutive years at the same competition or at more than three consecutive competitions run by the same governing body, Board of Directors or Licensee. When three or more stewards are officiating, one steward will not be subject to these restrictions and will be eligible to serve as steward for a fourth consecutive competition run by the same governing body, Board of Directors or Licensee.
- 5. Except in Hawaii, no technical delegate may officiate for more than two consecutive years at the same competition or at more than two consecutive competitions run by the same governing body, Board of Directors or Licensee. In Alaska, no dressage technical delegate may officiate more than three consecutive years at the same competition, but are not otherwise restricted from officiating at consecutive competitions run by the same governing body, Board of Directors or Licensee. For the purposes of this rule, multiple, consecutive day Dressage Competitions held within a six-day period will be counted as one competition, if they are run by the same governing body, Board of Directors or Licensee.
- 6. The Steward's and/or schooling supervisor's decision regarding schooling fences, tack and equipment in the warm-up and/or schooling areas is final (Exception for Dressage: The final authority rests with Competition Management).

- 7. No Steward or Technical Delegate may officiate at more than one competition at the same time.
- 8. Stewards and technical delegates must retain copies of steward/technical delegate report forms, and supporting documentation, for a period of three years.

INTENT

The Steward Technical Delegate Task Force feels strongly that the existing rule includes is too detailed and is proposing a re-write/re-outlining in its entirety. They cite, for example, that there should be no need to have a rule requiring that certain forms must be available.

This rule change proposal distills the responsibilities and duties of these officials to those they consider essential. They further propose that the duties currently included in GR1035 and taken out in this proposal should be moved to a check list.

Deletion of GR1034.3.a.1b

- The Task Force is in agreement with the Eventing Committee that this rule should be taken out because the FEI does not require TDs to submit reports directly to the NF and obtaining these reports from foreign TDs would be difficult.
- The same is true for USEF competitions held in Canada because Equine Canada, not USEF, stewards officiate at those competitions.

Addition of new GR1034.6 – This language has been in USEF rules since at least 2004 and was inadvertently omitted from the Rule Change Proposal. In discussion, to clarify that the Steward's and/or schooling supervisor's was only in the warm-up area and not the competition arena, the Task Force recommends adding 'schooling' to the language, i.e. "warm-up and/or schooling areas".

- 14. Renewal, Reinstatement, Re-enrollment, and Re-application of Licenses
- a. An official who is eligible to renew (up to date on clinic, exam, *quiz*, and officiating requirements) his/her license will have one full competition year after the lapse of their license(s) to renew by the standard procedure; i.e. hard copy renewal or the online renewal.
- b. Officials may be required to complete a yearly quiz for renewal. Quizzes will be offered on an as-needed basis as determined by the respective breed/discipline Committee. If a Committee determines that a quiz is not needed in a specific competition year, one will not be offered. If a Committee determines that a quiz is necessary, it will be no longer than fifteen questions and will primarily cover new rule changes.
- b.c. If two competition years have passed since an official has renewed his/her license(s), they must request a reinstatement of licensing. A request for reinstatement must be submitted to the Licensed Officials Department for presentation to the Licensed Officials Committee.
- e.d. If three but less than five competition years have lapsed since an official has renewed his/her license(s) they must then apply for re-enrollment of those licenses, following the specific requirements outlined for each license.
- d.e If five or more competition years have lapsed since an official has renewed his/her license(s) they must then re-apply for licensing, following the full license requirements specified for each license.

GR1041 Clinic and Officiating Requirements [CHAPTER 10-I License Applications, Enrollment, Promotion, and Maintenance] change to read:

- 1. Clinic and officiating requirements must be met by November 30 to be eligible to renew each license for the following competition year which begins December 1.
- 2. Any official who fails to fulfill clinic requirements or who fails to meet officiating requirements will not be eligible to have his/her license renewed and will have to apply for an extension. The Licensed Officials Committee has the option of allowing a A one-year clinic extension with officiating restrictions or a one-year officiating extension may be granted. If the Licensed Officials Committee reviews the clinic extension request, officiating restrictions may be given. All requests must be received in writing via mail, email, or fax.
- 3. In the event that an official's clinic requirement falls due in a year in which a corresponding clinic is not offered, the deadline will automatically be extended to the following year with no restriction providing all other requirements of the license are met.
- 4. Documented adjudication of FEI recognized classes at foreign FEI sanctioned competitions will count towards maintaining the same national discipline judge or course designer license, providing it occurs during the same time frame required by the national license.
- 5. Refer to the specific breed/discipline rules in Subchapter 10-I of this Chapter for specific officiating and exam requirements.
- 5.6. Verified judging of an Equine Canada competition will be considered a suitable substitute for a Federation competition for the purposes of maintaining a current license but not for enrollment or promotion learner/apprentice requirements. Written verification must be submitted to the Federation to substantiate EC officiating. Any requests for acceptance of officiating experience in countries other than Canada will be considered on an individual basis.
- 6.7. The LOC can require an official to complete additional educational experience.

This in-house processing will decrease the time lag in officials requesting extensions and allow them to get back to officiating in a timely manner. Note that certain extensions, based on the circumstances, will continue to be reviewed by the LOC. In addition, this rule change would eliminate the current maintenance exams required in the licenses listed and substitute them with as-needed annual quizzes, which would be required to renew a respective license (An annual quiz may not be necessary every year for each license if there are not enough rule changes affecting the license to warrant.). The quizzes would be short (maximum of 15 questions), and would focus on new rules coming into effect for the particular license.

The rule change would also add a quiz requirement to those licenses which currently do not have an exam maintenance requirement, i.e. Hunter, Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation, Hunter Breeding, Hunter Course Designer, Jumper Course Designer, Certified Jumping Schooling Supervisor, Reining, American Saddlebred, Saddle Seat Equitation, Vaulting, and Welsh.

- 1. Federation Page. This must be printed in its entirety and placed in a conspicuous position in the prize list of each Licensed Competition in typeface large enough to be easily legible. If a Licensed Competition prints a catalogue, the Federation page must be included and the competition is urged to instruct its announcer to invite the attention of spectators to this page at each session.
- 2. Classification of competition and level or ratings of divisions or sections on the Federation Page.
- 3. Entry blank, which must contain the rule to be signed by each exhibitor, rider, driver, handler, coach and trainer(s), or his/her agent(s). (See GR908).
- 4. Names of the officiating judges with the division(s) in which they will adjudicate and the names of the Federation stewards or technical delegates, provided they have accepted to serve. (See GR706.1j) Both division and sections to be adjudicated must be listed for breed division judges, provided they have accepted to serve. (See GR 706.1j)
- 5. List of competition officials. (See GR113).
- 6. The name of the Licensee (see GR132 and GR304.2) and the name of the Chief Executive Officer or the person with the largest ownership interest.
- 7. The name of the Hunter and Jumper and/or Trail course designer or responsible person. Exception: Arabian, American Saddlebred, Morgan and Andalusian/Lusitano divisions.
- 8. The name of the veterinarian and, if on call, the phone number where he can be reached during the competition. If not known, the prize list must state where the information will be posted during the competition. If not included in the prize list, competition management must submit to the Federation the designated competition veterinarian's contact information no less than seven (7) days prior to the start of competition.
- 9. The following statement must be published in BOLD TYPE for all Regular Competitions; Eventing Competitions at the Preliminary Level or above, Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level, Dressage Competitions, Endurance Rides and Vaulting Competitions:

(See GR828.4 of the Federation rules).

Life, senior active and junior active members shall be eligible to participate in all classes at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions at the Preliminary Level or above and Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level, Dressage, Reining and Vaulting Competitions and Endurance Rides. A non-member may participate as a handler, rider, driver, owner, lessee, agent, coach or trainer at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions, Dressage Competitions, Reining Competitions and Combined Driving Competitions upon payment of a \$30 Show Pass fee. Participants in the following classes are exempted from the Requirements of this rule: 1) leadline; 2) exhibitions; 3) games and races; 4) classes for 4-H members; 5) walk trot and academy classes (academy classes are classes limited to horses used regularly in a lesson program); 6) USDF introductory level tests, pas de deux and quadrille classes; 7) NRHA Endorsed Reining Competitions. 8) Opportunity classes, 9) citizens of other nations who have proof, in English, of current membership in good standing of their own National Federation, 10) USEA beginner novice division; and 11) assistant handlers in Dressage Sport Horse Breeding classes.

10. Complete class description and judging specifications for all classes offered that are not included in this Rule Book must either be included in the Prize List or referred in the Prize List to a conspicuous place on the competition's web site.

The intent of this rule is to protect horses from the potential of widespread infectious disease at competition grounds. Competition management should be prepared for the potential that an infected horse enters the competition grounds. In the event that this occurs, competition management must have an isolation protocol in place to protect other horses from contracting the disease. The isolation protocol may include designated stalls on the competition grounds, or nearby. All officials and staff must be made aware of the protocol prior to the start of competition. The delay in the effective date would allow for proper education of competition managers as to what are good isolation practices and to assist competitions in developing appropriate plans.

GR 1310 Dispensations [CHAPTER GR1 Definitions and Governance]

1. Dispensation Certificate. Any individual with a diagnosed permanent physical disability wishing to compete in a Federation licensed competition with a compensatory aid and/or adaptive equipment must obtain a Dispensation Certificate from the Adaptive Sports Committee, *including those individuals with a current USEF or FEI Classification*. Upon the Committee's approval, a Dispensation Certificate will be issued by the Federation. The Dispensation Certificate will list all compensatory aids and adaptive equipment allowed the individual while competing. Other compensatory aids or special equipment not specifically listed on the Dispensation Certificate are not allowed. A copy of the Dispensation Certificate must be included with the individual's entry. The competition manager or secretary shall include a copy attached to all applicable scoring sheets for the judge's reference. For instructions on how to apply for the Dispensation Certificate, please refer to GR1312. Also see GR1315 for definitions of terms used in this section. (Exception: Dispensation certificates are not required for Breed or Multi-breed restricted or Hunter competitions or classes; Equitation Division classes, Carriage Pleasure Driving Division, or the Open Western Division). 2. In circumstances that fall outside of the dispensation program, a Presidential Modification may be considered. Please refer to GR152 and Bylaw 332.1.f.

GR1316 Accidents Involving Competitors [CHAPTER 13-E Return to Competition]

Standard

- 1. This rule pertains to accidents involving competitors at Federation Licensed or Endorsed competitions.
- 2. In the event of a fall/accident where the competitor is apparently unconscious or concussed, he/she is precluded from competing until evaluated by qualified medical personnel as defined in GR1211.5. If the competitor refuses to be evaluated, he/she is disqualified from the competition.
- 3. A time-out may be called under paragraph 2 in accordance with applicable division rules.
- 4. Unconsciousness/Concussion. If qualified medical personnel determine that a competitor has sustained unconsciousness or a concussion, he/she must be precluded from competing until cleared to compete under paragraph 6, below.
- 5. Medical Suspension. Any competitor who is determined ineligible to compete under any of the preceding paragraphs will be placed on the Federation Medical Suspension List that will be posted on the Federation's website.
- 6. Return to Competition.
- a. Seniors: In the event that a competitor is determined to be ineligible to compete under one of the preceding paragraphs, the competitor shall submit to the Federation, a signed release, which includes criteria established by the Federation from time to time, completed by a licensed physician in order to be eligible to once again compete in Federation Licensed or Endorsed Competition.
- b. Juniors: In the event a Junior competitor is determined to be ineligible to compete under one of the preceding paragraphs, the following apply:
- i. No loss of consciousness but with brief symptoms of concussion e.g. confusion, loss of memory, altered mental state (all symptoms of concussion must have resolved within 15 minutes both at rest and exercise) - minimum 7 days mandatory suspension. The day of injury counts as the first day of the suspension period.
- ii. Any loss of consciousness, however brief, or symptoms of concussion persisting after 15 minutes minimum 21 days mandatory suspension. The day of injury counts as the first day of the suspension period.
- iii. Notwithstanding the above, riders who have established a baseline neurocognitive skills level through a Federation approved testing program e.g. IMPACT test, may return to competition after 7 days upon submission to the Federation of certification that they have passed an exam establishing that they have suffered no impairment of that level. In addition, they must submit clearance as required in a above.
 - -All other riders may, at the expiration of the mandatory suspension, return to competition by complying with the requirements of a above.
- 7. For all competitors evaluated pursuant to this rule, the Steward or Technical Delegate shall submit a properly completed Accident/Injury Form, and if applicable, any corresponding signed released to the Federation Director of Competitions by 6:00 p.m. on the day following the last day of the competition.
- 8. Refusal of Entry. Competitions shall refuse entries of any competitor who is on the Federation Medical Suspension List unless he submits to the Federation a properly signed release as described in paragraph 6, above. Any competitor on the Federation Medical Suspension List is responsible for not competing in any further Federation Licensed or Endorse competition until they are removed from the medical suspension list.
- 9. Substitution. Notwithstanding any other provisions of the rules herein, if an entry is accepted prior to the time the competitor was added to the Federation Medical Suspension List, a substitute competitor may be named.
- 10. Refund. Notwithstanding any other provision of the rules herein, for any competitor who appears on the Federation Medical Suspension List, a Federation Licensed or Endorse Competition shall refund the entry fees and Jumper nominating fee, if applicable, less office fee.

- 2. USHJA Horse Registrations
- a. All horses competing in Federation *licensed and/or USHJA sanctioned* non-breed restricted licensed competitions with *H*unter, *H*unter *B*reeding, *J*umper and *H*unter/*Jumping S*eat *E*quitation classes *not restricted by breed* (except those activities enumerated in GR901.9, items 1-9) must be properly identified *in accordance with GR1101*, and must obtain a Registration Number from *also be registered with* USHJA (see *GR1101.1*). A The USEF/USHJA registration number for each horse must be entered on all entry forms for licensed competitions. Only one Registration Number will be issued per horse, and must remain with the horse throughout its career. Anyone knowingly applying for a duplicate Registration Number for an individual horse may be subject to disciplinary action. The Federation and/or USHJA as applicable must be notified of any change of ownership and/or competition name of the horse. Owners are requested to notify the Federation and/or USHJA as applicable of corrections to previously submitted information, e.g., names, addresses, breed registration, pedigree, or markings.
- b. Applications for *USHJA* Registration Numbers can be completed online at www.ushja.org or www.usef.org using the *USEF* Horse Registration application form. The Horse application—*This* form is also available from the USHJA or Federation office, or it can be as a downloaded from the USHJA or Federation website or from competition management. Competition management is responsible for notifying exhibitors of this requirement in their prize list.
- 3.1 In addition to the provisions of EQ 103.2, on or after December 1, 2017, all horses competing in classes that require USHJA horse registration must provide a microchip number that verifies their animal's identity in order to compete for points, money won or be eligible for Federation and/or USHJA programs and awards where horses are required to be recorded or registered.
- 3.2 A microchip used to verify identity must be a fifteen digit ISO compliant 11784/11785 chip and be implanted in the nuchal ligament of the animal.
- 3.3 For classes that require age verification, age can be verified only through the following identification documents:
- a. registration papers or passport issued by a world breed federation sport horse (WBFSH) recognized registry.
- b. registration papers or Certificate of Pedigree from a breed or sport horse registry.
- 3.4 This rule will have a transition period from December 1, 2017 to November 30, 2018. During this period, animals that are not in compliance with this rule will not receive points or be eligible for Federation and/or USHJA programs and awards. After this period, all horses that are competing in classes which require USHJA registration which are not microchipped will be ineligible to compete in Federation licensed competitions.

EQ110 Requirements for Specific Classes [CHAPTER SUBCHAPTER EQ-2 HUNTER/JUMPING SEAT EQUITATION SECTION]

8. ASPCA HORSEMANSHIP CLASS.

Open to Junior members of USEF or Equine Canada who have not reached their 18th birthday. Rider and trainer (or coach when applicable, see GR108) must be current members of the ASPCA/NHSAA. Fees are payable online by credit card to the National Horse Show Association of America by visiting www.nhs.org and clicking the ASPCA Maclay tab at the top of the page. All contestants are required to perform over at least eight fences at 3'6" with or without wings. The course must include at least two changes of direction, a combination including an oxer, and 1/3 of the obstacles must be oxers. The top element of all obstacles must be securely placed so that a slight rub will not cause a knockdown. If breakaway or safety cups are used the top cup must be the deepest standard cup available. A plank may not be used as the top element of a jump. A liverpool or water is prohbited in ASPCA Maclay classes including Regionals and Finals. In addition, all courses must include at least three of the following: bending line, narrow jump (5'6"-8"), rollback turn, fence at the end of the ring, long approach to a single jump. Two cumulative refusals in the ASPCA Maclay Finals will result in elimination, see EQ107.1. A minimum of twelve riders, if available, are required to show at a walk, trot and canter. To be judged on seat, hands, guidance and control of horse. The Under Saddle performance of those riders selected to show under saddle shall count 50%. Only one rider per horse. USEF Tests 1-19. To fill a class three (3) six (6) competitors must complete the course (five in Alaska and Hawaii). If 50 or more entries are received three hours prior to the class, the class must be divided by every other number and run as two separate classes. Certificate of Compliance - National medal classes must be certified by the following: A course plan showing the actual height and spread of all the fences, signed by the judge and steward which must be included in the steward's report to the Federation.

a. For the point and qualifying system, see the Federation website at www.usef.org and the National Horse Show website at www.nhs.org. Point system will be set no later than fifteen (15) days prior to the start of the qualifying period.

Once a rider has qualified for his/her Maclay regional final, he/she may continue to ride in the Maclay classes until he/she has acquired 60 points. Any rider who willfully continues to compete after they have acquired 60 points may be ineligible for the regional final. Riders may compete in a total of twelve (12) ASPCA Maclay classes in a single qualifying period. Any rider who continues to compete after they have competed in twelve (12) qualifying classes will no longer be eligible to compete in the ASPCA Maclay Regional Finals. (Exception: If a rider is not yet qualified for their ASPCA Maclay Regional Final after twelve (12) classes, that rider may continue to compete until qualified. That rider must stop competing in ASPCA Maclay Qualifying classes as soon as he or she is qualified for his or her ASPCA Maclay Regional Final or he/she will no longer be eligible to compete in the ASPCA Maclay Regional Finals.) It is the rider's responsibility to calculate and know their points as well as the number of classes they have competed in. For complete details on application to offer this class, as well as instructions on submitting results, competition management should contact the National Horse Show at 516-484-1865. Classes held after August 31 will count toward the next year's finals. Any rider who will not compete in qualifying classes after August 31. Any rider in his or her final junior year may not compete in any qualifying classes held at a competition with a start date after August 31 of that competition year.

Intent of Drafts 1-3: To create a qualifying system that stresses horse welfare by limiting the number of points a rider can earn in ASPCA Maclay classes.

Intent of Draft 4: The purpose of this rule change is to provide a compromise between fairness of play, allowing riders enough opportunities to compete, and the ability to fill qualifying classes. The new qualifying system accomplishes this by limiting the number of times a rider can compete in ASPCA Maclay qualifying classes once qualified for the Regional Finals. Additionally it allows classes with 3-5 riders to fill with half points awarded and also addresses horse welfare by not asking horses to have to compete more often to qualify their riders because they are continually showing against riders that are already qualified.

EQ111 USHJA Zone, Regional and National Championships

- 1. General.
- a. The chairman of each USHJA Zone may request permission of the USHJA and the Federation to hold a **USHJA** Zone Championship class for the riders within each Zone who have won a first or second place ribbon or have qualified for the finals in a US Hunter Seat Medal class since the last day to qualify for the **USHJA** Zone Championship the previous year.
- b. Two or more USHJA Zone Chairmen may request permission of the USHJA and the Federation to hold a **USHJA** Regional Championship Class for riders from Zones requesting to participate in the **USHJA** Regional Championship who have won a first or second place ribbon or have qualified for the finals in a US Hunter Seat Medal class since the last day to qualify for the **USHJA** Regional Championship the previous year.
- c. Application must be made to the USHJA office by the deadline published by the USHJA (see www.USHJA.org). and submitted to the Federation office at least sixty days in advance of holding the class
- 2. USHJA Zone or Regional Championship classes must be held prior to December 1.
- 6. 3. Riders who place first or second in a Zone or Regional Championship on or before October 1 shall be automatically qualified to compete at the US Hunter Seat Medal Finals in accordance with EQ110.5. Winning after October 1 does not count toward qualifying for the Finals. Placing other than first or second In a Zone or Regional Championship will have no effect on a rider's eligibility to compete in the Finals but will enable the Medal Class winners to compete against each other on a Zone or Regional basis.
- 3. 4. USHJA Zone or Regional Championships are conducted under the same regulations as the US Hunter Seat Medal Finals, except a minimum of 25% of the riders must be called back for a work-off.
- 4. 5. A minimum of five competitors are required to complete the class.
- 5. d. Judges for a USHJA Zone or Regional Championship must hold a valid USEF license and must be approved by USHJA.
- 6. Placing other than first or second in a Zone or Regional Championship will have no effect on a rider's eligibility to compete in the Finals, but will enable the Medal Class winners to compete against each other on a Zone or Regional basis. Riders who place first or second in a Zone or Regional Championship on or before October 1st, if not already qualified prior to the start of each event, shall be automatically qualified to compete at the US Hunter Seat Medal Finals in accordance with EQ11 0.5. Winning after October 1st does not count toward qualifying for the Finals.
- 7. Judges chosen for **USHJA** Regional Medal classes **Championships** are encouraged to design the course. A course designer approved by USHJA must be used to design the course in lieu of the judges. The course must be posted at least one hour prior to the class.

- 1. Number of Horse Entries Required for HJ Competition Rating. No minimum horse entry number is required to achieve the rating for jumper competitions. Prize money is the alternative criteria required for a jumper rating.
- 2. Competitions restricted to only conducting Breeding classes are exempt from the Horse Entry standard requirement.
- 3. Two day National Junior/Amateur restricted competitions will have a Horse Entry Number requirement of 65 *fifty (50)*. Competitions which utilize only one (1) competition ring or which offer only hunter and equitation classes (no jumper classes) will have a Horse Entry Number requirement as follows: Premier 400 *seventy-five (75)*, National 60 *fifty (50)*, Regional I 40 *thirty-five (35)* and Regional II 25 *twenty (20)*.
- 4. Rating and Horse Entry Numbers. (See HJ208 for additional HJS requirements) Required number of Horse Entries for Regular or Local competition Classification rated hunter or hunter/jumper are:
- a. Number of horse entries required for a Premier rated hunter or HJ competition is a minimum of two hundred (200).
- b. Number of horse entries required for a National rated hunter or HJ competition is a minimum of one hundred (100) seventy-five (75).
- c. Number of horse entries required for a Regional I rated hunter or HJ competition is a minimum of fifty (50).
- d. Number of horse entries required for a Regional II rated hunter or HJ competition is a minimum of twenty-five (25).
- e. There is no minimum number of horse entries required for a Local competition. f. For the required number of hunter classes per rating for hunter sections see GR313.6.

HJ208 HORSE ENTRY NUMBERS EXCEED FIVE HUNDRED AND/OR DURATION OF COMOPETITION OR SERIES OF COMPETITIONS EXCEEDS TWENTY-ONE DAYS WITHOUT A BREAK [CHAPTER SUBCHAPTER HJ-2 RATINGS & HORSE ENTRY NUMBER STANDARDS]

When minimum Horse Entry Numbers exceed five hundred (500) and/or licensed series of competitions are scheduled for a period of twenty-one (21) days or more without a break of at least five (5) consecutive calendar days, additional HJS must be met for exercise and lunge requirements. These HJS apply to all rated or combinations of rated competitions without regard to the fact that the rating may be different. When the number of horse entries and days of competition are as described herein, the following HJS requirements are in lieu of existing exercise and lunge requirements set forth as HJS for rating: Premier, National, Regional II.

- 1. For outdoor competitions, when the above conditions set forth in HJ208 exist, an exercise area of at least 24,000 square feet must be available for at least eight (8) contiguous hours within each calendar day between the hours of sunrise and feet must be available for at least eight (8) contiguous hours within each calendar day between the hours of sunrise and sunset. This area is required to be available on both days when competitions are scheduled and during non-competition days when there are less than five (5) consecutive calendar days of break without scheduled competitions.
- 2. For indoor competitions, when the above conditions set forth in HJ208 exist, an exercise area of at least 18,000 square feet must be available for at least two (2) periods of four (4) contiguous hours between 5:00 am and 12 midnight, and lighted as specified in HJ101.6. This exercise area period is required to be available on days when competitions are scheduled and during non-competition days at least eight (8) contiguous hours between 5:00 am and 12:00 midnight when there are less than five (5) consecutive calendar days without scheduled competitions. Exercise areas must be lighted as specified in HJ101.6.
- 3. For outdoor or indoor competitions, when the above conditions set forth in HJ208 exist, a minimum of one (1) lunge area of at least 15,000 square feet not being used at the time as competition rings, schooling areas and/or exercise areas must be available for at least eight (8) contiguous hours within each calendar day between the hours of 6:00 am and 10 pm within each calendar day and lighted as specified in HJ101.6 when there are less than five (5) consecutive calendar days without scheduled competitions.
- 4. Currently there are no Rated competitions (held only in indoor rings) consisting of at least five hundred (500) entries and being held over twenty-one (21) consecutive days. Therefore, no additional requirements have been considered for such an event.
- 1. Outdoor Competitions. When the above conditions set forth in HJ 208 exist, the following minimum requirements must be met for exercise and lunge areas on each competition day determined by the number of competition rings in use on each competition day. The minimum requirement must be met on non-competition days.

0-2	24,000 square feet	15,000 square feet

^{1.} For outdoor competitions, when the above conditions set forth in HJ208 exist, an exercise area of at least 24,000 square feet *The exercise area* must be available for at least eight (8) contiguous hours within each calendar day between the hours of sunrise and feet must be available for at least eight (8) contiguous hours within each calendar day between the hours of sunrise and sunset. This area is required to be available on both days when competitions are scheduled and during non-competition days when there are less than five (5) consecutive calendar days of break without scheduled competitions. *The lunge* area not being used at the time as competition rings, schooling areas and/or exercise areas must be available for at least eight (8) contiguous hours within each calendar day between the hours of 6:00 am and 6:00 pm within each calendar day and lighted as specified in HJ101.6. This area is required to be available on both days when competitions are scheduled and during non-competition days when there are less than five (5) consecutive calendar days without scheduled competitions.

2. Indoor Competitions. When the above conditions set forth in HJ 208 exist, the following minimum requirements must be met for exercise and lunge areas on each competition day determined by the number of competition rings in use on each competition day. The minimum requirement must be met on non-competition days.

SUBCHAPTER HJ-4 LIMITING ENTRIES

HJ 400 Limiting Entries at Hunter/Jumper Competitions

- 1. A hunter/jumper Federation member in good standing has the right to enter any Federation competition and any division, section, or class for which he and his horse meet the eligibility requirements, with exceptions as noted and expressly enumerated herein.
- 2. Management can limit the number of horses entered by an owner and the number of horses ridden by a rider.
- 3. Management can limit the number of entrants that a hunter/jumper competition will accept due to facility or stabling constraints.
- 4. If management wishes to refuse an entry that otherwise meets prize list conditions, refer to GR914.
- 5. In general, hunter/jumper competitions must accept entries based strictly on a first-come, first-served basis (See GR907.1). Under this method, the prize list must be distributed by at least one of the following delivery methods at least two weeks prior to the close of entries:
- a. By U.S. Mail or other similar hard copy distribution method to at least three times as many potential competitors as there will be entrants accepted.
- b. Posting on a publicly accessible website and readily available to all potential competitors.
- 6. Entries may be limited and other restrictive criteria may be applied to Federation National Championships, qualifying events for Federation National Championships, and other similar events with selection or other criteria that are under the direct aegis of the Federation and approved by the Federation Board of Directors.
- 7. Entries may be limited and other restrictive criteria may be applied to USHJA National or Regional Championships, qualifying events for USHJA National or Regional championships, and any other similar events with selection or other criteria that are under the direct aegis of the USHJA (As the Official Recognized Hunter/Jumper Affiliate of the Federation) and approved by the USHJA Board of Directors.
- 8. Entries may be limited and other restrictive criteria may be applied to regional or local championships, qualifying events for regional or local championships, and any other similar events with selection or other criteria that is under the direct aegis of an official affiliate group or organization of the USHJA (As the Official Recognized Hunter/Jumper Affiliate of the Federation) and approved by the USHJA Board of Directors.
- 9. Classes or events that meet the conditions of 7 or 8 above will NOT be awarded Zone or National Horse of the Year points (or money won) automatically and, should they desire such points (or money won) to be counted, must apply to the USHJA and receive specific approval.
- 10. Certified affiliate organizations of the USHJA that approve, register, or sanction competitions may not arbitrarily discriminate between competitions that wish to offer qualifying classes. If a USHJA sanctioned competition meets the requirements to hold a qualifying class and wishes to do so, it must be given the opportunity.
- 11. Federation competitions wishing to limit entries in its rated Hunter Division must also comply with the specifics of Article HU191 titled "Limiting Entries."
- 12. Other Hunter/Jumper Competitions, Events, Championships, and Finals That Restrict Entries. Any Hunter/Jumper competition or event wishing to set restrictive criteria for accepting entries other than as specified above must make written application to the USHJA with the required fee at

least 180 days prior to the event (see www.ushja.org). The USHJA will:

- a. Approve or disapprove any such applications or provide conditions of any such approval.
- b. Notify the applicant of the specifics of their decision in writing.
- c. Publish any approved criteria and conditions on a part of the USHJA website reserved for such approvals, along with the details and specifications which were approved.
- d. Such approvals are contingent upon the competition or event remitting an annual fee and will continue in effect as long as the competition or event does not alter the approved criteria.
- e. Changing the approved criteria may only be done with approval in writing from the USHJA and may require a new application at the USHJA's discretion.
- f. Until an applicant competition or event has received approval from the USHJA, it is expressly prohibited from advertising the restricted competition or event by any method or in any form whatsoever.

HJ 500 Exhibitions at Hunter, Jumper or Hunter/Jumper Competitions

- 1. For the purposes of this rule, an Exhibition is defined as a recognized, but unrated class or demonstration.
- 2. At Federation licensed Hunter, Jumper or Hunter/Jumper competitions, only one Exhibition may be held per licensed competition day.
- 3. An Exhibition must be held on a Federation licensed date, must be conducted in accordance with Division rules and is governed by all other applicable Federation rules.
- 4. Exhibitions held at competitions operating under a Mileage Exemption or with approved Special Competition status must be approved as part of the Mileage Exemption or Special Competition status request and the specifics of such exhibitions must be included in the competition license.
- 5. An Exhibition must be advertised in the prize list and may be judged and ranked. However, the following conditions apply:
- a. Results will not be counted for any Federation, Federation Alliance Member and/or USHJA high score awards or championships.
- b. If published, the Exhibition ranking report must be clearly separated from competition results and noted as being from an Exhibition.
- c. Judges for an Exhibition held at Licensed Competitions are not required to be licensed by USEF.
- 6. An Exhibition may also be held using horses individually, in groups or in entertainment acts. Such Exhibitions cannot be ranked.
- 7. Horses used in exhibitions, demonstrations, and retirement ceremonies are subject to the provisions of GR839, but are exempt from the dress and saddlery rules of the competition.

HU 101 ELIGIBLITY TO COMPETE - HORSE & PONY [CHAPTER SUBCHAPTER HU-1 DEFINITIONS AND ELIGIBLITY]

HU101 Eligibility to Compete - Horse & Pony

- 1. USHJA Horse Registrations.
- a. All horses competing in Federation *licensed and/or USHJA sanctioned* non-breed restricted licensed competitions with *H*unter, *H*unter *B*reeding, *J*umper and *H*unter/*Jumping S*eat *E*quitation classes *not restricted by breed* (except those activities enumerated in GR901.9, items 1-9) must be properly identified *in accordance with GR1101*, and must obtain a Registration Number from *also be registered with* USHJA (see *GR1101.1*). A The USEF/USHJA registration number for each horse must be entered on all entry forms for licensed competitions. Only one Registration Number will be issued per horse, and must remain with the horse throughout its career. Anyone knowingly applying for a duplicate Registration Number for an individual horse may be subject to disciplinary action. The Federation and/or USHJA as applicable must be notified of any change of ownership and/or competition name of the horse. Owners are requested to notify the Federation and/or USHJA as applicable of corrections to previously submitted information, e.g., names, addresses, breed registration, pedigree, or markings.
- b. Applications for *USHJA* Registration Numbers can be completed online at www.ushja.org or www.usef.org using the *USEF* Horse Registration application form. The Horse application—This form is also available from the USHJA or Federation office, or it can be as a downloaded from the USHJA or Federation website or from competition management. Competition management is responsible for notifying exhibitors of this requirement in their prize list.
- 2. The Hunter Division is open to horses, stallions, mares or geldings. (For rules pertaining to exhibitors who are 18 years of age or older riding ponies, see HU108.11[MB1].)
- 3.1 In addition to the provisions of HU 101.1, on or after December 1, 2017, all horses competing in classes that require USHJA horse registration must provide a microchip number that verifies their animal's identity in order to compete for points, money won or be eligible for Federation and/or USHJA programs and awards where horses are required to be recorded or registered.
- 3.2 A microchip used to verify identity must be a fifteen digit ISO compliant 11784/11785 chip and be implanted in the nuchal ligament of the animal.
- 3.3 For classes that require age verification, age can be verified only through the following identification documents:
- a. registration papers or passport issued by a world breed federation sport horse (WBFSH) recognized registry.
- b. registration papers or Certificate of Pedigree from a breed or sport horse registry.
- 3.4 This rule will have a transition period from December 1, 2017 to November 30, 2018. During this period, animals that are not in compliance with this rule will not receive points or be eligible for Federation and/or USHJA programs and awards. After this period, all horses that are competing in classes which require USHJA registration which are not microchipped will be ineligible to compete in Federation licensed competitions.

Re-number successive:

- 3. The Hunter Breeding Section is open to horses only.
- a. Horses shown as a Thoroughbred must have been either registered with The Jockey Club or meet one of the criteria below. All competitions must require verification of registration on the day of the competition through one of the following methods:
- 1. The Jockey Club Certificate of Foal registration or a copy thereof
- 2. The horse's lip tattoo, the horse's 5-cross pedigree and the successful tattoo lookup result from The Jockey Club's Tattoo Identification Services, (located at www.registry.jockeyclub.com)
- 3. If neither of the above is available, a letter from The Jockey Club verifying the horse's identity. BOD 1/17/15

- 4. Pony Hunter Breeding classes are open to ponies.
- 5. Stallions are prohibited from all Pony Hunter classes except breeding classes.

7. Ponies shown by a junior cannot be shown by an adult at the same competition, except in breeding classes in-hand and in accordance with HU108. Ponies shown by an adult at a Licensed Competition cannot compete in any sections or classes at the same competition with a junior rider. (Exception: Breed restricted classes at multi-breed/discipline competitions.)

INTENT

Horse identification is important to both consumer confidence and the future of our sport. This rule provides a structured roll out for implementation of horse identification through initial registration and recordings, transfers and name changes. It also requires verifiable identification for animals that compete in age or breed restricted sections. Owners of animals that are already entered into the system would not be required to identify their animal unless a name change or transfer are requested. Owners may request identification on a voluntary basis.

The rule also offers two different forms of identification through the use of either Iris Scan or implanted microchip.

HU 103 HUNTER ELIGIBILITY, PRE-GREEN AND GREEN HUNTER STATUS FOR HORSES AND PONIES [CHAPTER SUBCHAPTER HU-1 DEFINITIONS AND ELIGIBILITY]

HU103 Hunter Eligibility, Pre-Green and Green Eligibility Status for Horses-and Ponies

-

- 1. In all cases, the hunter eligibility and green status of the horse or pony are is the responsibility of the owner.
- 2. Determining Hunter eligibility for horses. Hunter eligibility for a horse begins when a horse of any age, competes for the first time in any over fences class with jumps set at three feet (3'0") in height or higher in any Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- a. For the purposes of eligibility, equivalent heights are:
- 3'0" .90 meter
- 3'3" 1.0 meter
- 3'6" 1.10 meter
- 3. Once a horse begins its hunter eligibility, competing in jumper classes affects its Green Status and Eligibility according to HU103.12.
- 4. Horses may enter the Green Hunter section in any height section for which they are eligible. Further eligibility in the Green Hunter section is determined by the height section in which they enter the system.
- 5. A horse may compete in only one Green Hunter fence height section at any one competition.
- 6. When a horse begins its hunter eligibility competing in hunter or equitation classes or sections with fence heights of 3'0" or 3'3", it remains eligible for Green Hunter 3'0" and 3'3" for two competition years (not necessarily consecutive).
- 7. A horse that competes in any Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation class at a recognized competition in the United States or Canada with fence heights of 3'6" or higher is no longer eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'0" section but remains eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'3" section. A horse may compete in any other hunter or equitation class with fence heights of a maximum of 3'6" if otherwise eligible a maximum of four (4) times in one competition year prior to August 1 and remain eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'3". For jumper restrictions see HU103.12
- 8. Once a horse competes in a hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher a fifth time in one competition year, it is no longer eligible for the Green Hunter 3'3" section and it is only eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'6" section for the remainder of the competition year. That competition year will be considered the horse's Green Hunter 3'6" year. If a horse competes in a hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher after August 1, it is no longer eligible for the Green Hunter 3'3" section and it is only eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'6" section for the remainder of the competition year. That competition year will be considered the horse's Green Hunter 3'6" year. For jumper restrictions see HU103.12
- 9. Once a horse competes in a Federation or USHJA National Championship/Event with fence heights of 3'6" or higher he is no longer eligible for the Green Hunter 3'0" or 3'3" sections.
- 10. Following a horse's Green Hunter 3'6" year, it is eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'9" section for one year. That one year will commence the next competition year that the horse competes in any hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher. For jumper restrictions see HU103.12
- 11. A horse that has completed his Green Hunter 3'9" year is no longer eligible for any Green Hunter section.
- 12. Once a horse begins its hunter eligibility, the following jumper restrictions apply:

- a. To remain eligible for Green Hunter 3'0 and 3'3", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'3" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- b. To remain eligible for Green Hunter 3'6", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation of Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'6" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- c. To remain eligible for Green Hunter 3'9", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'9" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- 3. Determining Green or Pre-Green Status for horses. Horses that have not broken their Pre-Green or Green Status must jump less than their regulation height or their Green Status will be broken. The Green or Pre-Green status of a horse is determined by the following factors in competition experience at Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America:
- a. The height of fences (determined by the class, section or division specifications) over which a horse or pony has competed.
- b. The number of competition years a horse has competed at regulation height. A horse that has competed in such classes for two (2) or more competition years, without receiving a reinstatement, is no longer eligible to compete in the respective Pre-Green or Green section.
- 4 Determining Hunter eligibility for ponies. Hunter eligibility for a pony begins when a pony of any age, competes for the first time in any over fences class with jumps set at 2'3" or higher for small ponies, 2'6" or higher for medium ponies and 2'9" or higher for large ponies in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- 5 Determining Green Status for ponies. Ponies that have not broken their Green Status must jump less than their regulation height or their Green Status will be broken. The Green status of a pony is determined by the following factors in competition experience at Hunter or Hunter /Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America:
- a. The height of fences (determined by the class, section or division specifications) over which a pony has competed.
- b. The number of competition years a pony has competed at regulation height. A pony that has competed in such classes for one (1) or more competition years, without receiving a reinstatement, is not **no** longer eligible to compete in the Green section.
- 613. In all cases, fence heights will be determined by the specifications of each section regardless of whether or not the fences are actually set at the regulation height.
- 7.14. If a competition starts prior to or on November 30th, Pre-Green and Green status at the start of the competition are is maintained throughout the competition.
- 8. Green Status sections are divided into Pre-Green Horse (3', and 3'3"); First Year Green, Second Year Green and Green Conformation; and Green Pony (2'3", 2'6" and 2'9). Each status is defined below.
- 9. Pre-Green Horse Status.
- a. A Pre-Green Hunter is a horse of any age in his first or second year of showing over fences set at 3'0" or 3'3" in height that has never competed over fences set at 3'6" in height or higher in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America. Upon receipt by the owner of written notification of a First Year Green Hunter Reinstatement a horse may return to Pre-Green Hunter if it meets all other eligibility requirement of Pre-Green Hunter.
- b. A horse is eligible to compete as a Pre-Green Hunter for a maximum of two (2) years regardless of age.
- c. Horses may compete in either or both the 3'0" or 3'3" Pre-Green Hunter section during their two (2) years of eligibility. Horses may not cross enter between 3'0" and 3'3" Pre-Green sections at the same competition. Exception: In USHJA Zone 9, horses may cross enter between 3'0" and 3'3" Pre-Green sections at the same competition.
- d. Once a horse begins competing in a class that restricts Pre-Green status, it may no longer compete in any Jumper class at 1.05 meters or above held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North American or it will lose its pre-green status.
- e. Pre-Green Reinstatement. A Pre-Green reinstatement may be granted one time. A horse is not eligible for a Pre-Green reinstatement if it has competed over fences set at 3'7" in height or higher in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America. Horses that have competed in a USHJA International Hunter Derby are not eligible for reinstatement of Pre-Green status.
- f. No jogging is required.
- 10. Green Hunter Horse Status for First Year Second Year and Green Conformation.
- a. A Green Hunter is a horse of any age that is eligible to compete in the Green Hunter Section. A horse's Green Hunter eligibility, regardless of age, begins the first time the horse competes in any over fences class with jumps set at 3'6" in height or higher in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- b. A horse in its first year of showing in the Green Hunter section over fences 3'6" or higher must be shown as a First Year horse when it is shown in Green Hunters or Green Conformation Hunters.
- c. A horse in its second year of showing in the Green Hunter section over fences 3'6" or higher must be shown as a Second Year horse when being shown in the Green Hunters.
- d. Once a horse begins competing in a class that restricts Green status, it may no longer compete in any Jumper or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation class at

- 1.20 meters or above held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America or it will lose its Green status.
- e. A First Year Green reinstatement may be granted one time. A horse is not eligible for a First Year Green reinstatement if it has competed in any over fences class with jumps set at 3'7" in height or higher in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America. A horse is not eligible for a First Year Green reinstatement if it has competed in the US Junior Hunter Championship.
- f. A Second Year Green reinstatement may be granted one time.
- 11. Green Pony Status.
- a. A green pony is a pony not exceeding 14.2 hands of any age, which is eligible to compete in the Green Pony section. A pony's Green Hunter eligibility, regardless of age, begins the first time the pony competes in any over fences class with jumps set at 2'3" or higher for small ponies, 2'6" or higher for medium ponies and 2'9" or higher for large ponies in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- b. A pony is eligible to compete as a Green Pony for a maximum of one (1) year regardless of age or change to measurement status. A pony that has changed height sections in its green year may complete the green year at its new height.
- c. In its first year of showing at regulation height or higher, a green pony may also compete in the Regular Pony Hunter section at its respective height.
- d. Once a pony begins competing in any class that restricts Green status, it may no longer compete in any Jumper class held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America or it will lose its Green status.
- e. A Pony Hunter Green reinstatement may be granted one time. A pony is not eligible for a green rein-statement if it has competed in the US Hunter and/or Jumper Pony Championship.
- 12. Green Reinstatement.

A horse or pony cannot return to compete in the section for which the reinstatement application was made until written notification has been received from the Federation that the reinstatement has been granted. A horse or pony's eligibility to compete in sections that are restricted by experience may be reinstated for a future competition year provided that:

- a. The horse or pony was not shown at the regulation height or higher at more than four (4) competitions prior to September 1st of the current competition year.
- b. The horse or pony was not shown at the regulation height or higher on or after September 1st of the current competition year.
- c. The horse or pony does no longer competes at the regulation height or higher immediately upon application for reinstatement.
- d. The horse or pony is otherwise eligible for a reinstatement under Federation rules.

HU104 Young Hunter Eligibility and Status for Horses (New Rule)

- 1. Young Hunter age restrictions are defined as:
- a. Young Hunter 3'0" horses five years of age and under
- b. Young Hunter 3'3" horses six years of age and under
- c. Young Hunter 3'6" horses seven years of age and under
- 2. Horses eligible for the Young Hunters may begin competing in any Young Hunter height section for which they are eligible. Further eligibility in the Young Hunter section is determined by the height section in which they enter the system.
- 3. A horse is eligible to compete in an age-restricted hunter class from December 1 of the competition year in which they reach the applicable age at any time during that same competition year.
- 4. Age of horse must be verified in accordance with Federation policies and procedures prior to competing in the Young Hunter sections.
- 5. A horse may compete in only one Young Hunter height section at any one competition.
- 6. When a horse begins its hunter eligibility competing in any Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation class or section with fence heights of 3'0" or 3'3", it remains eligible for Young Hunter 3'0" and 3'3" for two competition years provided it is eligible by age.
- a. For the purposes of eligibility, equivalent heights are:
- 3'0" .90 meter
- 3'3" 1.0 meter
- 3'6" 1.10 meter
- 7. A horse that competes in any hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher is no longer eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'0" section but remains eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'3" section if otherwise eligible. A horse may compete in any other hunter or equitation class with fence heights of a maximum of 3'6" a maximum of four (4) times in one competition year prior to August 1 and remain eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'3". For jumper restrictions see HU104.11

- 8. Once a horse competes in a hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher a fifth time in one competition year, it is no longer eligible for the Young Hunter 3'3" section and it is only eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'6" section for the remainder of the competition year. That competition year will be considered the horse's Young Hunter 3'6" year. If a horse competes in a hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher after August 1, it is no longer eligible for the Young Hunter 3'3" section and it is only eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'6" section for the remainder of the competition year. That competition year will be considered the horse's Young Hunter 3'6" year. For jumper restrictions see HU104.11
- 9. Once a horse competes in a Federation or USHJA National Championship/Event with fence heights of 3'6" or higher, it is no longer eligible for the Young Hunter 3'3" section.
- 10. A horse that has completed his Young Hunter 3'6" year is no longer eligible for any Young Hunter section.
- 11. Once a horse begins its hunter eligibility, the following jumper restrictions apply:
- a. To remain eligible for Young Hunter 3'0 and 3'3", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'3" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- b. To remain eligible for Young Hunter 3'6", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'6" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- 12. In all cases, fence heights will be determined by the specifications of each section regardless of whether or not the fences are actually set at the regulation height.
- 13. If a competition starts prior to or on November 30th, Young Hunter status at the start of the competition is maintained throughout the competition.

HU 105 Hunter Eligibility and Green Status for Ponies (New Rule – moved from HU104)

- 1. In all cases, the hunter eligibility and green status of the pony is the responsibility of the owner.
- 2. Determining Hunter eligibility for ponies. Hunter eligibility for a pony begins when a pony of any age, competes for the first time in any over fences class with jumps at 2'3" or higher for small ponies, 2'6" or higher for medium ponies and 2'9" or higher for large ponies in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- a. For the purposes of eligibility, equivalent heights are:
- 2'3" .70 meter
- 2'6" .80 meter
- 2'9" .85 meter
- 3'0" .90 meter
- 3. Determining Green Status for ponies. Ponies that have not broken their Green Status must jump less than their regulation height or their Green Status will be broken. The Green status of a pony is determined by the following factors in competition experience at Hunter or Hunter /Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America:
- a. The height of fences (determined by the class, section or division specifications) over which a pony has competed.
- b. The number of competition years a pony has competed at regulation height. A pony that has competed in such classes for one (1) or more competition years, without receiving a reinstatement, is no longer eligible to compete in the Green section.
- 4. In all cases, fence heights will be determined by the specifications of each section regardless of whether or not the fences are actually set at the regulation height.
- 5. If a competition starts prior to or on November 30th, Green status at the start of the competition is maintained throughout the competition.
- 6. Green Pony Status.
- a. A green pony is a pony not exceeding 14.2 hands of any age, which is eligible to compete in the Green Pony section. A pony's Green Hunter eligibility, regardless of age, begins the first time the pony competes in any over fences class with jumps at 2'3" or higher for small ponies, 2'6" or higher for medium ponies and 2'9" or higher for large ponies in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- b. A pony is eligible to compete as a Green Pony for a maximum of one (1) year regardless of age or change to measurement status. A pony that has changed height sections in its green year may complete the green year at its new height.
- c. In its first year of showing at regulation height or higher, a green pony may also compete in the Regular Pony Hunter section at its respective height.

- d. Once a pony begins competing in any class that restricts Green status, it may no longer compete in any Jumper class held at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America or it will lose its Green status.
- e. A Pony Hunter Green reinstatement may be granted one time. A pony is not eligible for a green reinstatement if it has competed in the US Hunter and/or Jumper Pony Championship.
- 7. Green Pony Reinstatement. A pony cannot return to compete in the section for which the reinstatement application was made until written notification has been received from the Federation that the reinstatement has been granted. A pony's eligibility to compete in restricted sections may be reinstated for a future competition year provided that:
- a. The pony was not shown at the regulation height or higher at more than four (4) competitions prior to September 1st of the current competition vear.
- b. The pony was not shown at the regulation height or higher on or after September 1st of the current competition year.
- c. The pony no longer competes at the regulation height or higher immediately upon application for reinstatement.
- d. The pony is otherwise eligible for a reinstatement under Federation rules.

HU104 HU106High Performance, Performance Working and Small Hunter - Definition and Classifications

- a. Championship and Reserve must be offered in accordance with HU145.
- b. Number of classes and prize money must be offered in accordance with GR313.6.
- c. Individual classes may be entered. (Exception: Under Saddle classes. See HU137.2)
 - 1. In a section with three (3) classes, the under saddle will count half points towards champion and reserve.

- d. When combining High Performance Hunter with another section, if different amounts of prize money or entry fees were offered in the original sections, the combined sections will use the lower amount for both prize money and entry fees.
- 11. At all licensed competitions, if the High Performance Working Hunter section has fewer than three entries, it must be combined with the Second Year Green Hunter (or with Green Working Hunter if combined or not originally offered split).
- a. If, after combining, there are still fewer than three entries in the combined section, it must be further combined with the First Year Green Hunter section.
- b. If combined Green Working sections have fewer than three entries, then they must be combined with High Performance Working Hunter.
- c. A horse that is eligible for more than one section must be declared and compete in only one.
- d. Horses will jump the respective height for the entered section.
- e. When combining High Performance Working Hunter with another section, if different amounts of prize money or entry fees were offered in the original sections, the combined sections will use the lower amount for both prize money and entry fees.
- f. When combining a section of High Performance Working Hunter with either a section of First Year Green Working Hunters, Second Year Green Working Hunters or both, the combined sections must offer the same number of classes offered by the Green Working Hunter section(s) with which it is combined. In addition, a section entry fee will be required and individual classes may no longer be entered for the combined section.
- 12. At all licensed competitions, if there are fewer than six entries in either the Performance Hunter 3'3" or Performance Hunter 3'6" they must be combined, but they cannot be combined with any other hunter sections. If there are six or more entries in each Performance Hunter section, they must be held separately.

SUBCHAPTER HU-7 CHAMPIONSHIPS

HU146 Eligibility

1. General.

The Champion and Reserve Champion titles are awarded to the top two of the four horses that acquired the most points performing over a regulation course with obstacles at the full height required in the section in which shown, except under the provisions of HU110. In addition to these points, only these four horses receive half points for ribbons won in Model classes and full points for ribbons won in one Under Saddle class. Exception: High Performance and Performance Working Hunter sections with three classes receive half points for the under saddle class, see HU104.

HU147 Ties

1. In case of a tie score the Championship and/or Reserve is awarded to the horse that accumulated the most points over fences. If horses have an equal number of points over fences and no points under saddle, the tied horses will be asked to compete in a hack off, or independent under saddle class, to be judged on soundness and performance at the walk, trot and canter. Competitors may be asked to hand gallop at the discretion of the judge. (Exception: Green Hunters and Young Hunters). Any competitor may concede to the other if they choose not to hack off, or if both competitors agree, they may choose to break the tie with a coin toss. If horses have an equal number of points over fences, under saddle, and model (i.e. Regular or Green Conformation Hunter 3'6" or High Performance Conformation Hunter) the tie will stand as is and both horses will receive Horse of the Year Points in their respective Champion and/or Reserve position.

2. If all tied horses are declared unsound, selection of the winner among such tied competitors is left to the discretion of the judges. **HU148** Combination Hunter Championship All competitions with a limited number of Hunter classes, including events in more than one section (i.e., Regular High Performance Conformation or Green Conformation Hunter 3'6", Green Working, High Performance or Performance Hunter), may count points won in such classes toward a Combination Hunter Championship. A Combination Hunter Championship and Reserve are awarded to two of the four horses which have acquired the most points performing over a regulation Hunter course with fences the height required in the section in which shown. In addition to these points, only these horses receive half points for ribbons won in Model, Maiden, Novice, Limit and Green classes and full points for ribbons won in one Under Saddle class or, if not held, in one Hunter Hack class, if otherwise qualified. The prize list must specify which classes count. This Championship does not count toward a Federation Horse of the Year Award except for Amateur Owner Hunters. [...] SUBCHAPTER HU-8 CONDUCT HU157 Entry Fees [...] 2. When entries require that High Performance Working Hunters are combined with Green Working sections, a section entry fee will be required for the High Performance Working Hunter section and individual classes will not be able to be entered. HU189 USHJA PRE-GREEN HUNTER CHALLENGE

USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge may be offered at USEF *Federation* Licensed Premier, National, Regional I or Regional II Competitions and at Competitions approved for a Special Competition Status.

- 1. USHJA Pre-Green Hunter Challenge is open to horses of any age in their first or second year of competing over fences set at eligible under Federation rules to compete in the Green Hunter 3' or 3'3".
- 2. A horse which has received a pre-green reinstatement in accordance with USEF rules is allowed to compete in a USHJA Pre-Green Challenge.

The USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge entry fee is capped at ten percent (10%) of prize money offered. The per horse entrant fee will be \$15 at Premier, National and Special competitions and \$10 at Regional I and Regional II competitions. The per horse entrant fee may be added to the entry fee.
- 56. This per horse entrant fee is not included in calculating the ten percent (10%) entry fee maximum.
- 67. National and Zone bonus points will be awarded to the horse in the Pre-Green Hunter 3'0" or 3'3" section. However, horses may be ridden by Professionals, Juniors, or Amateurs.
- 78. National and Zone bonus points will be awarded for a USHJA Pre-Green Hunter Challenge as follows:
- a. For a USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge in which the first round is the last class of the Pre-Green *Hunter 3'0"/3'3"* Section, *National and* Zone bonus points will be awarded as follows: 1st-40, 2nd-32, 3rd-28, 4th-24, 5th-20, 6th-16, 7th-12, 8th-10, 9th-8, 10th-6, 11th-4 and 12th-2.
- b. For a USHJA Pre-Green Hunter Challenge which is held as separate two round class, National and Zone bonus points will be awarded for a as follows:

1st-80, 2nd-64, 3rd-56, 4th-48, 5th-40, 6th-32, 7th-24, 8th-20, 9th-16, 10th-12, 11th-8 and 12th-4.

89. A minimum of \$750 must be offered when a USHJA Pre-Green Hunter Challenge is held at a Premier rated competition or a competition that has been approved for a Special Competition status, a minimum of \$500 when held at a National rated competition and a minimum of \$250 must be offered when held at a Regional I or Regional II rated competition. If the 10% cap is less than \$50, management may charge an entry fee up to the maximum of \$50.

- 12. Riders, owners and trainers must be current Active members of USEF the Federation and USHJA to participate in this class. (See GR202). Horses must be registered with the USHJA to participate in this class. Exception: Foreign residents and horses in good standing with their National Federation are eligible to compete in this class.
- a. USHJA *National and* Zone Horse of the Year bonus points will only be awarded for placing in a USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge if the owner is a current Active member of the Federation and USHJA, the horse is recorded with the Federation and registered with USHJA. For additional information and Zone residency requirements see GR1110 and GR1111.
- 13. No more than one Pre-Green Hunter Challenge may be held during a given competition and competitions have the option of offering only one (1) fence height, or both fence heights within the class. If offering only one height, it must be the 3'0" height that is offered.

SUBCHAPTER HU-14 LIMITING ENTIRES

HU190 Limiting Entries

Hunter sections restricting entries based on winnings must use the Federation National Horse of the Year points or prize money won, whichever is applicable, as a means of qualification for the specified time period or, alternatively, must use the greatest number of Federation National Horse of the Year points won at a specified number of competitions within a specified time period. (Exception: First Year Green, Second Year Green Hunter 3'0", 3'3", 3'6" and 3'9", Green Conformation Hunter 3'6", Regular- High Performance Conformation Hunter, High Performance Hunter, Performance Working Hunter 3'6" and Performance Working Hunter 3'3" sections restricting entries based on winnings must accept 50% of the entries from the Federation National Horse of the Year prize money won list. If an odd number of entries will be accepted, the Federation National Horse of the Year prize money won list will take precedence. The procedure for determining horses that qualify and their ranking will begin with the top placed horse on the Money Won standings list, then on to the second placed horse on the Points standings list, back to the second placed horse on the Money Won standings list, then on to the second placed horse on either list that has already qualified, skip that horse and go instead to the next horse on the same list. Continue using this process until all slots are filled)...

HU 103 HUNTER ELIGIBILITY, PRE-GREEN AND GREEN HUNTER STATUS FOR HORSES AND PONIES [CHAPTER SUBCHAPTER HU-1 DEFINITIONS AND ELIGIBILITY]

HU103 Hunter Eligibility, Pre-Green and Green Eligibility Status for Horses-and Ponies

- _
- 1. In all cases, the hunter eligibility and green status of the horse or pony are is the responsibility of the owner.
- 2. Determining Hunter eligibility for horses. Hunter eligibility for a horse begins when a horse of any age, competes for the first time in any over fences class with jumps set at three feet (3'0") in height or higher in any Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- a. For the purposes of eligibility, equivalent heights are:
- 3'0" .90 meter
- 3'3" 1.0 meter
- 3'6" 1.10 meter
- 3. Once a horse begins its hunter eligibility, competing in jumper classes affects its Green Status and Eligibility according to HU103.12.
- 4. Horses may enter the Green Hunter section in any height section for which they are eligible. Further eligibility in the Green Hunter section is determined by the height section in which they enter the system.
- 5. A horse may compete in only one Green Hunter fence height section at any one competition.
- 6. When a horse begins its hunter eligibility competing in hunter or equitation classes or sections with fence heights of 3'0" or 3'3", it remains eligible for Green Hunter 3'0" and 3'3" for two competition years (not necessarily consecutive).
- 7. A horse that competes in any Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation class at a recognized competition in the United States or Canada with fence heights of 3'6" or higher is no longer eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'0" section but remains eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'3" section. A horse may compete in any other hunter or equitation class with fence heights of a maximum of 3'6" if otherwise eligible a maximum of four (4) times in one competition year prior to August 1 and remain eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'3". For jumper restrictions see HU103.12
- 8. Once a horse competes in a hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher a fifth time in one competition year, it is no longer eligible for the Green Hunter 3'3" section and it is only eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'6" section for the remainder of the competition year. That competition year will be considered the horse's Green Hunter 3'6" year. If a horse competes in a hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher after August 1, it is no longer eligible for the Green Hunter 3'3" section and it is only eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'6" section for the remainder of the competition year. That competition year will be considered the horse's Green Hunter 3'6" year. For jumper restrictions see HU103.12
- 9. Once a horse competes in a Federation or USHJA National Championship/Event with fence heights of 3'6" or higher he is no longer eligible for the Green Hunter 3'0" or 3'3" sections.
- 10. Following a horse's Green Hunter 3'6" year, it is eligible to compete in the Green Hunter 3'9" section for one year. That one year will commence the next competition year that the horse competes in any hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher. For jumper restrictions see HU103.12
- 11. A horse that has completed his Green Hunter 3'9" year is no longer eligible for any Green Hunter section.
- 12. Once a horse begins its hunter eligibility, the following jumper restrictions apply:

- a. To remain eligible for Green Hunter 3'0 and 3'3", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'3" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- b. To remain eligible for Green Hunter 3'6", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation of Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'6" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- c. To remain eligible for Green Hunter 3'9", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'9" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- 3. Determining Green or Pre-Green Status for horses. Horses that have not broken their Pre-Green or Green Status must jump less than their regulation height or their Green Status will be broken. The Green or Pre-Green status of a horse is determined by the following factors in competition experience at Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America:
- a. The height of fences (determined by the class, section or division specifications) over which a horse or pony has competed.
- b. The number of competition years a horse has competed at regulation height. A horse that has competed in such classes for two (2) or more competition years, without receiving a reinstatement, is no longer eligible to compete in the respective Pre-Green or Green section.
- 4 Determining Hunter eligibility for ponies. Hunter eligibility for a pony begins when a pony of any age, competes for the first time in any over fences class with jumps set at 2'3" or higher for small ponies, 2'6" or higher for medium ponies and 2'9" or higher for large ponies in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- 5 Determining Green Status for ponies. Ponies that have not broken their Green Status must jump less than their regulation height or their Green Status will be broken. The Green status of a pony is determined by the following factors in competition experience at Hunter or Hunter /Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America:
- a. The height of fences (determined by the class, section or division specifications) over which a pony has competed.
- b. The number of competition years a pony has competed at regulation height. A pony that has competed in such classes for one (1) or more competition years, without receiving a reinstatement, is not **no** longer eligible to compete in the Green section.
- 613. In all cases, fence heights will be determined by the specifications of each section regardless of whether or not the fences are actually set at the regulation height.
- 714. If a competition starts prior to or on November 30th, Pre-Green and Green status at the start of the competition are is maintained throughout the competition.
- 8. Green Status sections are divided into Pre-Green Horse (3', and 3'3"); First Year Green, Second Year Green and Green Conformation; and Green Pony (2'3", 2'6" and 2'9). Each status is defined below.
- 9. Pre-Green Horse Status.
- a. A Pre-Green Hunter is a horse of any age in his first or second year of showing over fences set at 3'0" or 3'3" in height that has never competed over fences set at 3'6" in height or higher in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America. Upon receipt by the owner of written notification of a First Year Green Hunter Reinstatement a horse may return to Pre-Green Hunter if it meets all other eligibility requirement of Pre-Green Hunter.
- b. A horse is eligible to compete as a Pre-Green Hunter for a maximum of two (2) years regardless of age.
- c. Horses may compete in either or both the 3'0" or 3'3" Pre-Green Hunter section during their two (2) years of eligibility. Horses may not cross enter between 3'0" and 3'3" Pre-Green sections at the same competition. Exception: In USHJA Zone 9, horses may cross enter between 3'0" and 3'3" Pre-Green sections at the same competition.
- d. Once a horse begins competing in a class that restricts Pre-Green status, it may no longer compete in any Jumper class at 1.05 meters or above held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North American or it will lose its pre-green status.
- e. Pre-Green Reinstatement. A Pre-Green reinstatement may be granted one time. A horse is not eligible for a Pre-Green reinstatement if it has competed over fences set at 3'7" in height or higher in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America. Horses that have competed in a USHJA International Hunter Derby are not eligible for reinstatement of Pre-Green status.
- f. No jogging is required.
- 10. Green Hunter Horse Status for First Year Second Year and Green Conformation.
- a. A Green Hunter is a horse of any age that is eligible to compete in the Green Hunter Section. A horse's Green Hunter eligibility, regardless of age, begins the first time the horse competes in any over fences class with jumps set at 3'6" in height or higher in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- b. A horse in its first year of showing in the Green Hunter section over fences 3'6" or higher must be shown as a First Year horse when it is shown in Green Hunters or Green Conformation Hunters.
- c. A horse in its second year of showing in the Green Hunter section over fences 3'6" or higher must be shown as a Second Year horse when being shown in the Green Hunters.
- d. Once a horse begins competing in a class that restricts Green status, it may no longer compete in any Jumper or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation class at

- 1.20 meters or above held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America or it will lose its Green status.
- e. A First Year Green reinstatement may be granted one time. A horse is not eligible for a First Year Green reinstatement if it has competed in any over fences class with jumps set at 3'7" in height or higher in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America. A horse is not eligible for a First Year Green reinstatement if it has competed in the US Junior Hunter Championship.
- f. A Second Year Green reinstatement may be granted one time.
- 11. Green Pony Status.
- a. A green pony is a pony not exceeding 14.2 hands of any age, which is eligible to compete in the Green Pony section. A pony's Green Hunter eligibility, regardless of age, begins the first time the pony competes in any over fences class with jumps set at 2'3" or higher for small ponies, 2'6" or higher for medium ponies and 2'9" or higher for large ponies in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- b. A pony is eligible to compete as a Green Pony for a maximum of one (1) year regardless of age or change to measurement status. A pony that has changed height sections in its green year may complete the green year at its new height.
- c. In its first year of showing at regulation height or higher, a green pony may also compete in the Regular Pony Hunter section at its respective height.
- d. Once a pony begins competing in any class that restricts Green status, it may no longer compete in any Jumper class held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America or it will lose its Green status.
- e. A Pony Hunter Green reinstatement may be granted one time. A pony is not eligible for a green rein-statement if it has competed in the US Hunter and/or Jumper Pony Championship.
- 12. Green Reinstatement.

A horse or pony cannot return to compete in the section for which the reinstatement application was made until written notification has been received from the Federation that the reinstatement has been granted. A horse or pony's eligibility to compete in sections that are restricted by experience may be reinstated for a future competition year provided that:

- a. The horse or pony was not shown at the regulation height or higher at more than four (4) competitions prior to September 1st of the current competition year.
- b. The horse or pony was not shown at the regulation height or higher on or after September 1st of the current competition year.
- c. The horse or pony does no longer competes at the regulation height or higher immediately upon application for reinstatement.
- d. The horse or pony is otherwise eligible for a reinstatement under Federation rules.

HU104 Young Hunter Eligibility and Status for Horses (New Rule)

- 1. Young Hunter age restrictions are defined as:
- a. Young Hunter 3'0" horses five years of age and under
- b. Young Hunter 3'3" horses six years of age and under
- c. Young Hunter 3'6" horses seven years of age and under
- 2. Horses eligible for the Young Hunters may begin competing in any Young Hunter height section for which they are eligible. Further eligibility in the Young Hunter section is determined by the height section in which they enter the system.
- 3. A horse is eligible to compete in an age-restricted hunter class from December 1 of the competition year in which they reach the applicable age through the end of that same competition year.
- 4. Age of horse must be verified in accordance with Federation rules prior to competing in the Young Hunter sections.
- 5. A horse may compete in only one Young Hunter height section at any one competition.
- 6. When a horse begins its hunter eligibility competing in any Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation class or section with fence heights of 3'0" or 3'3", it remains eligible for Young Hunter 3'0" and 3'3" for two competition years provided it is eligible by age.
- a. For the purposes of eligibility, equivalent heights are:
- 3'0" .90 meter
- 3'3" 1.0 meter
- 3'6" 1.10 meter
- 7. A horse that competes in any hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher is no longer eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'0" section but remains eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'3" section if otherwise eligible. A horse may compete in any other hunter or equitation class with fence heights of a maximum of 3'6" a maximum of four (4) times in one competition year prior to August 1 and remain eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'3". For jumper restrictions see HU104.11

- 8. Once a horse competes in a hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher a fifth time in one competition year, it is no longer eligible for the Young Hunter 3'3" section and it is only eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'6" section for the remainder of the competition year. That competition year will be considered the horse's Young Hunter 3'6" year. If a horse competes in a hunter or equitation class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights of 3'6" or higher after August 1, it is no longer eligible for the Young Hunter 3'3" section and it is only eligible to compete in the Young Hunter 3'6" section for the remainder of the competition year. That competition year will be considered the horse's Young Hunter 3'6" year. For jumper restrictions see HU104.11
- 9. Once a horse competes in a Federation or USHJA National Championship/Event with fence heights of 3'6" or higher, it is no longer eligible for the Young Hunter 3'3" section.
- 10. A horse that has completed his Young Hunter 3'6" year is no longer eligible for any Young Hunter section.
- 11. Once a horse begins its hunter eligibility, the following jumper restrictions apply:
- a. To remain eligible for Young Hunter 3'0 and 3'3", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'3" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- b. To remain eligible for Young Hunter 3'6", a horse may not compete in a jumper class at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America with fence heights higher than 3'6" when class specifications list fence height in metric.
- 12. In all cases, fence heights will be determined by the specifications of each section regardless of whether or not the fences are actually set at the regulation height.
- 13. If a competition starts prior to or on November 30th, Young Hunter status at the start of the competition is maintained throughout the competition.

HU 105 Hunter Eligibility and Green Status for Ponies (New Rule – moved from HU104)

- 1. In all cases, the hunter eligibility and green status of the pony is the responsibility of the owner.
- 2. Determining Hunter eligibility for ponies. Hunter eligibility for a pony begins when a pony of any age, competes for the first time in any over fences class with jumps at 2'3" or higher for small ponies, 2'6" or higher for medium ponies and 2'9" or higher for large ponies in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- a. For the purposes of eligibility, equivalent heights are:
- 2'3" .70 meter
- 2'6" .80 meter
- 2'9" .85 meter
- 3'0" .95 meter
- 3. Determining Green Status for ponies. Ponies that have not broken their Green Status must jump less than their regulation height or their Green Status will be broken. The Green status of a pony is determined by the following factors in competition experience at Hunter or Hunter /Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America:
- a. The height of fences (determined by the class, section or division specifications) over which a pony has competed.
- b. The number of competition years a pony has competed at regulation height. A pony that has competed in such classes for one (1) or more competition years, without receiving a reinstatement, is no longer eligible to compete in the Green section.
- 4. In all cases, fence heights will be determined by the specifications of each section regardless of whether or not the fences are actually set at the regulation height.
- 5. If a competition starts prior to or on November 30th, Green status at the start of the competition is maintained throughout the competition.
- 6. Green Pony Status.
- a. A green pony is a pony not exceeding 14.2 hands of any age, which is eligible to compete in the Green Pony section. A pony's Green Hunter eligibility, regardless of age, begins the first time the pony competes in any over fences class with jumps at 2'3" or higher for small ponies, 2'6" or higher for medium ponies and 2'9" or higher for large ponies in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America.
- b. A pony is eligible to compete as a Green Pony for a maximum of one (1) year regardless of age or change to measurement status. A pony that has changed height sections in its green year may complete the green year at its new height.
- c. In its first year of showing at regulation height or higher, a green pony may also compete in the Regular Pony Hunter section at its respective height.

- d. Once a pony begins competing in any class that restricts Green status, it may no longer compete in any Jumper class held at a Federation or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America or it will lose its Green status.
- e. A Pony Hunter Green reinstatement may be granted one time. A pony is not eligible for a green reinstatement if it has competed in the US Hunter and/or Jumper Pony Championship.
- 7. Green Pony Reinstatement. A pony cannot return to compete in the section for which the reinstatement application was made until written notification has been received from the Federation that the reinstatement has been granted. A pony's eligibility to compete in restricted sections may be reinstated for a future competition year provided that:
- a. The pony was not shown at the regulation height or higher at more than four (4) competitions prior to September 1st of the current competition vear.
- b. The pony was not shown at the regulation height or higher on or after September 1st of the current competition year.
- c. The pony no longer competes at the regulation height or higher immediately upon application for reinstatement.
- d. The pony is otherwise eligible for a reinstatement under Federation rules.

HU104 HU106High Performance, Performance Working and Small Hunter - Definition and Classifications

- 1. A High Performance or Performance Working Hunter is a horse of any age and is not restricted by previous showing.
- 2. High Performance Hunter
- a. Championships must be offered in accordance with HU145.
 - 1. Number of classes and prize money must be offered in accordance with GR313.6.
 - 2. Individual classes may be entered. (Exception: Under Saddle classes. See HU137.2)
 - 3. In a section with three (3) classes, the under saddle will count half points towards champion and reserve.
- b. The High Performance section must offer the greatest amount of prize money of all hunter sections at the competition.
- 3. Performance Working Hunter 3'6"
- a. Championships must be offered in accordance with HU145.
- b. Number of classes and prize money must be offered in accordance with GR313.6.
- c. Individual classes may be entered. (Exception: Under Saddle classes. See HU137.2)
- d. In a section with three (3) classes, the under saddle will count half points towards champion and reserve.
- 4. Performance Working Hunter 3'3"
- a. Championship and Reserve must be offered in accordance with HU145.
- b. Number of classes and prize money must be offered in accordance with GR313.6.
- c. Individual classes may be entered. (Exception: Under Saddle classes. See HU137.2)
 - 1. In a section with three (3) classes, the under saddle will count half points towards champion and reserve.

If there are less fewer than six (6) entries in any one Hunter Classic, it may combine with other sections of the same rating. The Champion and Reserve Champion titles are awarded to the top two of the four horses that acquired the most points performing over a regulation course with obstacles at the full height required in the section in which shown, except under the provisions of HU110. In addition to these points, only these four horses receive half points for ribbons won in Model classes and full points for ribbons won in one Under Saddle class. Exception: High Performance and Performance Working Hunter sections with three classes receive half points for the under saddle class, see HU104.

HU147 Ties

1. In case of a tie score the Championship and/or Reserve is awarded to the horse that accumulated the most points over fences. If horses have an equal number of points over fences and no points under saddle, the tied horses will be asked to compete in a hack off, or independent under saddle class, to be judged on soundness and performance at the walk, trot and canter. Competitors may be asked to hand gallop at the discretion of the judge. (Exception: Green Hunters and Young Hunters). Any competitor may concede to the other if they choose not to hack off, or if both competitors agree, they may choose to break the tie with a coin toss. If horses have an equal number of points over fences, under saddle, and model (i.e. Regular or Green Conformation Hunter 3'6" or High Performance Conformation Hunter) the tie will stand as is and both horses will receive Horse of the Year Points in their respective Champion and/or Reserve position.

2. If all tied horses are declared unsound, selection of the winner among such tied competitors is left to the discretion of the judges. **HU148** Combination Hunter Championship All competitions with a limited number of Hunter classes, including events in more than one section (i.e., Regular High Performance Conformation or Green Conformation Hunter 3'6", Green Working, High Performance or Performance Hunter), may count points won in such classes toward a Combination Hunter Championship. A Combination Hunter Championship and Reserve are awarded to two of the four horses which have acquired the most points performing over a regulation Hunter course with fences the height required in the section in which shown. In addition to these points, only these horses receive half points for ribbons won in Model, Maiden, Novice, Limit and Green classes and full points for ribbons won in one Under Saddle class or, if not held, in one Hunter Hack class, if otherwise qualified. The prize list must specify which classes count. This Championship does not count toward a Federation Horse of the Year Award except for Amateur Owner Hunters. [...] SUBCHAPTER HU-8 CONDUCT HU157 Entry Fees [...] 2. When entries require that High Performance Working Hunters are combined with Green Working sections, a section entry fee will be required for the High Performance Working Hunter section and individual classes will not be able to be entered. A horse may be declared in only one of the following sections at the competition: Pre-Green *Hunter 3'0" or 3'3"*, Performance Hunter 3'3", Children's *Hunter*, Pony *Hunter*, Small Hunter, Junior Hunter 3'3", Adult Amateur *Hunter* or Amateur Owner *Hunter* 3'3". Only Juniors or Amateurs may declare for the applicable Children's *Hunter*, Pony *Hunter*, Adult Amateur *Hunter* or Amateur Owner *Hunter* 3'3" section. National bonus points will not be awarded. At Regional II rated competitions, Zone bonus points will be awarded as follows: 1st - 50, 2nd - 40, 3rd - 35, 4th - 30, 5th - 25, 6th - 20, 7th - 15, 8th - 10, 9th - 7, 10th - 5, 11th - 3, 12th - 2.

HU189 USHJA PRE-GREEN HUNTER CHALLENGE

USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge may be offered at USEF *Federation* Licensed Premier, National, Regional I or Regional II Competitions and at Competitions approved for a Special Competition Status.

- 1. USHJA Pre-Green Hunter Challenge is open to horses of any age in their first or second year of competing over fences set at eligible under Federation rules to compete in the Green Hunter 3' or 3'3".
- 2. A horse which has received a pre-green reinstatement in accordance with USEF rules is allowed to compete in a USHJA Pre-Green Challenge.
- 3. Horses are not required to jog for soundness.
- 4. All USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge classes must meet the requirements set forth by USHJA. Information on class procedures, class requirements, judging system and course requirements is available from the Programs Department in the USHJA office and on the website at www.ushja.org.
- a. The USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge may be held as a separate two (2) round class or competitions may utilize the last class of a Pre-Green section as the first (1st) round of the Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge. At least twelve (12) horses, if available, must return for the second (2nd) round. Prize lists must specify if more than twelve (12) horses will be invited to return for the second (2nd) round.
- 5. Competition management will collect and remit to USHJA the per horse entrant fee along with the class results within ten (10) days of the competition. The USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge entry fee is capped at ten percent (10%) of prize money offered. The per horse entrant fee will be \$15 at Premier, National and Special competitions and \$10 at Regional I and Regional II competitions. The per horse entrant fee may be added to the entry fee.
- 6. This per horse entrant fee is not included in calculating the ten percent (10%) entry fee maximum.
- 7. **National and** Zone bonus points will be awarded to the horse in the Pre-Green Hunter 3'0" or 3'3" section. However, horses may be ridden by Professionals, Juniors, or Amateurs.
- 8. National and Zone bonus points will be awarded for a USHJA Pre-Green Hunter Challenge as follows:
- a. For a USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge in which the first round is the last class of the Pre-Green *Hunter 3'0"/3'3"* Section, *National and* Zone bonus points will be awarded as follows: 1st-40, 2nd-32, 3rd-28, 4th-24, 5th-20, 6th-16, 7th-12, 8th-10, 9th-8, 10th-6, 11th-4 and 12th-2.
- b. For a USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge which is held as separate two round class, *National and* Zone bonus points will be awarded for a as follows: 1st-80, 2nd-64, 3rd-56, 4th- 48, 5th- 40, 6th-32, 7th-24, 8th-20, 9th-16, 10th-12, 11th-8 and 12th-4.

9. A minimum of \$750 must be offered when a USHJA Pre-Green Hunter Challenge is held at a Premier rated competition or a competition that has been approved for a Special Competition status, a minimum of \$500 when held at a National rated competition and a minimum of \$250 must be offered when held at a Regional I or Regional II rated competition. If the 10% cap is less than \$50, management may charge an entry fee up to the maximum of \$50.

- 12. Riders, owners and trainers must be current Active members of USEF the Federation and USHJA to participate in this class. (See GR202). Horses must be registered with the USHJA to participate in this class. Exception: Foreign residents and horses in good standing with their National Federation are eligible to compete in this class.
- a. USHJA *National and* Zone Horse of the Year bonus points will only be awarded for placing in a USHJA Pre-Green *Hunter* Challenge if the owner is a current Active member of the Federation and USHJA, the horse is recorded with the Federation and registered with USHJA. For additional information and Zone residency requirements see GR1110 and GR1111.
- 13. No more than one Pre-Green Hunter Challenge may be held during a given competition and competitions have the option of offering only one (1) fence height, or both fence heights within the class. If offering only one height, it must be the 3'0" height that is offered.

Hunter sections restricting entries based on winnings must use the Federation National Horse of the Year points or prize money won, whichever is applicable, as a means of qualification for the specified time period or, alternatively, must use the greatest number of Federation National Horse of the Year points won at a specified number of competitions within a specified time period. (Exception: First Year Green, Second Year Green Hunter 3'0", 3'3", 3'6" and 3'9", Young Hunter 3'0", 3'3", 3'6", Green Conformation Hunter 3'6", Regular- High Performance Conformation Hunter, High Performance Hunter, Performance Working Hunter 3'6" and Performance Working Hunter 3'3" sections restricting entries based on winnings must accept 50% of the entries from the Federation National Horse of the Year points list and 50% of the entries from the Federation National Horse of the Year prize money won list. If an odd number of entries will be accepted, the Federation National Horse of the Year prize money won list will take precedence. The procedure for determining horses that qualify and their ranking will begin with the top placed horse on the Money Won standings list, then go to the top placed horse on the Points standings list, back to the second placed horse on the Money Won standings list, then on to the second placed horse on the Points standings list, continuing down both lists in that order until all available slots have been filled. If during this process a horse appears on either list that has already qualified, skip that horse and go instead to the next horse on the same list. Continue using this process until all slots are filled)...

Unless the USHJA submits their Zone specifications to the Federation by August 1 of the previous year, the following specifications will apply for the Adult Amateur Hunter section:
- a. To be ridden by exhibitors who have reached their 18th birthday as of December 1 of the current competition year and who hold a current Federation Amateur status. To be ridden by amateurs who are no longer eligible to compete as junior exhibitors. Horses and riders entered in Adult Amateur Hunter sections may not compete in the Amateur Owner Hunter section at the same competition. Riders entered in Adult Amateur Hunter sections may not compete in any other class in which obstacles are required to exceed 3'9' (1.15m) at the same competition. (Exception: USHJA National Hunter Derby).
- b. Heights for Adult Amateur Hunter may range between 2'9" 3'3" with spreads not to exceed fence height.
- c. If there are fewer than six (6) entries in any divided section, the sections must be combined. If there are six (6) or more entries in each divided section, the divided sections must be held separately.
- d. Horses and riders entered in Adult Amateur Hunter sections may not compete in the Amateur Owner Hunter section at the same competition. Riders entered in Adult Amateur Hunter sections may not compete in any other class in which obstacles are required to exceed 3'9' (1.15m) at the same competition. (Exception: USHJA National Hunter Derby).
- -b. e. Horses may be entered in Junior Hunter sections at the same competition if ridden by a member of the same family.
- **c. f.** Ponies may be ridden by adults, however ponies shown by adults at a Licensed Competition cannot be shown by juniors at the same competition. (Exception: when competing at a multi-breed/discipline competition, a pony may be shown in the breed restricted hunter section by an adult and then also shown by a junior rider in hunter classes restricted to ponies).
- g. Cross entry into other sections is allowed unless otherwise stated in prize list.
- 2. If an under saddle class is divided by age and a rider has two or more horses entered, all riders must be amateurs but need not be eligible by age.
- 3. When a section is divided by age of rider no horse may compete in more than one section.
- 4. All USHJA zone specifications submitted by August 1st and approved by USHJA and USEF shall be enforced by USEF if not followed.

- 3. Riders under the age of 18 years may ride in any Green Hunter Pony section. The rider age restrictions for the Regular Hunter Pony sections do not apply to the Green Hunter Pony section.
- 4. Riders under 18 years of age may ride for other exhibitors who have more than one entry in the Under Saddle class and/or exhibit the pony in the model class.
- 5. Ponies must be handled by junior exhibitors in all phases of a class, except in breeding classes in-hand.
- 6. Ponies shown by a junior cannot be shown by an adult at the same competition, except in breeding classes in-hand and in accordance with HU108. Ponies shown by an adult at a Licensed Competition cannot compete in any sections or classes at the same competition with a junior rider Ponies shown by an adults at a Licensed Competition cannot compete in any rated Pony Hunter sections at the same competition with a junior rider. - 7. No animal may be shown in a performance class in this division unless the owner possesses a current measurement card or valid measurement form issued by the Federation (see HU170).
- a. Small ponies are not to exceed 12.2 hands;
- b. Medium ponies are over 12.2 and do not exceed 13.2 hands;
- c. Large ponies are over 13.2 and do not exceed 14.2 hands.
- 8. Regular classes are open to all ponies not exceeding 14.2 hands. Qualifications must follow as nearly as possible those outlined for Hunters.
- 9. No rider may show more than three ponies in any green pony hunter height section. At the completion of the class *jog*, the judge creates two separate orders using alternating numbers in the following manner: the highest score is first in Section A, the second highest score is first in Section B, the third highest score is second in Section A, the fourth highest score is second in Section B and so on until all placings are awarded or the jog order iscomplete. The result is two sections of the same class being pinned separately.

b. Jog. The judge will call one jog order of up to twenty (20) horses. Once the horses have jogged for soundness and the jog has been made official, the A and B sections will be pinned using the California Split.

c. Under Saddle. A Section with twelve (12) or less must be judged as one class using the California Split. Sections that are judged under the California Split must have results for Section A and B. A random split will be used for under saddle classes of more than twelve (12).

d. In reckoning Championship points, the top eight horses that receive the most points in the Over Fences classes are awarded points for the Under Saddle and/or Model class(es). The Championship is awarded as follows: Horse with most points—Champion Number 1. Horse with second highest points— Champion Number 2. Horse with third highest points—Reserve Champion Number 1. Horse with fourth highest points—Reserve Champion Number 2.

- 8. Prize money in all rated classes at all licensed competitions must be distributed as follows: a minimum of 30% for 1st, 22% for 2nd, 15% for 3rd, with the balance to be distributed at competition management's discretion.
- 9. Prize money must be doubled whenever a section is divided.
 - 1. Option to dividing classes by every other number:

a. As an option to dividing classes by every other number, all entries may be judged as a single class and awarded prizes as follows; however, points will be awarded based on the number of entries in each section after it has been divided.

A judge may, but is not required, to stop a rider and ask them to refasten a chin strap which has become unfastened again without penalty to the rider.
- 2. Attire. Riders are required to wear conservatively colored coats (black, blue, green, gray or brown) which are free from adornment which in the judge's opinion is overly distracting. Shirts must have a choker, similar collar or tie. Breeches may be buff, canary, tan, rust or white. *Riders may wear a safety vest either over or in lieu of a coat.*
- 3. Formal Attire. Riders are required to wear scarlet or dark coats, white shirts with white stock; white, buff or canary breeches and protective headgear. See GRB01.2. *Riders may wear a safety vest either over or in lieu of a coat*. Members of the Armed Services or the Police may wear the Service Dress Uniform.
- 4. Inappropriate attire. When management permits Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation riders to ride without jackets, riders must wear traditional short or long sleeved riding shirts with chokers similar collar or ties. Polo shirts and full chaps are not permitted except in unjudged warm-up classes. Management or Judge may eliminate an exhibitor who is inappropriately attired.

A maximum of \$2,000 of Hunter Classic and/or USHJA National Hunter Derby, USHJA Pre-Green Incentive, and/or USHJA Pre-Green Challenge prize money, must be paid in the rated Hunter sections of a National competition restricted to Juniors and/or Amateurs. A maximum of \$1,000 of Hunter Classic USHJA National Hunter Derby, USHJA Pre-Green Incentive, and/or USHJA Pre-Green Challenge prize money can be used towards calculating the \$3,000 of required prize money for a National rated competition restricted to Juniors and/or Amateurs.
- c. Premier rated competitions must be held and judged over a minimum of five (5) days on the same competition grounds. A minimum of five fifteen "A" rated Hunter sections listed in GR 313.6 must be offered and. Additionally, a minimum of ten "A" and/or "C" rated hunter sections listed in GR 313.6 must be held and judged, a maximum of four of which can be "C" rated sections. Ladies Side Saddle does not count towards these requirements. a A minimum of two performance classes from two different "A" rated Hunter sections must be scheduled and judged on four of the five days. At Premier rated competitions, "A" rated Hunter sections must be held on two or more days. (Exception: High Performance Working Hunter, Performance Hunter 3'6" and Performance Hunter 3'3"). A minimum of \$24,000 in prize money, including add-back money if any, must be paid in the rated Hunter sections of a Premier competition. A maximum of \$5,000 of Hunter Classic, USHJA International Hunter Derby and/or USHJA National Hunter Derby, USHJA Pre-Green Incentive, and/or USHJA Pre-Green Challenge prize money can be used towards calculating the \$24,000 of prize money, including add-back money if any, which must be paid for a Premier rated competition. If an add-back is offered, the minimum required prize money for that section must be guaranteed, and the add-backs must be clearly indicated in the prize list. Exception: If sections are canceled or entries are insufficient to award all prize money, then additional money not awarded must be pooled and redistributed 60% to the champions, and 40% to the reserve champions of the remaining "A" rated hunter sections.

Rated competitions which restrict entries in the rated Hunter sections to juniors and amateurs must be held on a minimum of two consecutive non-school days within the public school system, at the location of the competition, on the same competition grounds. - 1. Full qualifying criteria and Official Specifications will be posted on the Federation website (<u>www.usef.org</u>) at least 30 days prior to the start of the qualifying period.
- 2 4. This competition is designed to encourage the breeding of quality Hunter ponies and the proper basic training for them.
- 3 2. Eligibility. In order to compete in the U.S. Pony Hunter Championship, the pony must be recorded with the Federation and registered with USHJA on or before the first day of the competition. The owner must be an Active member of the Federation and USHJA.
- a. The pony must be recorded with the Federation and registered with USHJA at the time of qualification and on or before the first day of the Championship.
- b. The owner of record of the pony must be an Active member in good standing of the Federation and USHJA, i.e. ponies must be shown in accordance with GR1102 and GR1108 in order to be eligible to qualify.
- a. A pony must win a Championship or Reserve Championship in a "AA" or "A" rated Regular Pony Hunter section. The pony must be recorded with the Federation and registered with the USHJA at the time of the win in order for the Championship or Reserve Championship to count. Sections held after July 1 will count toward next year's competition. Ponies that are Champions in their respective sections at the previous year's competition may return without qualifying. The owner of record of the pony must be an Active member in good standing of the Federation and USHJA, i.e., ponies must be shown in accordance with GR1102, GR1108, in order to be eligible to qualify. Pony Finals host sites will comply with the rules designated by the Federation. and the Federation Pony Hunter Committee.
- b. Green Pony Hunters qualify by winning a Championship or Reserve Championship in an "AA" or "A" rated Green Pony Hunter section between December 1 and July 1 of the current competition year. A Green Pony Hunter who has qualified for the Finals in the Green Hunter Pony section and the Regular Pony Hunter section may not compete in both. Green Pony Hunters must declare the section in which they will compete when completing their entry blank. They must qualify in the Regular Pony Hunter section after July 1 in order to be qualified for the next competition year.

3. Phases.

- a. Competition will be conducted in three separate phases: In-Hand, Under Saddle and Over Fences. In determining each pony's total score, the Model will count 25%, Under Saddle 25% and Over Fences 50%. The competition will consist of six pony hunter sections: small green pony, medium green pony and large green pony, small pony, medium pony and large pony. Green ponies may qualify within their green year from December 1 to July 1 to compete in the green pony hunter division.
- b. In-Hand. Judged on conformation, way of moving and soundness.
- c. Under Saddle. To be shown at the walk, trot and canter both ways of the ring. Riders may be asked for an extended trot. Ponies to stop easily and stand quietly. Light contact with pony's mouth is required. Judged on performance and soundness. Manners and suitability of a pony to rider will be emphasized. Extreme speed is penalized.
- 1. In the Under Saddle phase, the ponies in each division will be split into groups of 12 or less. Each pony will be judged and given a score based on its performance in its group. At the discretion of the judges, the ponies in any one division may be called back to hack together.
- d. Over Fences. To be shown over a minimum of eight fences at the required height (Note—Large green ponies to jump at 2'9" in the competition). Judged on performance and soundness. Manners and suitability of a pony to rider will be emphasized. Extreme speed is penalized.
- e. The same junior exhibitor is required to show an entry in all phases of the competition but need not be the same one that handled the pony in any phases of a qualifying event. The same junior exhibitor may ride a small, medium and large pony in the competition but not more than one pony in any one division.
- 4. Judging Procedure. A total of six judges will officiate. Three judges will judge the model phase simultaneously but independently of each other and each of the three judges will give each pony a model score. Three additional judges will judge the under saddle phase simultaneously but independently of each other and each of the three judges will give every pony an under saddle score. Prior to the over fences phase, each pony's scores for the Model and Under Saddle phases are totaled and announced. All six judges will judge the over fences phase in three panels of two judges each. Each panel will submit a separate score for each pony. During the over fences phase, the Open Numerical Scoring System is used: after a pony completes the course, each panel's score for the round is immediately shown. The total overall score for each pony is then calculated as soon as it has completed the last phase.

HU182 US Junior Hunter [CHAPTER SUBCHAPTER HU-11 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS]

- 1. Full qualifying criteria and Official Specifications will be posted on the Federation website (<u>www.usef.org</u>) at least 30 days prior to the start of the qualifying period.
- 2 4. This competition is designed to encourage and promote the basic training and development of Junior Hunters. The National Championship must be offered for the Junior Hunter 3'6". The Junior Hunter 3'3" section may be offered in addition to the 3'6" section.
- 32. Eligibility.
- a. The horse must be recorded with the Federation and registered with USHJA at the time of qualification and on or before the first day of the Championship.
- b. The owner of record of the horse must be an Active member in good standing of the Federation and USHJA, i.e. horses must be shown in accordance with GR1102 and GR1108 in order to be eligible to qualify.
- c. A horse must win a Championship or Reserve Championship in an "A" Rated Junior Hunter section during the qualifying period, and/or be in the top 10 in their zone in any of the four Junior Hunter sections based on the competition results received on the final day of the qualifying period. The qualifying period will be posted on the Federation website a minimum of thirty (30) days before the commencement of the qualifying period.
- d. The horse must be recorded with the Federation and registered with the USHJA at the time of the win for the Championship or Reserve Championship to count.
- e. Horses that are champion at the previous year's competition may return without qualifying providing that they are properly entered to compete.
- 3. Phases.
- a. The competition will be conducted in three separate phases: Under Saddle to count 20%, Handy Hunter to count, 40%, and a single Classic Round to count 40%.
- b. To determine the winner, scores must be calculated based on the total of the combination of all three phases after the percentages of each phase have been calculated.
- c. Under Saddle. To be shown at a walk, trot, and canter both ways of the Ring. Horses are to hand gallop one direction, halt and back. Light contact with the horse's mouth is required. Judged on performance and soundness. Manners and suitability to be emphasized. See HU182.4 for judging procedure. d. Handy Hunter. Obstacles should simulate those found in trappy hunt country. The course must have at least two changes of direction and at least one combination. Horses are required to trot over one fence on the course, may be asked to lead over one obstacle or open a gate while mounted. Emphasis shall be placed on "handiness" for this round.
- e. Classic Round. The course must maintain at least ten obstacles, have two changes of direction and at least one combination. There shall be one single over on the course that shall be ridden at the gallop. Emphasis shall be placed on "brilliance" for this round.
- f. In the Under Saddle Phase, horses shall be judged in-groups of twelve or less. Each horse shall be judged and given a score based on its performance in the group.
- g. In the Handy Hunter and Classic Round each entry will be given a numerical score based on its performance.
- h. The same junior exhibitor is required to show an entry in all phases of the competition. The competition will be split into Small and Large Sections and each section will also be split by age. The same junior exhibitor may show one small and one large entry.
- i. Ties will be broken based on the score of the judge that is designated as judge number one for each phase of competition. If a tie still exists for the overall standings, the score from the Classic Phase will break such tie.
- 4. Judging Procedure. Three judges will judge each phase simultaneously but independently of each other. Each judge will give every entry a score for each phase. Prior to the Handy Hunter and Classic Round, each entry's score in the previous phase shall be totaled and announced. During the over fence phase, the Open Numerical Scoring System is used. After each entry completes the course each judge'sscore for the round is immediately shown or announced. The total overall score for each entry is then calculated as soon as it has completed the last phase.

6. Competition Special Requirements.

a. Horses are required to be stabled on the competition grounds a minimum of 12 hours before the start of the competition.

b. Commencing 12 hours prior to the start of the competition and continuing until through competing, only the competition rider may ride his/her entry. These riders must wear their competition number at all times anywhere on the grounds whenever mounted.

c. Failure to comply with these rules will result in elimination if deemed appropriate by an appeals jury which will be compiled of one of the competition's Federation Stewards, a member of the Federation staff, and the competition manager.

d. The U.S. Junior Hunter National Championships may be split into two Championships. One on the eastern side of the U.S. and one on the western side of the U.S. Qualified horses may compete in either Championship but the horse's owners or their agent must declare which one they will be competing in as they are only allowed to compete in one or the other but not both in any one year. Riders may ride one large and one small on both coasts. Qualification and points will be the same for both eastern and western championships.

7. Grant Fund.

One or more grants may be awarded to one or more riders who qualify to compete at the U.S. Junior Hunter National Championships, based on a completed application, including a one to two page essay, at the full discretion of the selection committee. The Grant Fund application form must be included in the prize list of the competition.

5-8. Zone or Regional Championships.

- a. The Chairman of each Zone may request permission of the USHJA to hold a Zone or Regional Championship section—for the riders of each Zone who have won a Champion or Reserve at an "A" rated Junior Hunter division within the previous competition year. Specifications for these championships will be posted on the USHJA website (www.ushja.org) at least 30 days prior to the start of the qualifying period.
- b. Two or more Zone Chairmen may request permission to hold a Regional Championship section including several zones.
- c. Application must be made to the USHJA office at least sixty days in advance of the holding of the section.
- d. The location of these sections is subject to the approval of the Federation.

e. The Championships are conducted under the same regulations as the U.S. Junior Hunter National Championship. (Exception: All points awarded are based on "AA" point values as per GR1131.5)

"A" rated Hunter sections must be held on two or more days. (Exception: High Performance Working Hunter, Performance Hunter 3'6" and Performance Hunter 3'3"). A minimum of \$24,000 in prize money, including add-back money if any, must be paid in the rated Hunter sections of a Premier competition. A maximum of \$5,000 of Hunter Classic, USHJA International Hunter Derby, USHJA Pony Hunter Derby and/or USHJA National Hunter Derby prize money can be used towards calculating the \$24,000 of prize money, including add-back money if any, which must be paid for a Premier rated competition. If an add-back is offered, the minimum required prize money for that section must be guaranteed, and the add-backs must be clearly indicated in the prize list. Exception: If sections are canceled or entries are insufficient to award all prize money, then additional money not awarded must be pooled and redistributed 60% to the champions, and 40% to the reserve champions of the remaining "A" rated hunter sections.

At Premier or National rated competitions zone bonus points will be awarded as follows, 1st 75, 2nd 60, 3rd 54, 4th 45, 5th 38, 6th 30, 7th 23 and 8th 15, 9th 10, 10th 7, 11th 5, 12th 3. At Regional I or Regional II rated competitions, Zone bonus points will be awarded as follows: 1st 50, 2nd 40, 3rd 35, 4th 30, 5th 25, 6th 20, 7th 15, 8th 10, 9th 7, 10th 5, 11th 3, 12th 2. Zone bonus points will be awarded as per a specifications which are found on the USHJA website.
- 6. 7. Prize Money must be distributed in accordance with the official USHJA Class Specifications at www.ushja.org.
- 7. 8. Riders, owners and trainers must be current active members of USEF and USHJA to participate in this class. (See GR202). Horses and ponies must be registered with the USHJA to participate in this class. - b) National HOTY bonus points and money won will only be awarded for placing in a USHJA IHD Welcome Stake if the owner is a current Active member of the Federation and USHJA and the horse is recorded with the Federation and registered with USHJA.
- 5. National HOTY bonus points and money won will be awarded for a USHJA International Hunter Derby Welcome Stake as determined by USHJA.

SUBCHAPTER HU-1 DEFINITIONS AND ELIGIBILITY

e. Pre-Green Reinstatement. A Pre-Green reinstatement may be granted one time. A horse is not eligible for a Pre-Green reinstatement if it has competed over fences set at 3'7" in height or higher in Hunter or Hunter/Jumping Seat Equitation classes or sections held at a USEF or Equine Canada Licensed competition in North America. "A" rated Hunter sections must be held on two or more days. (Exception: High Performance Working Hunter, Performance Hunter 3'6" and Performance Hunter 3'3"). Exception: Local Competitions, competitions restricted to a particular breed, and exceptions listed in GR901.9.
- 2. USHJA Horse Registrations
- a. All horses competing in Federation *licensed and/or USHJA sanctioned* non-breed restricted licensed competitions with *H*unter, *H*unter *B*reeding, *J*umper and *H*unter/*Jumping S*eat *E*quitation classes *not restricted by breed* (except those activities enumerated in GR901.9, items 1-9) must be properly identified *in accordance with GR1101*, and must obtain a Registration Number from *also be registered with* USHJA (see *GR1101.1*). A The USEF/USHJA registration number for each horse must be entered on all entry forms for licensed competitions. Only one Registration Number will be issued per horse, and must remain with the horse throughout its career. Anyone knowingly applying for a duplicate Registration Number for an individual horse may be subject to disciplinary action. The Federation and/or USHJA as applicable must be notified of any change of ownership and/or competition name of the horse. Owners are requested to notify the Federation and/or USHJA as applicable of corrections to previously submitted information, e.g., names, addresses, breed registration, pedigree, or markings.
- b. Applications for *USHJA* Registration Numbers can be completed online at www.ushja.org or www.usef.org using the *USEF* Horse Registration application form. The Horse application—*This* form is also available from the USHJA or Federation office, or it can be as a downloaded from the USHJA or Federation website or from competition management. Competition management is responsible for notifying exhibitors of this requirement in their prize list.
- 3.1 In addition to the provisions of JP 100.2, on or after December 1, 2017, all horses competing in classes that require USHJA horse registration must provide a microchip number that verifies their animal's identity in order to compete for points, money won or be eligible for Federation and/or USHJA programs and awards where horses are required to be recorded or registered.
- 3.2 A microchip used to verify identity must be a fifteen digit ISO compliant 11784/11785 chip and be implanted in the nuchal ligament of the animal.
- 3.3 For classes that require age verification, age can be verified only through the following identification documents:
- a. registration papers or passport issued by a world breed federation sport horse (WBFSH) recognized registry.
- b. registration papers or Certificate of Pedigree from a breed or sport horse registry.
- 3.4 This rule will have a transition period from December 1, 2017 to November 30, 2018. During this period, animals that are not in compliance with this rule will not receive points or be eligible for Federation and/or USHJA programs and awards. After this period, all horses that are competing in classes which require USHJA registration which are not microchipped will be ineligible to compete in Federation licensed competitions.

INTENT

Horse identification is important to both consumer confidence and the future of our sport. This rule provides a structured roll out for implementation of horse identification through initial registration and recordings, transfers and name changes. It also requires verifiable identification for animals that compete in age or breed restricted sections. Owners of animals that are already entered into the system would not be required to identify their animal unless a name change or transfer are requested. Owners may request identification on a voluntary basis.

Dark, muted or similar colored, or red (scarlet) coats are required; team or sponsored coats of different colors are also permitted (*Exception: a safety vest may be worn in lieu of a coat);* white or fawn breeches; a white tie, choker (unless the shirt, by design, has the chocker *choker* built in for its intended use) or hunting stock, and a white or lightly colored shirt must be worn. Shirts must have a white collar and white cuffs. Shirts must be fastened at the neck and tucked into breeches. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boots being worn. Members of the Armed Services or the police may wear the service dress uniform, with protective headgear. (See General Rules, GR801.2)
- b. Proper Jumper Attire. Coats of any color are required. (*Exception: a safety vest may be worn in lieu of a coat*). Breeches must be light color (white, fawn or canary). Pastel and dark colored breeches are not allowed. Shirts, light in color, must be tucked into breeches and fastened at the top of the neck. Ties or chokers of any color must be worn (unless the shirt, by design, has the choker built in for its intended use). Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boots being worn.
- c. Standard Jumper Attire. Coats are not required. Breeches of any color are permitted. Shirts (polo shirts are permitted) must have collars and sleeves (sleeves may be either long or short), and must be tucked into breeches. Sleeveless shirts and shirts with exposed hoods are prohibited. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boots being worn.
- d. In extreme weather conditions, the use of jackets, sweaters or raincoats can be allowed by management and/or permission from the Jumper Judge/s. Permission must be granted before entering the competition ring.
- e. In cases where the above requirements are not followed, the penalty will be either a possible warning (for the first offence) or elimination.
