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

#### 2020 COMMUNICATIONS OVERVIEW





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USHJA COMPETITIVE PROGRAMS AND SPECIAL CLASSES	

## 2021 ZONE 1 HUNTER, JUMPER AND EQUITATION SPECIFICATIONS (CT, MA, ME, NH, RI, VT)

In accordance with GR1111.4: Canada and NY are contiguous states. For contiguous state points New York includes New Jersey. Contiguous points earned in USEF/Equine Canada licensed competitions will only receive national points in USEF rated divisions.

#### JUDGING FOR ALL HUNTER SECTIONS:

- To be judged on performance and soundness, suitability to count.
- Horses and Ponies are not required to jog for soundness.

#### **ELIGIBILITY FOR ADULT AMATEURS: HUNTER, JUMPER AND EQUITATION:**

• To be ridden by exhibitors who have reached their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday as of December 1 of the current competition year and who hold a current USEF Amateur certification. Open to horses and ponies.

#### ELIGIBILITY FOR CHILDREN'S SECTIONS: HUNTER, JUMPER AND EQUITATION:

• To be ridden by exhibitors who have not reached their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday as of December 1 of the current competition year.

#### **ADULT AMATEUR HUNTER**

#### **Sections offered and requirements:**

Adult Amateurs – may be split into three (3) sections

#### **Cross Entry:**

#### **Riders:**

Riders may cross enter between the Adult Amateur Hunter and the Amateur Owner section if the rider owns the horse he or she is showing in the Adult Amateur section.

#### **Horses:**

Horses may not cross enter between the Adult Amateur and Amateur Owner Hunter sections at the same show.

#### **Horse and Rider Combination:**

Horse-and-rider combination is not eligible for any other USEF rated classes in which fence height exceeds 3'0" (exception: Equitation 3'3", USHJA National Hunter Derby).

#### Fence height:

- 3'0" with spreads not to exceed the fence height.
- Courses will not be adjusted for ponies.
- Combinations will be permitted.

#### **Combining/Dividing Sections:**

May be split into three sections:

- Adult Amateurs 18–35
- Adult Amateurs 36–49
- Adult Amateurs 50 & over

Adult Amateur Hunter sections may be combined if there are fewer than six (6) entries in a section. If there are six (6) or more entries in each divided section, the divided sections must be held separately. Adult Amateur Hunter and Children's Hunter may be combined if there are fewer than three (3) entries in either section.

#### Awards:

Zone Horse of the Year Awards will be presented annually to the following sections:

- Adult Amateur Hunter 18- 35
- Adult Amateur 36-49
- Adult Amateur 50 & over

#### **LOW ADULT AMATEUR HUNTER**

#### **Eligibility:**

Open to exhibitors who have reached their 18th birthday as of December 1 of the current competition year.

#### **Cross Entry:**

#### **Riders:**

Riders may not cross enter into any class or section at the same competition where fences exceed 2'9".

#### **Fence Height:**

• 2'6"

#### Awards:

Zone Horse of the Year Awards will be presented annually to the following section:

• Low Adult Amateur Hunter

#### **ADULT AMATEUR JUMPER**

#### **Sections offered and requirements:**

- Low Adult Amateur Jumper
- High Adult Amateur Jumper

#### **Cross Entry:**

#### Rider:

Riders may not compete in any other class at the same competition where fences exceed 1.15m except the USEF Talent Search Class.

#### Horse/Pony

Horses may show at 1.40m or below with another rider.

#### **Horse and Rider Combination:**

Horse/rider combinations may enter only one classic, if both Low and High are offered.

#### **Fence Height:**

- Low Adult Amateur Jumper .90m 1.00m
- High Adult Amateur Jumper 1.10m- 1.15m

#### **Combining/Dividing Sections:**

Sections may be divided by age of rider or by horse/pony and may also be combined with Children's Jumper if so stated in the prize list.

#### Awards:

Zone Horse of the Year Awards will be presented annually to the following sections:

- Low Adult Amateur Jumper
- High Adult Amateur Jumper

#### **CHILDREN'S HUNTER HORSE**

#### Sections offered and requirements:

- Children's Hunter Horse 14 & Under
- Children's Hunter Horse 15- 17

#### **Cross Entry:**

#### Rider:

Riders cannot cross enter into any class where fences exceed 3'3" (exception: Equitation, Children's Jumpers, Pony Jumpers and the USHJA National Hunter Derby).

#### Horses/Ponies:

n/a

#### Horse and rider combination:

n/a

#### **Fence Height:**

- 3'0" with spreads not to exceed fence height
- Combinations will be permitted unless combined with Children's Hunter Pony.

#### **Combining/Dividing Sections:**

The Children's Hunter Horse section may be divided by age of rider: Children's Hunter Horse 14 & Under and Children's Hunter Horse 15- 17.

If there are fewer than three (3) entries in either age section, the two sections must be combined. The Children's Hunter Horse section may be combined with the Children's Hunter Pony, when there are fewer than three (3) entries in either section.

Alternatively, the Children's Hunter Horse section may be combined with the Adult Amateur section when there are fewer than three (3) entries in either section. The Children's Hunter (horse & pony) section may be combined with the Adult Amateur section when there are fewer than three (3) entries in either section.

When sections are combined and there are more than 16 total entries, the sections must be divided utilizing a Floating split, or a California split to create an even division of entries.

#### Awards:

Zone Horse of the Year Awards will be presented annually to the following sections:

- Children's Hunter Horse 14 & Under
- Children's Hunter Horse 15-17

#### LOW CHILDREN'S HUNTER HORSE

#### **Eligibility:**

Open to exhibitors who have not yet reached their 18th birthday as of December 1 of the current competition year.

#### **Cross Entry**:

#### **Riders:**

Riders may not cross enter at the same competition into the Children's Hunter, Pony Hunter or any class/section where fences exceed 2'9".

#### **Fence Height:**

• 2'6"

#### Awards:

Zone Horse of the Year Awards will be presented annually to the following section:

• Low Children's Hunter Horse

#### **CHILDREN'S HUNTER PONY**

## **Sections offered and requirements:**

- Small/Medium Children's Pony
- Large Children's Pony

# **Cross Entry:**

#### Rider:

Riders may only show one pony in either the 2'0" or the 2'6" height of the Children's Pony Hunter sections(s) when also competing on multiple ponies in the Regular or Green Pony Hunter sections(s). Riders may only show one pony in the Regular or Green Pony Hunter sections when competing on multiple ponies in the Children's Pony Hunter section(s) (exception: Model and Under Saddle classes).

## Horse/Pony

Ponies cannot cross enter into Regular and/or Green Pony Hunter section at the same competition.

#### **Horse and Rider Combination**

n/a

#### **Fence Height:**

- Small/Medium Ponies: 2'0" with spreads not to exceed height of fence
- Large Ponies: 2'6" with spreads not to exceed height of fence
- Distances will not be adjusted
- Combinations will not be permitted

# **Combining/Dividing Sections:**

The Children's Hunter Pony section may be divided by size. If the Children's Hunter Pony is offered divided by size it will be divided: Children's Hunter Pony Small/Medium and Children's Hunter Pony Large.

If there are fewer than three (3) entries in either height section, the two sections must be combined. The Children's Hunter Pony section may be combined with Children's Hunter Horse when there are fewer than three (3) entries in either section.

The Children's Hunter (horse & pony) section may be combined with the Adult Amateur section when there are fewer than three (3) entries in either section.

When sections are combined and there are more than 16 total entries, the sections must be divided utilizing a Floating split, or a California split to create an even division of entries.

- Children's Hunter Pony Large

# **Combining/Dividing Sections:**

Sections may be divided by age of rider or by horse/pony and may also be combined with Adult Amateur if so stated in the prize list.

- High Children's Jumper

To be judged on performance and soundness, suitability to count.

# **Cross Entry:**

No cross entry restrictions for the horse and rider.

## **Fence Height:**

- Equitation 11 & Under:
  - Minimum 2'0", maximum 2'6" management must state height at which class will be offered.
  - Management may offer multiple height options if stated in the prize list, but each course must be set at the same height throughout.
  - o Course design must comply with EQ108.8 and 108.11, combinations not permitted.
- Equitation 12- 14:
  - Minimum 2'9", maximum 3'3" management must state height at which class will be offered.
  - Management may offer multiple height options if stated in the prize list, but each course must be set at the same height throughout.
  - o Course design must comply with EQ108.8 and 108.11, combinations not permitted.
- Equitation 15- 17:
  - Minimum 3'0", maximum 3'6" management must state height at which class will be offered.
  - Management may offer multiple height options if stated in the prize list, but each course must be set at the same height throughout.
  - o Course design must comply with EQ108.8 and 108.11, combinations not permitted.

# **Combining/Dividing Sections:**

Age-Group Equitation Sections may be combined as necessary, jumping at their respective heights, to meet the three (3) entry minimum requirement for points to be awarded.

Stallions are prohibited when adult equitation sections are combined with children's/junior equitation sections. EQ101.3.



## **USHJA Zone HOTY Year End Award Program**

## I. MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- A. Horse owner, rider and trainer must be Active/Competing members of USHJA and USEF. Membership must be active on or before the first day of competition as outlined in the USEF rulebook.
- B. Horses must be recorded with USEF and registered with USHJA.
- C. The competition year is December 1 through November 30.

## II. POINTS

- A. The points will be based on the current increment system for Premier (AA), National (A), Regional I (B) and Regional II (C) rated competitions established by USEF.
- B. Points accumulated in a state or country contiguous to an owner's home zone may be counted toward Horse of the Year points at both the zone and national level. If a contiguous state or country offers a section that is not offered by the owner's home zone, points will not count at the zone level, but they will be counted towards USEF national HOTY awards.
- C. USHJA zone points can only be accrued if the competition follows the zone specifications.
- D. The high performance, green, young hunter, amateur owner, conformation hunter, junior hunter, pony hunter and classics are awarded USHJA zone points as well as national USEF points. USHJA zone points are only awarded in contiguous states if horse and rider are competing in a section offered by their home zone. The USHJA zone points for the high performance hunter, green, amateur owner, conformation hunter, junior hunter and pony hunter divisions are based on the Regional I rated points chart, regardless the rating of the competition.

## **USHJA Zone HOTY Championship Program**

## I. ZONE HOTY CHAMPIONSHIP

- A. Competitor Qualifying Criteria
  - 1. HOTY Championship classes are open to all competitors who meet the Section I Minimum Eligibility Requirements.
- B. In order to earn Zone Championship Points, the owner or recorded leasee of the horse must reside within the Zone.
  - 1. In Hunter and Jumper sections the owner or recorded leasee of the horse must reside within the Zone in order to participate in the Zone Championship and receive Championship Points.
  - 2. In Equitation sections the rider must reside within the Zone in order to participate in the Zone Championship and receive Championship Points.
- C. Each USHJA Zone HOTY Championship must offer a minimum of six Zone HOTY sections. Complementary sections may be combined if there are not at least three entries in each section. Please note the age groups offered may vary for each zone. All sections must be run in accordance with the Zone Specifications.
- D. Eligible riders may participate in two Championships within the same zone.

## II. ZONE CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION FORMAT

- A. A Zone HOTY Championship host must apply for a two year competition agreement.
- B. The Zone HOTY Championship must be offered under the Section or Classic Format.

### 1. Hunter:

- A. Section Format:
  - 1. Must be offered with a minimum of two over fences classes and one under saddle as defined in HU150.
  - 2. Management may designate classes of an existing section that will count for the USHJA Zone Championship Points. Additional classes are not required to be held for the USHJA Zone HOTY Championship.
  - 3. Eligible exhibitors that place 1<sup>st</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> in each class will receive Zone HOTY Championship Points. Zone HOTY Championship Points will be awarded for Champion and ReserveChampion.
- B. Classic Format:
  - 1. Must be offered with two over fences classes as part of the Classic.
  - 2. Eligible exhibitors that place 1<sup>st</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> in the second round of the Hunter Classic will receive Zone HOTY Championship Points.

## 2. Jumper

- A. Section Format:
  - 1. May be offered as two or three individual classes.
  - Management may designate classes of an existing section that will count for the USHJA Zone Championship Points. Additional classes are not required to be held for the USHJA Zone HOTY Championship.

- 3. Eligible exhibitors that place 1<sup>st</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> in each class will receive Zone HOTY ChampionshipPoints.
- B. Classic Format:
  - 1. May be offered in a two round/one jump-off Jumper Classic.
  - 2. Eligible exhibitors that place 1st-8th for the Championship overall placings in the Classic.

### 3. Equitation

- A. Section Format
  - 1. Must be offered at two over fences classes and one undersaddle.
  - 2. Management may designate classes of an existing section that will count for the USHJA Zone Championship Points. Additional classes are not required to be held for the USHJA Zone HOTY Championship.
  - 3. Eligible exhibitors that place 1<sup>st</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> in each class will receive Zone HOTY Championship Points. Zone HOTY Championship Points will be awarded for Champion and Reserve Champion.
- C. If the competition charges exhibitors an additional fee ("Armband Fees") to compete in the Zone HOTY Championship, a minimum of 3 Zone Championship exhibitors must pay the additional fee and compete in order for the Zone HOTY Championship Points to be awarded.

### III. HOTY CHAMPIONSHIP POINTS

- A. Classic format is defined as one zone Championship class, per section, running as a two round class. The eligible exhibitors that place 1st 8th in the second round will receive the Zone HOTY Championship Points listed under the Classic Format. In order to receive points a minimum of three exhibitors are needed to compete for Championship Points to be awarded. If held as a stand-alone class, the Zone Championship class format does not follow the HU174, rules.
- B. If a competition uses a Classic Format and runs the class concurrently, the Classic will need to follow HU174, including the minimum of six entries. Competition management will pull the eligible Zone Championship exhibitors from the classic and re-pin. This Zone Championship class will then follow the minimum of three entries to obtain points. These exhibitors will receive the regular points for the classic and the additional points from the Zone Championship class.
- C. A minimum of three exhibitors must compete at a Zone HOTY Championship in order for Zone HOTY Championship Points to be awarded to follow HU150.
- D. The definition of compete for Hunters and Age Group Equitation is in accordance with HU119 and the definition of compete for Jumpers is in accordance with JP135.13.
- E. Hunter Zone HOTY Championship Point Chart

## VI. ADDITIONAL FEES ("Armband Fees") FOR ZONE HOTY CHAMPIONSHIPENTRIES

- A. Host Competitions may only charge additional fees ("Armband Fees") to participate in the USHJA Zone HOTY Championship under the following conditions:
  - 1. The fees are included in the qualifying criteria developed by each Zone and approved by the USHJA.
  - 2. The fees in the qualifying criteria are being assessed to benefit the Zone.
  - 3. The fees are remitted to the USHJA within 10 days of the conclusion of the competition.
- B. If qualifying criteria is not developed by the Zone, no additional fees may be charged.

Please contact USHJA if questions arise pertaining to the USHJA HOTY Championship cannot be answered by the show steward, management or the zone committee representative based on the class specifications provided (USHJA Phone: 859-225-6700).

The USHJA Zone HOTY Championship and the related format and specifications are the sole properties of the USHJA and may only be held, conducted or used upon the terms and conditions specified by the USHJA. USHJA reserves the right to change language in documents related to the conduct of the USHJA Zone HOTY Championship as necessary for the purposes of consistency and clarity. Any USHJA Zone HOTY Championship which is not conducted in accordance with the USEF Rules and Zone Specifications will not count for Championship Points. Any deviations from the class specifications for the USHJA Zone HOTY Championship are not permitted without the express written permission from USHJA prior to the printing of the prize list.

For any rules not specified above, please refer to the current USEF Rule Book.

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### **USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championship Specifications**

- 1.10/1.15m Children's and Adult Amateur Jumper
- 1.20/1.25m Junior and Amateur Jumper
- 1.30/1.35m Junior and Amateur Jumper

### I. MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- A. Eligible athletes must be a current active USEF and USHJA member in good standing (see GR201 & JP 100.1) from the time of application until conclusion of event.
- B. The horse must be registered with USHJA (see JP 100.2) and recorded with USEF pursuant to USEF GR 1102, in good standing under USEF rules.
- C. The burden of proof of eligibility to compete will rest with and be the sole responsibility of the owner or athlete, and not of the USHJA. USHJA staff is not available to determine each horse's or athlete eligibility.
- D. The zone of each Athlete is determined by the athlete's point state as recorded with USEF as of December 1, 2020 (see JP 100.5)
- E. Athletes wishing to participate in the USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championships complete and submit an application online at <a href="https://www.ushja.org/zonejumper">www.ushja.org/zonejumper</a> no later than 45 days prior to the start of their respective Championship. The applicants must certify that they meet the qualification and eligibility conditions delineated herein.
  - Early Application: December 1 through April 10. Non-refundable fee of \$75 per horse.
  - Late Application: April 11 through 45 days before each Zone or Combined Zone Championship. Non-refundable fee of \$150 per horse.
- F. Refer to "Zone Eligibility Requirements" for important dates and deadlines.

### II. QUALIFICATION REQUIREMENTS FOR ATHLETE/HORSE COMBINATIONS

- A. An athlete and/or horse is eligible to compete in only <u>one height section</u> and on <u>one team</u> at the Zone Jumper Team Championships:
  - 1.10/1.15m Children's and Adult Amateur Jumper Championship
  - 1.20/1.25m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championship
  - 1.30/1.35m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championship
  - If qualified and eligible, an athlete may compete on a different horse in the Platinum Jumper Championships.
- B. In order to be eligible for the Zone Jumper Team Championships, athlete/horse combinations must earn a minimum of 20 points in their respective section(s) at USEF licensed competitions held with fence heights of that section 45 days prior the start of their championship.

- C. The point standings (ranking) in each zone from 30 days following the conclusion of the previous year's Zone Jumper Team Championship to 45 days prior to the start of the current year's Championship, will be used to determine the athlete/horse combinations acceptance to compete in that zone's championships. Ties will be decided by determining which athlete/horse combination has the most first place finishes in the classes specified below at their respective height.
- D. Zone Jumper Team Championships must accept up to a maximum of 192 athlete/horse combinations. A maximum of eight teams per section will be accepted.
- E. Athlete/horse combinations wishing to compete in the 1.10/1.15m Championship may not have competed in a class held at a height over 1.25m within the current qualifying period up through the championship. Athletes may not have competed in a class held at a height over 1.25m within the current qualifying period up through the championships.
- F. Athlete/horse combinations wishing to compete in the 1.20/1.25m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championship may not have competed in a class held at a height over 1.35m within the qualifying period up through the championship. Athletes may not have competed in a class held at a height over 1.35m within the current qualifying period up through the championship.
- G. Athlete/horse combinations wishing to compete in the 1.30/1.35m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championship may not have competed in a class held at a height over 1.45m within the qualifying period up through the championship. Athletes may not have competed in a class held at a height over 1.45m within the current qualifying period up through the championship.
- H. No athlete will be considered for the Zone Jumper Team Championship that has competed in classes that have heights greater than the maximum height restriction of each section in the current competition year unless a waiver has been granted.

### I. Waiver

- If an athlete has an extenuating circumstance and wishes to apply for a waiver to any of the requirements in Section I, he must apply to the USHJA explaining the circumstances and details. The respective zone-committee will evaluate the request and provide a recommendation to the USHJA Emerging Jumper Rider Task Force which will make the final decision whether to accept or deny the waiver.
- Waivers will not be granted for classes that do not meet the minimum fence height.
- In no case will a waiver include any classes that occur less than 45 days before the Championship when the point standings freeze.
- Waivers will not be granted for Athletes that have jumped over the maximum height restrictions more than 3 times within the qualifying period.
- J. Waivers must be submitted at least 45 days prior to the championships. Any waivers submitted after the deadline will not be considered.

## K. Substitutions

- Once the definite entries are secured, and up to 14 days preceding the Monday of the Championship, if an eligible athlete/horse combination is unable to compete at the Championship, the space will be filled by the next available combination from the frozen point standings list. If a horse is unable to compete and that athlete has another horse that is eligible to compete in the respective championship section and within the standings list cutoff, the substitution will be allowed based on that athlete/horse combinations point standing from the frozen qualified list.
- During the week of the Championship if an entry is not able to compete, the four-member team will be reduced to three. If a three-member team is reduced to two members, those athletes will compete as individuals.
- If a team is unable to field at least three members, the remaining members may compete in the championship as individuals. If there are at least three individuals from different zones in a combined zone championship before the first competition, they may comprise a combined team upon approval of

- the USHJA Jumper Technical Delegate.
- To hold a Zone Jumper Team Championship, a minimum of three teams must be entered in each section or combined section. Teams may be combined by sections, height, combined by zone, and/or combined section, height, and zone.
- It is the intention of the USHJA to allow as much flexibility as possible within the parameters of sound and fair competition, and good sport in the allowance of teams to be made up at events when competitors drop out or are eliminated due to sickness or injury. Example: A horse gets injured in the first class leaving only two athletes. A third athlete is available and riding as an individual. In this case a team can be made up from the three competitors and thus a team could be fielded for the team day.

#### L. Qualifying List

- Athlete/horse combinations for all three heights of the Zone Jumper Team Championships will be accepted from the USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championship Qualifying List found on the USHJA website, www.ushja.org/zonejumper.
- Combined Zones: Each Zone may send up to 16 qualified athlete/horse combinations per section. Should a Zone be unable to send 16 qualified athlete/horse combinations the other competing Zone may send more than their allotted 16 combinations until a maximum of 32 athlete/horse combinations per section have been accepted.

### III. RULES AND REGULATIONS

Horse Rules and Regulations

- A. Horse inspection and jog for soundness
  - Championship horses must be stabled on the show grounds where the championship is being held, in
    official horse show stabling following the completion of the Official Horse Inspection and Jog for Soundness.
    Championship horses must remain on the horse show grounds from the start of the official jog through the
    completion of their Championship.
  - Horses competing in the Championship may not compete in any other class at the same horse show after the Official Jog has taken place.
  - All Championship horses must be presented at the mandatory horse inspection and jog for soundness by the athlete or designated representative. The horse inspection and jog for soundness will be held not more than 24 hours prior to the start of the First Individual Qualifying Class. The exact time and location will be included in the prize list and schedule for each championship.
  - A designated representative for the horse must be present at the horse inspection and jog for soundness. For the purposes of these championships the "designated representative" must be at least 18 and is defined as the rider, trainer, parent/guardian, Chef d'Equipe, or an authorized representative (authorization in writing is required).
  - Each horse must be presented with its entry number. Following the official jog, the assigned back number must accompany the horse/pony at all times when it is out of its stall and must be visible on the stall door when in the stall.
  - Horses not accepted at the horse inspection and jog for soundness will have the opportunity to be represented once prior to the First Individual Qualifying Class.
  - If a horse is not accepted at the initial horse inspection and jog for soundness, they may not participate in the Championship Training Session if it is held prior to the re-inspection. Horses not accepted at the re-inspection and jog for soundness will not be allowed to compete in the Championships. Horses may not participate in any concurrently held competition during which the Championship is held on the same grounds for a period of 48 hours following the horse inspection. (GR914.3)

### B. Tack/ Equipment

USEF Rules: USEF rules will govern these Championships. Additionally, please pay particular attention to the specifics listed below:

### 1. Martingales

- Standing martingales are permitted in the 1.10/1.15m Children's and Adult Amateur Jumper Championship and the 1.20/1.25m Junior and Amateur Jumper Championships
- Only running martingales used in a conventional manner are permitted in the 1.30/1.35m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championships. (JP111.1)
- The use of any other type of martingale will be cause for elimination from that Championship class. Exception: Irish Martingales may be used.
- 2. The use of Draw Reins, German Martingales, Chambons, or any other unconventional equipment are not allowed at any time during the Championships, including schooling. Exception: The use of Draw Reins is permissible during Awards Presentations and Victory Gallops.

### 3. Equipment

- The total maximum weight of equipment allowed to be added to a horse's leg, front or hind (single or multiple boots, fetlock rings, etc.), is 500 grams (shoe excluded). (JP111.5)
- Random or formal boot inspections may be conducted at the discretion of the USHJA Jumper
   Technical Delegate after consultation with the Senior Steward.

## **Athlete Rules and Regulations**

- Although an athlete is not prevented from competing on another horse during the Championship week, there will be no waiting for that athlete/horse during the Championship classes. If an athlete is not immediately available in the order, the athlete will be scratched from that Championship class.
- Failure to enter the ring within one minute of being called incurs elimination. The time limit for entering the ring must be enforced by management. (JP136.2)
- Only the competing athlete may be mounted on the Championship horse after the Official Jog.
- Rider's Meeting: There will be a mandatory rider's meeting and Show Jumping Athlete Pathway Orientation presentation; time and location will be included in the prize list and schedule.
- The draw for the Team Order of Go will take place at the Riders Meeting. Teams will be determined two weeks prior to the Championship.

### A. Schooling

- USEF Jumper Schooling Rules will be in effect 24 hours prior to the start of the first class of the competition until completion of the competition.
- Once the Official horse inspection and jog for soundness is complete, schooling must take place in designated championship schooling areas only.
- The Jumper Technical Delegate will post a Championship Schooling Schedule at the start of the Championship, which will include times and locations.
- Violations of the schooling rules and times will result in possible elimination from the Championships.

## B. Attire (JP111.9)

- 1. Official Horse Inspection and Jog for Soundness and Course Walks
  - Athletes and or designated representatives must be appropriately dressed. Athletes must wear boots, breeches, and a hard hat. A designated representative must be professionally dressed with proper footwear for the Official Horse Inspection and Jog for Soundness.
- 2. Training Class (if offered)
  - Coats are not required. Breeches must be light color (white, fawn or canary). Pastel and dark colored

breeches are not allowed. Shirts (polo shirts are permitted) must have collars and sleeves (sleeves may be either long or short), and must be tucked into breeches. Sleeveless shirts and shirts with exposed hoods are prohibited. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boots being worn. (JP111.9c)

## 3. First Individual Qualifying Competition

 Dark, muted or similar colored coats are required; white breeches; a white tie, choker (unless the shirt, by design, has the choker built in for its intended use) and a white shirt must be worn. Shirts must be fastened at the neck and tucked into breeches. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boots being worn. (JP111.9a)

### 4. Team Competition

• White breeches; Zone team shirts or team polo shirts are permitted. Shirts must have collars and sleeves (sleeves may be either long or short), and must be tucked into breeches. Sleeveless shirts and shirts with exposed hoods are prohibited. If team shirts are not available athletes must follow the dress code for the First Individual Qualifying Competition. Members on each team must all wear coordinated shirts or formal attire. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boot.

#### 5. Individual Final

• Dark, muted or similar colored, coats are required; white breeches; a white tie, choker (unless the shirt, by design, has the choker built in for its intended use) and a white shirt must be worn. Shirts must be fastened at the neck and tucked into breeches. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boots being worn. (JP111.9a)

## IV. MEDICATION RULES

A. USEF Drugs & Medication rules will be in effect for these championships.

### V. REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- A. Passports are not required.
- B. Entrants must comply with the documents and health certificates, if any, required by the organizer, state, and facility where the championship is being held.

#### VI. CHAMPIONSHIP SCHEDULE

There are two format options under which the Championships may be conducted. Host management may choose the option that they feel will work best for the Championship, always keeping the welfare of the horses and athletes as the primary consideration.

Championship Schedule for all height sections

- 1. 1.10-1.15m Children's and Adult Amateur Championship; spreads up to 1.25m
- 2. 1.20-1.25m Junior and Amateur Championship; spreads up to 1.40m
- 3. 1.30-1.35m Junior and Amateur Championship; spreads up to 1.45m
- 4. The speed for all three height sections is 350m/m.

## OPTION ONE – Three Day Format

## A. Day One (First Round of the Team Championship and First Individual Qualifying Class)

- 1. Specifications: The class will be conducted under a Table II, Section 1. Faults and time. The results of this class will be decided by adding together the faults incurred over the course and any penalties for exceeding the Time Allowed. Horses with clear rounds or equal faults are classified according to their time taken to complete the course. Athletes eliminated or retiring from the course for any reason shall receive a score equal to 20 faults more than the highest penalized competitor in that round.
- Individual Classification: Faults from Round One will be carried forward to the Individual Standings and
  Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, all USHJA programs, properties, events and related specifications are subject to change in
  accordance with federal, state and local laws and regulations.

- into Round Two of the Team Championships on Day Two. Ties for non-medal position in the Individual Final will be determined by the time taken on Day One.
- 3. Start Order: The draw for the team start order for the Team Championship will occur at the Rider's Meeting. The order of the individuals on a team will be determined by the Chefs and given to the USHJA representative at the Rider's Meeting. The Chef d'Equipe of teams comprising only three athletes may choose which of the three positions out of the four they will start their athletes.
- 4. Class Awards: Ribbons will be awarded through 8th place. Prize money: 20% of the sections prize money will be paid through 8th as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%.

## B. Day Two (Second Round of the Team Championship/Second Individual Qualifying Class)

 Specifications: The Team Championship is a two round format held over two days. Round two also serves as the second Qualifying Class for the Individual Final. The competitors will be scored under a modified Table II.

## 2. Scoring

- The Second Round of the Team Championship is open only to athlete/horse combinations that have started (whether eliminated or not) in the First Individual Qualifying Class (Day One).
- All athletes will receive a score regardless of elimination and are eligible to compete in both rounds of the Team Competition.
- Athletes eliminated or retiring from the course for any reason shall receive a score equal to 20 faults more than that received by the highest penalized competitor in that round.
- Only the best (lowest) three scores of each team from each round will count toward the team's score.
- The winning team will be the team with the lowest combined scores from the two rounds.
- Any teams tied for a medal shall jump off. The Chefs d'Equipe will select one member from the team for the jump off. The jump off will be scored with faults and time deciding the medal position.
- If jump-offs for multiple medals are required, the jump-off for the lowest medal will occur first.
- Placing of teams tied below medal positions will be decided by the combined times from the three highest place riders on a team from Day One.
- 3. Start Order: The starting order of teams will be the reverse order of team scores from the first round (Day One). Any teams tied will go in the order of their first round drawn order.
  - Athletes competing as individuals will compete first in the second round of the Team Competition.
     The second round order for Individual competitors will be based on reverse order of scores from the first round.
- 4. Class Awards: Medals will be awarded to the Gold, Silver, and Bronze teams, ribbons will be awarded through 3<sup>rd</sup> place, along with any trophy or other prizes that management chooses to award. Gold team must ride for ribbons, Silver and Bronze teams will enter the ring on foot for a podium presentation. Prize money: 15% of the sections prize money will be paid to the Gold, Silver and Bronze winning teams. Prize money will be paid through 3<sup>rd</sup> as follows: 50%, 30%, 20% and divided equally among the team's members. Additionally, ribbons will be awarded through 8<sup>th</sup> to the individual class placings after round one and round two of Team Competition. Prize money: 15% of the sections prize money will be paid through 8<sup>th</sup> to the individual class placings after round one and round two of Team Competition as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%. Ties for individual placing will be broken by the faults from the first round of Team Competition on Day One. If ties remain, the time from Day One will be used.

## C. <u>Day Three (Individual Final)</u>

 Specifications: The competition will conclude with the Individual Final on the third day. It will be scored under Table II Section 2 and held over one round. The top <u>15</u> athlete/horse combinations based on the cumulative scores from the first and second individual qualifying classes, including ties for twentieth place, are eligible to compete. They must have not been eliminated in either of the two rounds of the competition. The list of the

- top <u>15</u> will be posted and distributed as soon as feasible after the Team Competition concludes and medals are awarded. Following this posting, if one or more of the qualified athlete/horse combinations is unable to start in the Individual Final, the combination will not be replaced.
- 2. Start Order: The start order will be the reverse order of total scores incurred in the first and second individual qualifying classes. In the event of equality of scores, the result of the first qualifying class will decide, with a higher scoring athlete/horse combination going before a lower scoring one.
- 3. Jump-Off: In the case of a tie for an individual medal, there will be a jump-off, with the jump off going in the same order as in the Individual Final.
- 4. Class Awards: Gold, Silver, and Bronze medals provided by the USHJA will be awarded to the top three individuals, along with ribbons to 8<sup>th</sup> and other specified prizes or prize money as may be specified by the organizers and the USHJA. Top <u>5</u> overall must ride for ribbons. Gold, Silver, and Bronze Individuals must stay for a podium presentation. Prize money: 50% of the sections prize money will be paid to medal winning individuals as follows: Gold 50%, Silver 30%, Bronze 20%.-The Individual Medalists will be invited to participate in one of the USHJA Gold Star clinics. Please find the most update information about the USHJA Gold Star Clinic at: ushja.org/GoldStarClinics.

## **OPTION TWO - Four Day Format**

### A. Day One (First Individual Qualifying Class)

- 1. Specifications: The class will be conducted under Table II, Section 1. Faults and Time. The results of this class will be decided by adding the faults incurred over the course and any penalties for exceeding the Time Allowed. Horses with clear rounds or equal faults are classified according to the time taken. Athletes eliminated or retiring for any reason will receive a score equal to 20 faults more than the highest penalized competitor in that round.
- 2. Individual Classification: Faults from Round One will be carried forward to the Individual Standings. Faults from all rounds will be carried through to the Individual Final. Ties for non-medal positions in the Individual Final will be determined by the time taken on Day One.
- 3. Start Order: The order will be drawn at the Rider's Meeting.
- 4. Class Awards: Ribbons will be awarded through 8<sup>th</sup>.
- 5. Prize money: 20% of the prize money for the section will be paid as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%.

### B. Day Two (Team Championship and Second and Third Individual Qualifying Classes)

- 1. Specifications: The Team Championship is a two round competition which also serves as the Second and Third Individual Qualifying classes for the Individual Final. This competition will be scored under a modified Table II over two identical rounds.
- 2. Scoring:
  - The Team Championship is open only to athlete/horse combinations that have started (whether eliminated or not) in the First Individual Qualifying Class (Day One).
  - All athletes will receive a score regardless of elimination and are eligible to compete in both rounds of the Team Championship.
  - Athletes eliminated or retiring from the round will receive a score equal to 20 faults more than the score
    of the highest penalized competitor in that round.
  - Only the best three scores of each team from each round will count toward the team score.
  - The winning team will be the team with the lowest combined score from the two rounds.
  - Any teams tied for a medal position will jump off. The Chef d'Equipe will select one member for the team for the jump-off. The jump-off will be scored on faults and time deciding the medal position.
  - If multiple jump-offs are required, the jump-off for bronze will occur first.

- Team placing for non-medal positions that are tied will be decided by the combined times from the three highest placed riders on a team from Day One.
- 3. Start Order: The starting order of teams will be the reverse order of team scores from the first round of the Team Championship. Teams tied will start in the same order as the first round.
  - Athletes competing as individuals will start first in the second round of the Team Championship. The second round order for individuals will be based on reverse order of scores from the first round.
- 4. Class Awards: Medals will be awarded to Gold, Silver and Bronze teams, ribbons awarded through 3<sup>rd</sup>. Gold medal teams must ride for presentations, Silver and Bronze teams will enter the ring on foot for a podium presentation. Additionally, ribbons will be awarded 1<sup>st</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> to the individual class placings from the combined scores from rounds one and two of the Team Championship. Ties for individual placing will be broken by the faults and time from the First Individual Qualifying Class (Day One).
- 5. Prize Money: 15% of the prize money for the section will be paid to the Gold, Silver and Bronze teams as follows: 50%, 30%, 20%. 15% of the prize money for the section will be paid to the top 8 individual class placings after round one and two the Team Championship as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%.

## C. Day Three (Mandatory Rest Day)

## D. <u>Day Four (Individual Final)</u>

- 1. Specifications: The Individual Final will be scored under Table II, Section 2 and held over one round. The top <u>15</u> athlete/horse combinations based on cumulative scores for the first, second and third individual qualifying classes, including ties for <u>15<sup>th</sup></u> place are eligible to compete. They must not have been eliminate in any of the three rounds of the competition. The list of the top <u>15</u> will be posted as soon as feasible following the conclusion of the Team Championship. If one or more of the qualified athlete/horse combinations are unable to start in the Individual Final they will not be replaced.
- 2. Start Order: The start order will be the reverse order of total score form the first, second and third individual qualifying classes. In the event of equality of score, the result of the First Individual Qualifying Class (Day One) will decide, with the lower placing starting before the higher placing.
- 3. Jump-Off: In the case of a tie for an individual medal, there will be a jump-off, with the jump off going in the same order as in the individual final.
- 4. Class Awards: Gold, Silver and Bronze medals will be awarded to the top three individuals, and ribbons through 8<sup>th</sup>. The top <u>5</u> must ride for awards. Medalists will stay for a podium presentation. <u>The Individual Medalists will be invited to participate in one of the USHJA Gold Star clinics. Please find the most update information about the USHJA Gold Star Clinic at: <u>ushja.org/GoldStarClinics</u>. Prize money: 50% of the prize money for the section will be paid to the Gold, Silver and Bronze individuals as follows: 50%, 30%, 20%.</u>

## VII. <u>CUMULATIVE INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIP SCORING</u>

#### OPTION ONE – Three Day Format

- A. First Round of the Team Championship and First Individual Qualifier (Day One): Faults from Round One will be carried forward to the Individual Standings and into Round Two of the Team Championship on Day Two.
- B. Second Round of the Team Championship and Second Individual Qualifier (Day Two): Each individual's score (faults only) from the Day Two Team Championship will be added to the final score from Day One resulting in a cumulative score carried into the Individual Final on Day Three.
- C. Individual Final (Day Three): The Individual Champion is the athlete/horse combination with the lowest total cumulative score from Day One added to Day Two (faults only) and the Individual Final on Day Three (faults only). Jump-off scores from team day will not be a factor. An athlete who is eliminated or who retires from Day Three is eliminated from the Individual Final.
- D. Jump-Off: In the event of equality of faults for an individual medal position, a jump-off will be held, with the Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, all USHJA programs, properties, events and related specifications are subject to change in accordance with federal, state and local laws and regulations.

jump off going in the same order as in the Individual Final. In the event of ties for placings not determined by the jump off (through 8th), the time from Day One will determine the Individual Final result.

### OPTION TWO - Four Day Format

- A. First Individual Qualifier (Day One): Faults from Round One will be carried forward to the Individual Standings.
- B. Team Championship (Day Two): Each individual's first and second round score (faults only) from the Team Championship will be added to the final score from Day One resulting in a cumulative score carried into the Individual Final on Day Four.
- C. Individual Final (Day Four): The Individual Champion is the athlete/horse combination with the lowest total cumulative score from the First Individual Qualifying Class on Day One added to the two rounds on Day Two (faults only) and the Individual Final on Day Four (faults only). Jump-off scores from team day will not be a factor. An athlete who is eliminated or who retires from Day Four is eliminated from the Individual Final.
- D. Jump-Off: In the event of equality of faults for an individual medal position, a jump-off will be held, with the jump off going in the same order as in the Individual Final. In the event of ties for placings not determined by the jump off (through 8th), the time from Day One will determine the Individual Final result.

## VIII. CHEF d'EQUIPE

- A. Individuals will be asked to apply to USHJA to serve as the Recognized and/or Assistant Zone Jumper Team Championship Chef d'Equipe. The applicants must meet the following criteria:
  - 1. Current Active adult member in good standing with USHJA and USEF.
  - 2. Must Adhere to the USHJA Conflict of Interest and Ethics Policy.
  - 3. Agree to attend the designated Zone Jumper Team Championship and fulfill the responsibilities of the position as designated by USHJA.
  - 4. Individuals must have completed the Safe Sport training from the United States Olympic Committee, within the past five (5) years.
  - 5. The Assistant Zone Jumper Team Championship Chef d'Equipe will work closely with the Recognized Zone Show Jumping Chef d'Equipe and the USHJA Show Jumping Technical Advisor.
  - 6. A Recognized and/or Assistant Zone Jumper Team Championship\_Chef d'Equipe may assist a maximum of two teams per section and no more than six teams total.
- B. Zone Committees will select individuals from the USHJA approved list to serve from the submitted applications as the Assistant Zone Jumper Team Championship Chef d'Equipe for each team they send to the championships.

# **Organizer Requirements**

## I. HOST AND ORGANIZER REQUIREMENTS

- A. Competition Conduct
  - 1. Holding a training session is optional for the organizer, and if held is optional for competitors. A course of approximately eight fences will be provided, including one combination. Each entrant will have a maximum of 90 seconds in the arena. Jumps, if taken, must be jumped in the proper direction. The training session, if offered must be scheduled the day prior to the First Individual Qualifier and held in the Championship ring.
  - 2. Courses: Each course must have no fewer than 12 jumping efforts and must include a minimum of two doubles or one triple combination. All of the courses must include a Liverpool. There will be no open water jump for the 1.10/1.15m Children's and Adult Amateur Jumper Championship. However, at the Course Designer's discretion, open water may be used as part of an option fence in the 1.20/1.25m Junior/Amateur Jumper and 1.30/1.35m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championships.
- B. Prize Money

- 1. The maximum total prize money allowed in the USHJA Children's and Adult Amateur Jumper Championship is \$25,000 to each section (children's and adult amateur).
- 2. There is no maximum prize money for either the 1.20/1.25m Junior/Amateur or the 1.30/1.35m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championships. However, the total prize money offered for all three championships must be divided as follows: at least 50% to the 1.30/1.35m Junior/Amateur Championship, 30% to the1.20/1.25m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championship, and 20% to the Children's and Adult Amateur Jumper Championship.
- 3. Within each Championship, prize money must be divided as follows:
  - 20% to the First Individual Qualifying Class. Money to be paid through eighth places as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%
  - 15% to Individual placings after the Team Championship. Money paid to individuals after round one and round two of team day, 1<sup>st</sup> 8<sup>th</sup> as follows; 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%.
  - 15% to Gold, Silver, and Bronze Team Medal winners. Money paid as follows: 50%, 30%, 20%. Prize money for each team will be divided equally among the team's members.
  - 50% to the Individual Final Money paid to Individual Medal winners (as follows: 50%, 30%, 20%).
- 4. Prize money amounts must be listed per class in the Prize List.
- C. Host and Organizer Conditions
  - 1. All Zone Jumper Team Championships and Platinum Championships must be held at a USEF licensed competition.
  - 2. The Zone Jumper Team Championship must be held in the main jumper ring at the competition and receive priority scheduling to be approved by USHJA. Waivers for using a second ring for the Children's/Adult Amateur Jumper Championships may be applied for up to 45 days prior to the start of the first day of the Championship and only due to the amount of Championship riders. The waiver will not be granted to accommodate non-Zone Jumper Team Championship classes in the main competition ring.
  - 3. The championships must be featured at the host venue and may not be relegated to a minor ring or minor time in the schedule. In general, other finals, other championships, or other special competitions at the host event must have the express written permission of the USHJA.
  - 4. There must be a working scoreboard (matrix display, video, or LED) at the ring where the Championships are held along with a technician who operates it.
  - 5. There must be a minimum of two jumper judges (at least one with a large R) with no additional duties during the Championship classes.
  - 6. <u>For the Horse Inspection and Jog for Soundness, the Jumper Technical Delegate (JTD), Official</u> Veterinarian, and the USHJA on-site representative must be present.
  - 7. There must be a field timer with a stopwatch.
  - 8. There must be an announcer with no additional duties during each class.
  - 9. There must be a Certified Jumper Schooling Supervisor on duty in the warm-up arena for the duration of each championship class.
  - 10. The competition will also provide an official scorer, who will review and confirm class placings with the senior judge after each class before publishing, keep track of the cumulative scores and positions of each competitor, The host competition will send results to the USHJA office immediately following each class of each Championship (e-mail to <a href="EJR@ushja.org">EJR@ushja.org</a>).
  - 11. The Jumper Technical Delegate (JTD), who will certify that all rules, specifications, and class conditions are followed, and who will represent the USHJA and be the final authority in all questions that arise regarding the Championships, the Championship logistics, and the schedule. The USHJA JTD will have a check list, a set of instructions and list of specific duties from the USHJA. Management will assist the JTD as necessary to ensure a quality technical event. The JTD will walk all courses and consult with the Course Designer to ensure fair competition.
  - D. Combining and Dividing Sections

- 1. When entries exceed 16 or more competitors in a section, the section must be offered as a separate section. Sections may be combined when there are less than 16 entries per section.
- 2. In order to hold a Zone Jumper Team Championship, three teams must be entered in each section or combined section. Teams may be combined by section, combined by zone, height, and/or combined section, height, and zone.

# **Zone Eligibility Requirements**

#### I. ZONE ELIGIBILITY

- A. Each USHJA zone, which in the previous competition year had at least 60 horses competing and earning zone points in the Children's Jumper section and at least 60 horses competing and earning zone points in the Adult Amateur Jumper section, is eligible to host the Zone Jumper Team Championships.
- B. The three USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championships and Platinum Championships will normally be held together at the same event, except in extraordinary circumstances.

### II. COMBINING ZONES

- A. Zones that do not meet the eligibility criteria delineated in Section I may apply to the USHJA on or before August 1 of the current competition year to obtain permission to have the zone combine with a contiguous zone in the subsequent competition year (or in the case of Zones 11 or 12 combine with either Zone 9 or 10) to conduct a USHJA Combined Zone Jumper Team Championship.
- B. In the case of a zone indicating interest in combining with one of several other contiguous zones, the zone wishing to combine can determine which zone to combine with once the applicable zones select their host venue.
- C. Zones that meet the eligibility requirements outlined in Section I may be permitted to combine with only one contiguous zone to host a combined Zone Jumper Team Championship.
- D. All requests under this section will be addressed on a case-by-case basis by the USHJA Emerging Jumper Rider Task Force and the USHJA Executive Committee whose decision shall be final and cannot be appealed.

#### III. ZONE REVIEW OF HOST APPLICATIONS

- A. General Information
  - The USHJA office will announce the dates when applications for hosting open and close. Application
    documents will be posted on the USHJA website. Completed applications will be sent directly to the
    respective zone committees, whose Jumper members will formally review and discuss them based upon
    their knowledge of the events, the facilities, the amenities, the location, and the criteria. Great care must be
    taken to identify and remove both actual and perceived conflicts of interest among zone committee
    members in the evaluation process in accordance with USHJA policies. Indoor facilities will not be
    considered.
- B. Event Selection
  - USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championships will ideally be held between June 15 and November 17
  - Once a given zone's jumper committee members review the competition host applications, the zone will
    complete a USHJA zone prospective host document (found on the USHJA website), and send it to the USHJA
    on or before September 15 of the current competition year, signifying one or more competitions and dates
    recommended by vote at a zone jumper committee meeting.
  - A new facility which has not held a USEF licensed competition and/or a new competition in its first year of operation will not be considered to host a USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championship.
- C. Events that desire to apply for hosting should specifically state their intention to hold all championships heights, along with the prize money they will commit to offer. Zone jumper committee members must take

this into consideration when selecting a potential host event.

- D. Date and Location Approval
  - The final decision of the location and date for each zone's USHJA Championships will rest entirely with the USHJA, which will review a zone's recommendations and select the date and location on or before February 1 of the current competition year. USHJA will promptly and formally notify each zone committee of its decision as well as the championship host.
- E. Important Dates and Deadlines

Early Application: December 1 – April 10. Non-refundable fee of \$75 per horse Late Application: April 11 – 45 days before each Zone or Combined Zone. Non-refundable fee of \$150 per horse

- 45 days prior to Championships Athlete Applications close, qualifying period ends, invitations sent.
- 21 days prior to Championships Athlete must declare section and Intent to compete. Athletes failing to respond to the invitation by this date are not guaranteed to be placed on a team.
- 21 days prior to Championships Waiver request period ends.
- 14 days prior to Championships Mandatory Chef d'Equipe conference call to approve team configurations. At this point approved teams will be final. No exceptions.
- 10 days prior to Championships Athletes are notified of team selection and teammates.

### IV. NUMBER AND COMPOSITION OF TEAMS

- A. Zone Jumper Team Championships and Combined Zone Jumper Team Championships must accept up to a maximum of 192 athlete/horse combinations.
- B. In order to hold a Zone Jumper Team Championship a zone that meets the criteria outlined in Zone Eligibility Requirements 1.A above must enter a minimum of three children's and three adult amateur teams (or three combined teams, if combined), and must accept up to a maximum of eight children's teams and eight adult amateur teams. A team will consist of four athlete/horse combinations, unless there are not four available, in which case a minimum of three are required to field a team. These athletes will participate in both the team and the individual competitions at their respective zone championships.
- C. In order hold a 1.20/1.25m Junior/Amateur Jumper and/or 1.30/1.35m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championship, the zone must enter a minimum of three Junior and three Amateur teams (or three combined teams per section, if combined), and must accept up to a maximum of eight Junior and eight Amateur teams at each Championship height. A team will consist of four athlete/horse combinations, unless there are not four available, in which case a minimum of three are required to field a team. These athletes will participate in both the team and the individual competitions at their respective zone championships.
- D. When the point standings freeze (for championship purposes), 45 days prior to the start of the competition, the USHJA will issue invitations to those qualified which must be confirmed by the athlete no later than 21 days prior to the start of the competition. All athletes will be placed on a team (if possible) and notification of team and team members will be notified.
- E. From these lists of definite entries, the Zone Jumper Team Championship teams will use a California Split from the Ranking List, will determine members from each team.
- F. California Split of Ranking List Example:

In the event full four member teams are not available the Chefs and USHJA representative will meet to

draw which teams will have only three members. <u>The teams of three members will utilize a Designated Point Rider (DPR)</u> system. One rider will serve as the DPR, and that rider will be the winner of the First Individual Qualifying class. The DPR system will be utilized for the Team Competition to ensure that all teams have four scores to allow to drop score. The DPR' score (faults only) will count for all teams of less than four, and their home team. The rider's home team is the team which they were placed on using the California Split. The DPR will only receive awards for their home team.

## V. ZONE HOTY CHAMPIONSHIP POINTS

A. Children's and Adult Amateur Jumper Championship: The following zone HOTY Championship Points will be awarded in each of the following three classifications comprising the USHJA Children's and Adult Amateur Jumper Championships: First Individual Qualifying Class (Day One), Team Championship (Day Two), and the Individual Final (Day Three).

<b>1</b> <sup>st</sup>	60 points
2 <sup>nd</sup>	50 points
3 <sup>rd</sup>	40 points
4 <sup>th</sup>	30 points
5 <sup>th</sup>	20 points
6 <sup>th</sup>	10 points

In the Team Championship, each competitor on a team will receive equal Championship Points according to the team's placing. For competitors who are tied, the points will be totaled and divided by the number tied to determine the number of points each tied competitor will receive. Example: A competitor is first in the Individual Qualifier (60 points), her team is Silver (50 points), and she finishes as the bronze Medalist (3rd) in the Individual Final (40 points) for a total of 150 Zone HOTY Championship Points (not Stirrup Cup).

- B. 1.20/1.25m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championship: Because the zone HOTY Championship points for this section are awarded to competitors based upon money won, and the offering of prize money is optional for the potential host applicant, the USHJA will assign a minimum amount of money to this championship height of \$6,000. Classes offering more than \$6,000 will be capped at 6,000 points, thus pointed the same as a \$6,000 class.
- C. 1.30/1.35m Junior/Amateur Jumper Championship: Because the zone HOTY Championship points for this section are awarded to competitors based upon money won, and the offering of prize money is optional for the potential host applicant, the USHJA will assign a minimum amount of money to this championship height of \$10,000. Classes offering more than \$10,000 will be capped at 10,000 points, thus pointed the same as a \$10,000 class.

The USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championships and the related format and specifications are the sole properties of the USHJA and may only be held, conducted or used upon the terms and conditions specified by the USHJA. USHJA reserves the right to change language in documents related to the conduct of the USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championships as necessary for the purposes of consistency and clarity. Any deviations from the class specifications for the USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championships are not permitted without the express written permission from USHJA prior to the printing of the prize list. For any rules not specified above, please refer to the current USEF Rule Book.





## 2021 Platinum Individual and Team Jumper Championship Specifications

Changes from 2020 marked in bold italic and underlined.

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Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, all USHJA programs, properties, events and related specifications are subject to change in accordance with federal, state and local laws and regulations.



### **USHJA Platinum Individual and Team Jumper Championship Specifications**

1.40/1.45m Platinum Jumper Championships (Platinum Championships)

### I. MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- A. Eligible athletes must be a current active USEF and USHJA member in good standing (see GR201 & JP 100.1) from the time of application until conclusion of event.
- B. The horse must be registered with USHJA (see JP 100.2) and recorded with USEF pursuant to USEF GR 1102, in good standing under USEF rules.
- C. The burden of proof of eligibility to compete will rest with and be the sole responsibility of the owner or athlete, and not of the USHJA. USHJA staff is not available to determine each horse's or athlete eligibility.
- D. The zone of each Athlete is determined by the athlete's point state as recorded with USEF as of December 1, **2020** (see JP 100.5)
- E. Athletes wishing to participate in the USHJA Platinum Jumper Championship must complete and submit an application online at <a href="ushja.org/platinumjumper">ushja.org/platinumjumper</a> no later than 45 days prior to the start of their respective Championship. The applicants must certify that they meet the qualification and eligibility conditions delineated herein.
  - Early Application: December 1 through April 10. Non-refundable fee of \$75 per horse.
  - Late Application: April 11 through 45 days before each Platinum Championship. Non-refundable fee of \$150 per horse.
- F. Refer to "Zone Eligibility Requirements" for important dates and deadlines.

## II. QUALIFICATION REQUIREMENTS FOR ATHLETE/HORSE COMBINATIONS

- A. An athlete and/or horse is eligible to compete on one team at the Platinum Championships:
  - 1.40/1.45m Platinum Jumper Championship is open to Juniors, Amateurs, and Professionals. *If qualified and eligible, an athlete may compete on a different horse in the Zone Jumper Team Championships.*
- B. In order to be eligible for the Platinum Championships, athlete/horse combinations must earn a minimum of 250 points/money won in 1.40/1.45m classes at USEF licensed competitions 45 days prior to the start of their championship.
- C. The point standings (ranking) in each zone from 30 days following the conclusion of the previous year's Platinum Championship to 45 days prior to the start of the current year's Championship, will be used to determine the athlete/horse combinations acceptance to compete in that zone's championships. Ties will be decided by determining which athlete/horse combination has the most first place finishes in the classes specified below at their respective height.
- D. Platinum Championships must accept a minimum of three teams and a maximum of eight teams.
- E. Athlete/horse combinations wishing to compete in the Platinum Championships may not have competed in an Open High Performance Standard Grand Prix in the current competition year. (JP122.4d)
- F. Platinum athletes may compete in classes that have heights greater than the maximum height restriction for the Platinum Championships on a different horse.

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#### G. Waiver

- If an athlete has an extenuating circumstance and wishes to apply for a waiver to any of the requirements in Section I, he must apply to the USHJA explaining the circumstances and details. The respective zone-committee will evaluate the request and provide a recommendation to the USHJA Emerging Jumper Rider Task Force which will make the final decision whether to accept or deny the waiver.
- Waivers will not be granted for classes that do not meet the minimum fence height.
- In no case will a waiver include any classes that occur less than 45 days before the Championship when the point standings freeze.
- Waivers will not be granted for Athletes that have jumped over the maximum height restrictions more than 3 times within the qualifying period.
- H. Waivers must be submitted at least 45 days prior to the championships. Any waivers submitted after the deadline will not be considered.

### I. Substitutions

- Once the definite entries are secured, and up to 14 days preceding the Monday of the Championship, if
  an eligible athlete/horse combination is unable to compete at the Championship, the space will be filled
  by the next available combination from the frozen point standings list. If a horse is unable to compete
  and that athlete has another horse that is eligible to compete in the respective championship section
  and within the standings list cutoff, the substitution will be allowed based on that athlete/horse
  combinations point standing from the frozen qualified list.
- During the week of the Championship if an entry is not able to compete, the four-member team will be reduced to three. If a three-member team is reduced to two members, those athletes will compete as individuals.
- If a team is unable to field at least three members, the remaining members may compete in the
  championship as individuals. If there are at least three individuals from different zones in a combined
  zone championship before the first competition, they may comprise a combined team upon approval of
  the USHJA Jumper Technical Delegate.
- To hold a Platinum Championship, a minimum of three teams must be entered. Teams may be combined by zone.
- It is the intention of the USHJA to allow as much flexibility as possible within the parameters of sound and fair competition, and good sport in the allowance of teams to be made up at events when competitors drop out or are eliminated due to sickness or injury. Example: A horse gets injured in the first class leaving only two athletes. A third athlete is available and riding as an individual. In this case a team can be made up from the three competitors and thus a team could be fielded for the teamday.

## J. Qualifying List

- Athlete/horse combinations for the 1.40/1.45m Platinum Championships will be accepted from the USHJA Platinum Jumper Championship Qualifying List found on the USHJA website,\_ ushja.org/platinumjumper.\_
- Combined Zones: Each Zone may send up to 16 qualified athlete/horse combinations. Should a
  Zone be unable to send 16 qualified athlete/horse combinations the other competing Zone may
  send more than their allotted 16 combinations until a maximum of 32 athlete/horse
  combinations have been accepted.

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#### III. RULES AND REGULATIONS

Horse Rules and Regulations

- A. Horse inspection and jog for soundness
  - Championship horses must be stabled on the show grounds where the championship is being held, in official horse show stabling following the completion of the Official Horse Inspection and Jog for Soundness. Championship horses must remain on the horse show grounds from the start of the official jog through the completion of their Championship.
  - Horses competing in the Championship may not compete in any other class at the same horse show after the Official Jog has taken place.
  - All Championship horses must be presented at the mandatory horse inspection and jog for soundness by the athlete or designated representative. The horse inspection and jog for soundness will be held not more than 24 hours prior to the start of the First Individual Qualifying Class. The exact time and location will be included in the prize list and schedule for each championship.
  - A designated representative for the horse must be present at the horse inspection and jog for soundness.
     For the purposes of these championships the "designated representative" must be at least 18 and is defined as the rider, trainer, parent/guardian, Chef d'Equipe, or an authorized representative (authorization in writing is required).
  - Each horse must be presented with its entry number. Following the official jog, the assigned back number
    must accompany the horse/pony at all times when it is out of its stall and must be visible on the stall door
    when in the stall.
  - Horses not accepted at the horse inspection and jog for soundness will have the opportunity to be represented once prior to the First Individual Qualifying Class.
  - If a horse is not accepted at the initial horse inspection and jog for soundness, they may not participate in the Championship Training Session if it is held prior to the re-inspection. Horses not accepted at the re-inspection and jog for soundness will not be allowed to compete in the Championships. Horses may not participate in any concurrently held competition during which the Championship is held on the same grounds for a period of 48 hours following the horse inspection. (GR914.3)

## B. Tack/ Equipment

USEF Rules: USEF rules will govern these Championships. Additionally, please pay particular attention to the specifics listed below:

- 1. Martingales
  - Only running martingales used in a conventional manner are permitted in the Platinum Championships. (JP111.1b)
  - The use of any other type of martingale will be cause for elimination from that Championship class. Exception: Irish Martingales may be used.
- 2. <u>Draw reins and German Martingales may only be used when schooling. No other headsets (chambon, etc.)</u>
  <u>are permitted in any class, and cable or metal tie downs are prohibited.</u> The use of Draw Reins is
  permissible during Awards Presentations and Victory Gallops. (JP111.4)
- 3. Equipment
  - The total maximum weight of equipment allowed to be added to a horse's leg, front or hind (single or multiple boots, fetlock rings, etc.), is 500 grams (shoe excluded). (JP111.5)
  - Random or formal boot inspections may be conducted at the discretion of the USHJA Jumper

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Technical Delegate after consultation with the Senior Steward.

### Athlete Rules and Regulations

- Although an athlete is not prevented from competing on another horse during the Championship week, there will be no waiting for that athlete/horse during the Championship classes. If an athlete is not immediately available in the order, the athlete will be scratched from that Championship class.
- For the order of go, classes with non-Platinum and Platinum horses entered, the Platinum horse must be ridden first.
- Failure to enter the ring within one minute of being called incurs elimination. The time limit for entering the ring must be enforced by management. (JP136.2)
- Only the competing athlete may be mounted on the Championship horse after the Official Jog.
- Rider's Meeting: There will be a **mandatory** rider's meeting and Show Jumping Athlete Pathway Orientation presentation; time and location will be included in the prize list and schedule.
- The draw for the Team Order of Go will take place at the Riders Meeting. Teams will be determined two weeks prior to the Championship.

#### A. Schooling

- USEF Jumper Schooling Rules will be in effect 24 hours prior to the start of the first class of the competition until completion of the competition.
- Once the Official horse inspection and jog for soundness is complete, schooling must take place in designated championship schooling areas only.
- The Jumper Technical Delegate will post a Championship Schooling Schedule at the start of the Championship, which will include times and locations.
- Violations of the schooling rules and times will result in possible elimination from the Championships.

### B. Attire (JP111.9)

- 1. Official Horse Inspection and Jog for Soundness and Course Walks
  - Athletes and or designated representatives must be appropriately dressed. Athletes must wear boots, breeches, and a hard hat. A designated representative must be professionally dressed with proper footwear for the Official Horse Inspection and Jog for Soundness.
- 2. Training Class (if offered)
  - Coats are not required. Breeches must be light color (white, fawn or canary). Pastel and dark colored breeches are not allowed. Shirts (polo shirts are permitted) must have collars and sleeves (sleeves may be either long or short), and must be tucked into breeches. Sleeveless shirts and shirts with exposed hoods are prohibited. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boots being worn. (JP111.9c)
- 3. First Individual Qualifying Competition
  - Dark, muted or similar colored coats are required; white breeches; a white tie, choker (unless the shirt, by design, has the choker built in for its intended use) and a white shirt must be worn. Shirts must be fastened at the neck and tucked into breeches. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boots being worn. (JP111.9a)
- 4. Team Competition
  - White breeches; Zone team shirts or team polo shirts are permitted. Shirts must have collars and sleeves (sleeves may be either long or short), and must be tucked into breeches. Sleeveless shirts and

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shirts with exposed hoods are prohibited. If team shirts are not available athletes must follow the dress code for the First Individual Qualifying Competition. Members on each team must all wear coordinated shirts or formal attire. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boot.

#### 5. Individual Final

• Dark, muted or similar colored, coats are required; white breeches; a white tie, choker (unless the shirt, by design, has the choker built in for its intended use) and a white shirt must be worn. Shirts must be fastened at the neck and tucked into breeches. Boots are required. Half chaps are permitted as long as the color matches the paddock boots being worn. (JP111.9a)

### IV. MEDICATION RULES

A. USEF Drugs & Medication rules will be in effect for these championships.

### V. REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- A. Passports are not required.
- B. Entrants must comply with the documents and health certificates, if any, required by the organizer, state, and facility where the championship is being held.

## VI. CHAMPIONSHIP SCHEDULE

There are two format options under which the Championships may be conducted. Host management may choose the option that they feel will work best for the Championship, always keeping the welfare of the horses and athletes as the primary consideration.

## Championship Schedule

- 1. 1.40-1.45m Junior/Amateur/Professional Championship; spreads up to 1.55m
  - The Speed Class and the Grand Prix are overlay competition for the Platinum Championship Athlete/Horse Combinations. Championship ribbons will be given in addition to the show class awards and prize money.
- 2. The speed is 350m/m.

## OPTION ONE – Three Day Format

## A. Day One (First Round of the Team Championship and First Individual Qualifying Class)

- Specifications: The class will be conducted under Table II, Section 1. Faults and time. The results of this class
  will be decided by adding together the faults incurred over the course and any penalties for exceeding the
  Time Allowed. Horses with clear rounds or equal faults are classified according to their time taken to
  complete the course. Athletes eliminated or retiring from the course for any reason shall receive a score equal
  to 20 faults more than the highest penalized competitor in that round.
- 2. Individual Classification: Faults from Round One will be carried forward to the Individual Standings and into Round Two of the Team Championships on Day Two. Ties for non-medal position in the Individual Final will be determined by the time taken on Day One.
- 3. Start Order: The draw for the team start order for the Team Championship will occur at the Rider's Meeting. The order of the individuals on a team will be determined by the Chefs and given to the USHJA representative at the Rider's Meeting. The Chef d'Equipe of teams comprising only three athletes may choose which of the three positions out of the four they will start their athletes.
- 4. Round One for the Platinum Championship will be an overlay class with the horse show's regular 1.40m speed

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class.

- 5. All Platinum Championship competitors will go first in the start order of the overlay classes and will compete in the order drawn at the Riders Meeting.
- 6. Class Awards: Ribbons will be awarded through 8th place. Prize money: 20% of the sections prize money will be paid through 8th as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%.

## B. Day Two (Second Round of the Team Championship/Second Individual Qualifying Class)

- 1. Specifications: The Team Championship is a two round format held over two days. Round two also serves as the second Qualifying Class for the Individual Final. The competitors will be scored under a modified Table II.
- 2. Scoring
  - The Second Round of the Team Championship is open only to athlete/horse combinations that have started (whether eliminated or not) in the First Individual Qualifying Class (Day One).
  - All athletes will receive a score regardless of elimination and are eligible to compete in both rounds of the Team Competition.
  - Athletes eliminated or retiring from the course for any reason shall receive a score equal to 20 faults more than that received by the highest penalized competitor in that round.
  - Only the best (lowest) three scores of each team from each round will count toward the team's score.
  - The winning team will be the team with the lowest combined scores from the two rounds.
  - Any teams tied for a medal shall jump off. The Chefs d'Equipe will select one member from the team for the jump off. The jump off will be scored with faults and time deciding the medal position.
  - If jump-offs for multiple medals are required, the jump-off for the bronze medal will occur first.
  - Placing of teams tied below medal positions will be decided by the combined times from the three highest place riders on a team from Day One.
- 3. Start Order: The starting order of teams will be the reverse order of team scores from the first round (Day One). Any teams tied will go in the order of their first round drawn order.
  - Athletes competing as individuals will compete first in the second round of the Team Competition. The second round order for Individual competitors will be based on reverse order of scores from the first round.
- 4. Class Awards: Medals will be awarded to the Gold, Silver, and Bronze teams, ribbons will be awarded through 3<sup>rd</sup> place. Gold team must ride for ribbons, Silver and Bronze teams will enter the ring on foot for a podium presentation. Prize money: 15% of the sections prize money will be paid to the Gold, Silver and Bronze winning teams. Prize money will be paid through 3<sup>rd</sup> as follows: 50%, 30%, 20% and divided equally among the team's members. Additionally, ribbons will be awarded through 8<sup>th</sup> to the individual class placings after round one and round two of Team Competition (Day Two). Prize money: 15% of the sections prize money will be paid through 8<sup>th</sup> to the individual class placings after round one and round two of Team Competition (Day Two) as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%. Ties for individual placing will first be broken by the faults from the first round of Team Competition on Day One. If Ties remain, the time from day One will be used.

## C. Day Three (Individual Final)

1. Specifications: The competition will conclude with the Individual Final on the third\_day. It will be scored under Table II Section 2 and held over one round. The top **15** athlete/horse combinations based on the cumulative scores from the first and second individual qualifying classes, including ties for twentieth place, are eligible to compete. They must have not been eliminated in either of the two rounds of the competition. The list of the top **15** will be posted and distributed as soon as feasible after the Team

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Competition concludes and medals are awarded. Following this posting, if one or more of the qualified athlete/horse combinations is unable to start in the Individual Final, the combination will not be replaced.

- 2. The Individual Final for the Platinum Championships will be an overlay on the Grand Prix class. The horse show's Grand Prix or featured classic held at the 1.40/1.45m, will serve as the Individual Final.
- 3. Start Order: The start order will be the reverse order of total scores incurred in the first and second individual qualifying classes. In the event of equality of scores, the result of the first qualifying class will decide, with a higher scoring athlete/horse combination going before a lower scoring one.
- 4. All athlete/horse combinations participating in the Platinum Championship will compete before non-Platinum athlete/horse combinations entered in the Grand Prix or featured classic.
- 5. Jump-Off: In the case of a tie for an individual medal, there will be a jump-off, with the jump off going in the same order as in the Individual Final. Ties for medal position in the 1.40/1.45m Platinum Championship will jump off before the Grand Prix jump off or featured classic.
- 6. Class Awards: Gold, Silver, and Bronze medals provided by the USHJA will be awarded to the top three individuals, along with ribbons to 8th and other specified prizes or prize money as may be specified by the organizers and the USHJA. Top 5 overall must ride for ribbons. Gold, Silver, and Bronze Individuals must stay for a podium presentation. Prize money: 50% of the sections prize money will be paid to medal winning individuals as follows: Gold 50%, Silver 30%, Bronze 20%. The Individual Medalists will be invited to participate in one of the USHJA Gold Star clinics. Please find the most update information about the USHJA Gold Star Clinic at. ushja.org/GoldStarClinics.

# OPTION TWO – Four Day Format

# A. Day One (First Individual Qualifying Class)

- 1. Specifications: The class will be conducted under Table II, Section 1. Faults and Time. The results of this class will be decided by adding the faults incurred over the course and any penalties for exceeding the Time Allowed. Horses with clear rounds or equal faults are classified according to the time taken. Athletes eliminated or retiring for any reason will receive a score equal to 20 faults more than the highest penalized competitor in that round.
- 2. Individual Classification: Faults from Round One will be carried forward to the Individual Standings. Faults from all rounds will be carried through to the Individual Final. Ties for non-medal positions in the Individual Final will be determined by the time taken on Day One.
- 3. Start Order: The order will be drawn at the Rider's Meeting.
- 4. The First Individual Qualifying class for the Platinum Championship will be an overlay class with the horse show's regular 1.40m speed class.
- 5. All Platinum Championship competitors will go first in the start order of the overlay classes and will compete in the order drawn at the Riders Meeting.
- 6. Class Awards: Ribbons will be awarded through 8<sup>th</sup>.
- 7. Prize money: 20% of the prize money for the section will be paid as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%.

# B. Day Two (Team Championship and Second and Third Individual Qualifying Classes)

1. Specifications: The Team Championship is a two round competition which also serves as the Second and Third Individual Qualifying classes for the Individual Final. This competition will be scored under a modified Table II over two identical rounds.

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#### 2. Scoring:

- The Team Championship is open only to athlete/horse combinations that have started (whether eliminated or not) in the First Individual Qualifying Class (Day One).
- All athletes will receive a score regardless of elimination and are eligible to compete in both rounds of the Team Championship.
- Athletes eliminated or retiring from the round will receive a score equal to 20 faults more than the score of the highest penalized competitor in that round.
- Only the best three scores of each team from each round will count toward the team score.
- The winning team will be the team with the lowest combined score from the two rounds.
- Any teams tied for a medal position will jump off. The Chef d'Equipe will select one member for the team for the jump-off. The jump-off will be scored on faults and time deciding the medal position.
- If multiple jump-offs are required, the jump-off for bronze will occur first.
- Team placing for non-medal positions that are tied will be decided by the combined times from the three highest placed riders on a team from Day One.
- 3. Start Order: The starting order of teams will be the reverse order of team scores from the first round of the Team Championship. Teams tied will start in the same order as the first round.
  - Athletes competing as individuals will start first in the second round of the Team Championship. The second round order for individuals will be based on reverse order of scores from the first round.
- 4. Class Awards: Medals will be awarded to Gold, Silver and Bronze teams, ribbons awarded through 3<sup>rd</sup>. Gold medal teams must ride for presentations, Silver and Bronze teams will enter the ring on foot for a podium presentation. Additionally, ribbons will be awarded 1<sup>st</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> to the individual class placings from the combined scores from rounds one and two of the Team Championship. Ties for individual placing will be broken by the faults and time from the First Individual Qualifying Class (Day One).
- **5.** Prize Money: 15% of the prize money for the section will be paid to the Gold, Silver and Bronze teams as follows: 50%, 30%, 20%. 15% of the prize money for the section will be paid to the top 8 individual class placings after round one and two the Team Championship as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%.

# C. <u>Day Three (Mandatory Rest Day)</u>

## D. Day Four (Individual Final)

- 1. Specifications: The Individual Final will be scored under Table II, Section 2 and held over one round. The top <u>15</u> athlete/horse combinations based on cumulative scores for the first, second and third individual qualifying classes, including ties for <u>15</u><sup>th</sup> place are eligible to compete. They must not have been eliminate in any of the three rounds of the competition. The list of the top <u>15</u> will be posted as soon as feasible following the conclusion of the Team Championship. If one or more of the qualified athlete/horse combinations are unable to start in the Individual Final they will not be replaced.
- 2. The Individual Final for the Platinum Championships will be an overlay on the Grand Prix class. The horse show's Grand Prix or featured classic held at the 1.40/1.45m, will serve as the Individual Final.
- 3. Start Order: The start order will be the reverse order of total score form the first, second and third individual qualifying classes. In the event of equality of score, the result of the First Individual Qualifying Class (Day One) will decide, with the lower placing starting before the higher placing.
- 4. All athlete/horse combinations participating in the Platinum Championship will compete before non-Platinum athlete/horse combinations entered in the Grand Prix or featured classic.
- 5. Jump-Off: In the case of a tie for an individual medal, there will be a jump-off, with the jump off going in

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- the same order as in the individual final. Ties for medal position in the 1.40/1.45m Platinum Championship will jump off before the Grand Prix jump off or featured classic.
- 6. Class Awards: Gold, Silver and Bronze medals will be awarded to the top three individuals, and ribbons through 8<sup>th</sup>. The top <u>5</u> must ride for awards. Medalists will stay for a podium presentation. Prize money: 50% of the prize money for the section will be paid to the Gold, Silver and Bronze individuals as follows: 50%, 30%, 20%. The Individual Medalists will be invited to participate in one of the USHJA Gold Star clinics. Please find the most update information about the USHJA Gold Star Clinic at: ushja.org/GoldStarClinics.

# VII. CUMULATIVE INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIP SCORING

# OPTION ONE – Three Day Format

- A. First Round of the Team Championship and First Individual Qualifier (Day One): Faults from Round One will be carried forward to the Individual Standings and into Round Two of the Team Championship on Day Two.
- B. Second Round of the Team Championship and Second Individual Qualifier (Day Two): Each individual's score (faults only) from the Day Two Team Championship will be added to the final score from Day One resulting in a cumulative score carried into the Individual Final on Day Three.
- C. Individual Final (Day Three): The Individual Champion is the athlete/horse combination with the lowest total cumulative score from Day One added to Day Two (faults only) and the Individual Final on Day Three (faults only). Jump-off scores from team day will not be a factor. An athlete who is eliminated or who retires from Day Three is eliminated from the Individual Final.
- D. Jump-Off: In the event of equality of faults for an individual medal position, a jump-off will be held, with the jump off going in the same order as in the Individual Final. In the event of ties for placings not determined by the jump off (through 8th), the time from Day One will determine the Individual Final result.

#### OPTION TWO - Four Day Format

- A. First Individual Qualifier (Day One): Faults from Round One will be carried forward to the Individual Standings.
- B. Team Championship (Day Two): Each individual's first and second round score (faults only) from the Team Championship will be added to the final score from Day One resulting in a cumulative score carried into the Individual Final on Day Four.
- C. Individual Final (Day Four): The Individual Champion is the athlete/horse combination with the lowest total cumulative score from the First Individual Qualifying Class on Day One added to the two rounds on Day Two (faults only) and the Individual Final on Day Four (faults only). Jump-off scores from team day will not be a factor. An athlete who is eliminated or who retires from Day Four is eliminated from the Individual Final.
- D. Jump-Off: In the event of equality of faults for an individual medal position, a jump-off will be held, with the jump off going in the same order as in the Individual Final. In the event of ties for placings not determined by the jump off (through 8th), the time from Day One will determine the Individual Final result.

# VIII. CHEF d'EQUIPE

- A. Individuals will be asked to apply to USHJA to serve as the Recognized and/or Assistant Platinum Championship Chef d'Equipe. The applicants must meet the following criteria:
  - 1. Current Active adult member in good standing with USHJA and USEF.
  - 2. Must Adhere to the USHJA Conflict of Interest and Ethics Policy.
  - 3. Agree to attend the designated Platinum Championship and fulfill the responsibilities of the position as designated by USHJA.
  - 4. Individuals must have completed the Safe Sport training from the United States Olympic Committee, within the past five (5) years.
- 5. The Assistant Platinum Championship Chef d'Equipe will work closely with the Recognized Zone Show Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, all USHJA programs, properties, events and related specifications are subject to change in accordance with federal, state and local laws and regulations.

- Jumping Chef d'Equipe and the USHJA Show Jumping Technical Advisor.
- 6. A Recognized and/or Assistant Platinum Championship Chef d'Equipe may assist a maximum of two teams per section and no more than six teams total.
- B. Zone Committees will select individuals from the USHJA approved list to serve from the submitted applications as the Assistant Platinum Championship Chef d'Equipe for each team they send to the championships.
- C. A professional on a Platinum Championship team may also act as Chef d'Equipe as long as he/she meet the above application criteria.

# **Organizer Requirements**

# I. HOST AND ORGANIZER REQUIREMENTS

- A. Competition Conduct
  - 1. Holding a training session is optional for the organizer, and if held is optional for competitors. A course of approximately eight fences will be provided, including one combination. Each entrant will have a maximum of 90 seconds in the arena. Jumps, if taken, must be jumped in the proper direction. The training session, if offered must be scheduled the day prior to the First Individual Qualifier and held in the Championship ring.
  - 2. Courses: Each course must have no fewer than 12 jumping efforts and must include a minimum of two doubles or one triple combination. All of the courses must include a Liverpool. If an open water is to be used in a Platinum Championship, it must also be used in the Training session before the First Individual Qualifier (Day One), and then only used either in the Team Competition (Day Two) or Individual Final (Day Four). It must have a minimum spread of 2.45m (8'). (JP128)
- B. Prize Money
  - 1. A minimum of \$20,000 in prize money must be offered at the USHJA Platinum Championships, there are no maximum prize money restrictions for the Platinum Championship section.
  - 2. In addition to prize money offered, the organizer must add an additional \$4,000 for day one, \$6,000 for Team Day, and \$10,000 for the Individual Final for the overlaid Platinum Championships for a minimum of \$20,000 added in the Platinum Championship section. The competition must offer a minimum of a \$25,000 Grand Prix or Classic.
  - 3. Within each Championship, prize money must be divided as follows:
    - 20% to the First Individual Qualifying Class. Money to be paid through eighth places as follows: 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%
    - 15% to Individual placings after the Team Championship. Money paid to individuals after round one and round two of team day, 1<sup>st</sup> 8<sup>th</sup> as follows; 30%, 22%, 15%, 10%, 7%, 6%, 5%, 5%.
    - 15% to Gold, Silver, and Bronze Team Medal winners. Money paid as follows: 50%, 30%, 20%. Prize money for each team will be divided equally among the team's members.
    - 50% to the Individual Final. Money paid to Individual Medal winners (as follows: 50%, 30%, 20%).
  - 4. Prize money amounts must be listed per class in the PrizeList.
- C. Host and Organizer Conditions
  - 1. All Platinum Championships must be held at a USEF licensed competition.
  - 2. The Platinum Championship classes may not be overlaid with FEI classes.
  - 3. The Platinum Championship must be held in the main jumper ring at the competition and receive priority scheduling to be approved by USHJA.

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- 4. The championships must be featured at the host venue and may not be relegated to a minor ring or minor time in the schedule. In general, other finals, other championships, or other special competitions at the host event must have the express written permission of the USHJA.
- 5. There must be a working scoreboard (matrix display, video, or LED) at the ring where the Championships are held along with a technician who operates it.
- 6. There must be a minimum of two jumper judges (at least one with a large R) with no additional duties during the Championship classes.
- 7. For the horse Inspection and jog for soundness the Jumper Technical Delegate (JTD), Official Veterinarian and the USHJA on site Representative must be present.
- 8. There must be a back up time.
- 9. There must be an announcer with no additional duties during each class.
- 10. There must be a Certified Jumper Schooling Supervisor on duty in the warm-up arena for the duration of each championship class.
- 11. The competition will also provide an official scorer, who will review and confirm class placings with the senior judge after each class before publishing, keep track of the cumulative scores and positions of each competitor, The host competition will send results to the USHJA office immediately following each class of each Championship (e-mail to EJR@ushja.org).
- 12. The Jumper Technical Delegate (JTD), who will certify that all rules, specifications, and class conditions are followed, and who will represent the USHJA and be the final authority in all questions that arise regarding the Championships, the Championship logistics, and the schedule. The USHJA JTD will have a check list, a set of instructions and list of specific duties from the USHJA. Management will assist the JTD as necessary to ensure a quality technical event. The JTD will walk all courses and consult with the Course Designer to ensure fair competition.
- 13. A mandatory rest day must be included between the Platinum Championship Team Day and the Grand Prix/Individual Final.
- D. Combining and Dividing Sections
  - 1. In order to hold a Platinum Championship, three teams must be entered. Teams may be combined by zone.

# **Zone Eligibility Requirements**

# I. ZONE ELIGIBILITY

- A. Each USHJA zone, which in the previous competition year had at least 60 horses competing and earning zone points in the Children's Jumper section and at least 60 horses competing and earning zone points in the Adult Amateur Jumper section, is eligible to host Platinum Championships.
- B. The three USHJA Zone Jumper Team Championships and Platinum Championships will normally be held together at the same event, except in extraordinary circumstances.

# II. COMBINING ZONES

- A. Zones that do not meet the eligibility criteria delineated in Section I may apply to the USHJA on or before August 1 of the current competition year to obtain permission to have the zone combine with a contiguous zone in the subsequent competition year (or in the case of Zones 11 or 12 combine with either Zone 9 or 10) to conduct a USHJA Combined Zone Jumper Team Championship.
- B. In the case of a zone indicating interest in combining with one of several other contiguous zones, the zone

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wishing to combine can determine which zone to combine with once the applicable zones select their host

- C. Zones that meet the eligibility requirements outlined in Section I may be permitted to combine with only one contiguous zone to host a combined Platinum Championship.
- D. All requests under this section will be addressed on a case-by-case basis by the USHJA Emerging Jumper Rider Task Force and the USHJA Executive Committee whose decision shall be final and cannot be appealed.

# III. ZONE REVIEW OF HOST APPLICATIONS

- A. General Information
  - The USHJA office will announce the dates when applications for hosting open and close. Application documents will be posted on the USHJA website. Completed applications will be sent directly to the respective zone committees, whose Jumper members will formally review and discuss them based upon their knowledge of the events, the facilities, the amenities, the location, and the criteria. Great care must be taken to identify and remove both actual and perceived conflicts of interest among zone committee members in the evaluation process in accordance with USHJA policies. Indoor facilities will not be considered.
- B. Event Selection
  - USHJA Platinum Championships will ideally be held between June 15 and November 17.
  - Once a given zone's jumper committee members review the competition host applications, the zone will
    complete a USHJA zone prospective host document (found on the USHJA website), and send it to the USHJA
    on or before September 15 of the current competition year, signifying one or more competitions and dates
    recommended by vote at a zone jumper committee meeting.
  - A new facility which has not held a USEF licensed competition and/or a new competition in its first year of operation will not be considered to host a USHJA Platinum Championship.
- C. Events that desire to apply for hosting should specifically state their intention to hold all championships heights, along with the prize money they will commit to offer. Zone committee members must take this into consideration when selecting a potential host event.
- D. Date and Location Approval
  - The final decision of the location and date for each zone's USHJA Championships will rest entirely with the USHJA, which will review a zone's recommendations and select the date and location on or before February 1 of the current competition year. USHJA will promptly and formally notify each zone jumper committee of its decision as well as the championship host.
- E. Important Dates and Deadlines
  - Early Application: December 1–April 10. Non-refundable fee of \$75 per horse Late Application: April 11–45 days before each Platinum Championship. Non-refundable fee of \$150 per horse
  - 45 days prior to Championships Athlete Applications close, qualifying period ends, invitations sent.
  - 21 days prior to Championships Athlete must declare section and Intent to compete. Athletes failing to respond to the invitation by this date are not guaranteed to be placed on a team.
  - 21 days prior to Championships Waiver request period ends.
  - 14 days prior to Championships Mandatory Chef d'Equipe conference call to approve team configurations. At this point approved teams will be final. No exceptions.
  - 10 days prior to Championships Athletes are notified of team selection and teammates.

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#### IV. NUMBER AND COMPOSITION OF TEAMS

- A. When the point standings freeze (for championship purposes), 45 days prior to the start of the competition, the USHJA will issue invitations to those qualified which must be confirmed by the athlete no later than 21 days prior to the start of the competition. All athletes will be placed on a team (if possible) and notification of team and team members will be notified.
- B. From the list of definite entries, Platinum Championship Riders may form their own teams or be assigned a team at the Championship. The assigned teams will use the California Split to form teams.
- C. California Split of Ranking List Example:

In the event full four member teams not available the Chefs and USHJA representative will meet to draw which teams will have only three members. <u>The teams of three members will utilize a Designated Point Rider (DPR) system. One rider will serve as the DPR, and that rider will be the winner of the First Individual Qualifying class. The DPR system will be utilized for the Team Competition to ensure that all teams have four scores to allow to drop score. The DPR' score (faults only) will count for all teams of less than four, and their home team. The rider's home team is the team which they were placed on using the California Split. The DPR will only receive awards for their home team.</u>

D. Regardless of method used to form a team, only one professional per team will be allowed, unless Junior and Amateurs are unavailable. A California Split will be used to place professionals without a team.

# V. ZONE HOTY CHAMPIONSHIP POINTS

A. Platinum Championships: Because the zone HOTY Championship points for this section are awarded to competitors based upon money won, and because the amount offered can vary, the USHJA will assign a minimum amount of money to this championship height of \$25,000. Classes offering more than \$25,000 will be capped at 25,000 points, thus pointed the same as a \$25,000 class.

The USHJA Platinum Championships and the related format and specifications are the sole properties of the USHJA and may only be held, conducted or used upon the terms and conditions specified by the USHJA. USHJA reserves the right to change language in documents related to the conduct of the USHJA Platinum Championships as necessary for the purposes of consistency and clarity. Any deviations from the class specifications for the USHJA Platinum Championships are not permitted without the express written permission from USHJA prior to the printing of the prize list. For any rules not specified above, please refer to the current USEF Rule Book.

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# **USHJA Policies and Procedures Governing All Committees**

# Introduction

The USHJA Committee Handbook provides educational information and guidelines for the conduct of committees and committee members. In order to ensure that the USHJA maintains compliance with all Federal, State and Local regulations, as well as our own financial policies and procedures, the USHJA has established policies and procedures for the operation of USHJA committees. In cases where the USHJA Bylaws and Policy Manual are different than the information contained herein, the USHJA Bylaws and Policies will supersede the information in this Handbook. Please contact the office if you require clarification on any of the information contained in this Handbook.

# For purposes of this Handbook, all USHJA committees, Working Groups, task forces, and councils are referred to as committees.

A committee appointment makes you a part of the fabric of both our sport's governance and the USHJA. All committee members should strive to support the sport as a whole, while understanding the USHJA's mission, vision, and objectives of the specific committee tasks at hand.

Serving as a committee member is both challenging and rewarding and carries with it a great degree of responsibility. The USHJA provides resources, such as this handbook, to help committee members fulfill their role and meet the goals and objectives of the USHJA. If you would like more information or assistance, please contact any Executive office staff member or your committee liaison, who will be happy to assist you.

In governance, all of us are obligated to represent the viewpoint and interests of the organization. Committee members are expected to bring experience and knowledge to the table without trying to represent a personal point of view, or that of a barn, state, or some other group.

There are times when you may not agree on a point or task, and the disagreement must be resolved in a professional manner focusing on the issue and not on the personalities. Clearly understanding the organization's objectives is a valuable tool for reaching consensus. Even if we disagree with a decision, we must agree to speak with one voice once a decision has been reached.

# **USHJA Value Proposition, Mission and Vision**

# Value Proposition

USHJA provides to its membership competition programs, awards and recognition, educational programs, and experiential opportunities. The competitive programs are appropriate and accessible to all levels of hunter and jumper sport. The Association distributes awards and recognition to competitors through championship events and year end awards in a wide variety of divisions and skill levels. We promote fair sport, sportsmanship, and horse welfare. Through our governance structure, the USHJA provides representation, advocacy, and regulatory input.

# **USHJA Mission Statement**

The mission of the United States Hunter Jumper Association is to unify and represent the hunter and jumper disciplines of equestrian sport through education, recognition, and sport programs.

# **USHJA Vision Statement**

Our vision is to increase awareness of and participation in programs and services for all involved in hunter/jumper competitive sport. We strive to provide value to our community such that USHJA is the pathway to excellence and education in equestrian sport.

## **Committee Service**

# Purpose of the Committee

Every committee has a description to guide the committee's efforts, goals, and future planning. Use this purpose to guide the direction of the work of the committee. The USHJA staff liaison can be of assistance in providing a copy of the committee job description.

# Eligibility to Serve

Unless otherwise specified herein, any individual holding a seat on any committee within the USHJA must be a Senior Active Member of USHJA in good standing.

# Vacancies

Except as otherwise noted in the Bylaws, a vacancy shall be filled by the President.

# Term of Service

Unless otherwise specified, all members of any committees within the structure of the USHJA shall be elected and/or appointed to a term of one (1) to four (4) years, except in cases of an individual appointed to fulfill the balance of a term due to a vacancy or an individual appointed during a current committee term.

# Committee Role

- Committees create open dialogue on topics within the hunter/jumper industry related to their specific purpose.
- Depending on their mission and purpose (Committee Charter/Job Description) and in alignment with the USHJA Strategic Plan and Working Group (WG) strategic direction committees may make recommendations on programs for consideration by the Executive Director, Officers, Executive Committee or Board of Directors, review proposed rule changes, make recommendations for rule changes and perform such other duties as may be specified within the USHJA Bylaws or assigned to the committee by the Executive Director, Officers, Executive Committee or Board of Directors.
- Committees hold meetings and/or forums as required by the USHJA Bylaws throughout the year.
- Committee meetings may not be held without a USHJA staff representative present.

# Committee Chair Responsibilities

- Familiarize yourself with the Committee job description, <u>USHJA Strategic Plan</u>, any WG strategic directions, Committee Budget, and Program Planning Guide.
- In collaboration with the USHJA staff liaison, the Committee Chair oversees the logistics of the committee's operations and serves as spokesperson to the Executive Director and President for the committee.
- In coordination with the USHJA staff liaison, the Committee Chair oversees the logistics of the committee's operations and serves as spokesperson for the committee to the Executive Director, WG Chairs, and President.
- Supports the objectives and policies of the USHJA.
- Conducts and facilitates committee business in a manner that encourages open dialogue and leads to effective decision making.
- Assigns work to the committee members, sets the agenda, conducts meetings, and works
  with the USHJA staff liaison to ensure timely distribution of meeting materials and
  minutes.
- A chair may vote, but is not required to vote, except to break ties.
- A chair does not make or second motions.
- A chair provides training, reviews recent discussions and past projects of the committee for new committee members.
- Review your committee's budget (if applicable) quarterly with your liaison.
- If your committee has any related program Standard Operating Procedures, review this document with your liaison.

# Committee Liaison Responsibilities

The USHJA staff liaison functions as a resource and is the USHJA representative during all Committee meetings. The liaisons may not be able to answer every question immediately, but they have an excellent understanding of the USHJA and can obtain information you need or put you in touch with the people who can.

- Serve as the link between the committee and the Executive Director, Officers, Executive Committee or Board of Directors.
- Collaborates with the Committee Chair and members to ensure compliance with the USHJA Bylaws and Policies.
- Collaborates with the Committee Chair and members to provide program or service update and recommendations.
- Collaborates with the Committee Chair to prepare presentations of new programs or projects for consideration by the Executive Director, Officers, Executive Committee or Board of Directors.
- If applicable, collaborates with the Committee Chair to prepare and monitor the

- committee budget.
- If applicable, collaborates with the Committee Treasurer to facilitate Funding Requests.
- Schedules and notices committee meetings.
- Provides the committee members with meeting materials, minutes and any data necessary to conduct business.


# Committee Member Responsibilities

- Each member, by accepting a seat on a USHJA committee, shall be bound by and discharge his duties in good faith and in accordance with the applicable fiduciary duties, the USHJA Bylaws and Policies, and the Conflict of Interest Statement and Ethics Policy. Failure to comply with these standards may result in the removal from committee seat(s) that the individual holds pursuant to the policies approved by the Board of Directors.
- All individuals holding a seat must attend a minimum of seventy-five (75%) of the meetings of that committee each year. A committee member who fails to attend the required number of meetings may be removed from the committee by the President of the USHJA and replaced with another individual, i n accordance with Board of Directors approved policies and procedures.
- Consider matters from the broader perspective, putting the needs of the sport and organizations ahead of personal interests and/or interests of specific groups, individuals, constituencies of the membership or stakeholders.
- Understand and respect that the opinions of others are valuable to them and encourage dialog from alternative perspectives without recrimination.
- Refrain from lobbying other committee members which may create factions and prevent open discussion by intimidating other members.
- Once a committee decision has been approved by a majority vote, defend and support that decision even if your personal viewpoint is different. This includes not disclosing different opinions within the committee to others outside the committee.
- Speak for the committee or organization only when authorized by the USHJA.
- The President and Executive Director are ex-officio members of all committees, except where specified in the Bylaws.

# Where do you and your Committee fit within USHJA?

# **Committee Meetings**

# General Guidelines

- Become familiar with Robert's Rules of Order, which are used as a guide for meeting conduct and process.
- USHJA strongly recommends creating an established committee meeting calendar for the entire competition year. Collaborate with your staff liaison to develop a calendar and distribute it to the committee at the beginning of the year.
- Strive to keep committee meetings under one hour. This may require setting agendas with fewer topics and scheduling a separate committee call with additional topics for a later date.
- Set the expectation that all committee members are to attend the entire meeting.
- Minimize cross talk by managing the call, calling on each committee member for input, and if necessary, giving them an allotted amount of time.
- Remind committee members to identify themselves before speaking. Committee members may not recognize each other's voices on a teleconference call. This is also extremely helpful to the liaison as they write the meeting minutes.
- Be cognizant of people who dominate conversations. A single individual does not necessarily need to weigh in on every point.
- Committees are required to conduct a minimum of three (3) meetings annually including the one (1) in-person meeting held during the USHJA Annual Meeting, unless otherwise specified within the USHJA Bylaws. The President may waive the requirement to hold a committee meeting at the Annual Meeting. Working Group Task Forces will meet at the direction of the Working Group Chair.
- The Committee Chair or USHJA President shall have the power to call a meeting of the

- committee at any time and the staff liaison shall provide notice of such meeting to the committee a minimum of seven (7) days prior to the meeting.
- Unless otherwise provided in the Bylaws or Policies, the greater of three (3) members or one-third (1/3) of a committee constitutes a quorum.
- Meeting by teleconference is permitted for all meetings except the in-person meeting held during the USHJA Annual Meeting.
- All committee meetings by teleconference are recorded and records are maintained in accordance with USHJA retention policies; however, these telephonic recordings are only to be used internally, and are not to be shared or disseminated even between/among fellow committee members.
- A USHJA staff liaison must be present at all committee meetings.

# **Before the Meeting**

It is responsibility of all members to be familiar with the agenda items, materials, and past discussions. Be informed by preparing for the meeting with the help of your liaison.

- Review the meeting's agenda, materials, and minutes.
- Discuss the topics of the call, goals, and potential issues with your liaison before the call.
- Encourage committee members to attend the call so their knowledge and opinions can be shared.
- Understand the requirements for a meeting to achieve a quorum.
- Three members or 1/3 of the total members, whichever is greater, constitutes a quorum.

# **During the Meeting**

- If an agenda item requires an action, a committee member (other than the chair) must make a motion for the committee to take that specific action. Another committee member (other than the chair) must second the motion. Any discussion must take place after the motion is seconded. Following discussion, the committee shall vote to approve or disapprove the motion. Motions are typically made in the positive, but this is not a requirement.
- Topics that require multiple votes may be put on the floor for discussion as one block with a motion and second. This removes the need for individual motions and allows a vote (approve/disapprove) on each underlying item.
- Monitor participation to ensure all committee members have an opportunity to contribute.
   You may want to consider calling on committee members who have not provided an opinion during a meeting.
- A Motion to Table is utilized when committee members wish to discuss a matter later in the meeting or to put it off until the next meeting. The motion would be to postpone consideration of the matter until a certain or definitive time has elapsed. If a subcommittee or taskforce is created to work on the matter in more detail and bring back a recommendation to the committee, the motion would be to refer the matter to the subcommittee or task force.
- When debate on a pending motion has been ongoing, a committee member may make a

motion to "call the question" on the pending motion. This motion must be seconded and approved by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the committee members present. If approved, a vote on the pending motion must be taken immediately with no allowance for further debate.

- Ex-officio and non-voting member attendees do not make motions or cast votes.
- Committee actions resulting in a recommendation for program changes are subject to additional review in accordance with Board of Directors approved policy. (Refer to Appendix E– Process/Approval Chart, and Appendix B Program Planning checklist)
- Committees must direct any resolutions regarding organization policy to the Board of Directors for consideration.
- Committees make recommendations, and their actions are not binding on the organization.
- Recognize when the conversation is going off track and firmly but politely remind the speaker of the topic being discussed. The longer a chairperson allows a conversation to wander, the more difficult it is to keep the committee functional and all members engaged.
- Develop a strategy for contentious issues. For example, see below for an effective strategy to discuss difficult topics:
  - 1. State the issue.
  - 2. Explain the rules for addressing the issue.
  - 3. State how the vote will be conducted. For a contentious issue, it is highly recommended that the vote be conducted by secret ballot.
  - 4. Once the procedure is explained, the chairperson will call on each person to comment. If there are some members of the committee who tend to dominate a conversation, implement a time limit. One strategy is to call on the dominant individual(s) last.
  - 5. One-to-two minutes is usually adequate time to make a point and encourages people to organize their thoughts. Once everyone has spoken the chairperson calls on everyone once again. This is an opportunity to state what points they agree with and/or don't agree with, and to state something new. The majority of the time the chair can accurately determine what the status of the issue is and either call for a vote or determine that the issue needs more work before being voted on.

# **After the Meeting**

- If you have been assigned tasks, check in with the Committee Chair and liaison with status updates.
- Review your notes after the meeting to prepare for the next call.

# **Between Meetings**

Your role does not end when your committee's call ends. As an ambassador of the USHJA, you should encourage fellow members to reach out and voice their opinions.

- Reach out to fellow members for advice.
- Discuss topics with committee members between meetings.
- Connect with your liaison if any comments or issues have been brought to the USHJA

# **Meeting Minutes**

Unless specified in the Bylaws, meeting minutes only include what was done at a meeting,

not what was said. Therefore, the minutes are not a record of every word spoken. Minutes must contain the following.

- Organization name.
- Committee name.
- Date and time.
- Roll Call Name of committee members present, name of committee members absent, name of guests or staff present and name of staff liaison present.
- Determination of a quorum.
- Any motions made, discussion points related to the agenda items, the final wording of a motion, and the final action (vote) by the committee as it relates to the motion.

# **Balloting and Voting**

- In matters related to committee actions, any duly appointed or elected members of a USHJA committee may vote on matters in connection with committee actions provided the person does not have a conflict of interest regarding the agenda item.
- A <u>Conflict of Interest is defined as</u> "a situation in which a person is in a position to derive personal benefit from actions or decisions made in their official capacity". Members must state the conflict of interest at the beginning of the meeting and recuse themselves from the meeting when the conflicting agenda item is addressed.
- Any committee member present during a meeting or the Executive Director or the President may request the use of a secret ballot during a committee vote. The staff liaison will notify the committee of any such request.
- Balloting shall be conducted in according with the Board of Directors established policies and may utilize E-mail, secure telephonic and/or USPS Mail ballots, provided that the matter or matters to be voted upon have been discussed at a scheduled committee meeting and the minutes reflect which method stated above shall be utilized.
- If a committee decides to hold an email vote, the item under consideration for email vote must have appeared on a prior meeting agenda or have been discussed during a previous meeting of the committee. Only those present in the initial meeting where the topic was discussed can participate in the email vote.
- Members who are not present at a scheduled committee meeting are not permitted to vote on the matter(s) being considered by the committee.
- A majority vote is a majority of the votes actually cast. If the vote is tied, the motion fails. Abstentions are not votes and are not counted in determining a majority vote.
- A Committee Chair may vote but is not required to vote except to break ties.

## **Committee Actions and Resolutions**

• If an agenda item requires an action, a committee member must make a motion for the committee to take that specific action. Another committee member must second the motion. Any discussion to take place must happen following the motion. Following discussion, the committee shall vote to approve or disapprove the motion. Motions are typically made in the positive.

- A Motion to Table is utilized when a committee member wishes to discuss a matter later in the meeting or to put it off until the next meeting. A motion to Table must be seconded and approved or disapproved by majority vote. The motion would then be to postpone consideration of the matter until a certain or definitive time. If a subcommittee or task force is created to work on the matter in more detail and bring back a recommendation to the committee, the motion would be to refer the matter to the sub- committee or task force. This motion would be seconded and then approved or disapproved by majority vote.
- When debate on a pending motion has been ongoing, a committee member may make a motion to "call the question" on the pending motion. This motion must be seconded and approved by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the committee members present. If approved, a vote on the pending motion must be taken with no further debate.
- Committee actions resulting in *a recommendation* for program changes are subject to additional review in accordance with Board of Directors approved policy.
- Committees must direct any recommendations regarding organization policy to the Board of Directors for final consideration. However, no committee recommendation may be presented to the Board of Directors without first proceeding through the appropriate levels of review by other higher levels of authority.
- Committees make recommendations and their actions are not binding on the organization.
- Once a vote is taken it is their duty of each committee member to support the decision of the committee.

# Confidentiality and Conflict of Interest

# **Confidentiality**

- The members of any USHJA committee are required to maintain the confidentiality of USHJA business. Confidentiality will be maintained until it is stated in writing by the USHJA that such confidentiality is no longer required, unless otherwise required by law.
- In the course of a committee's work, members may receive material that is marked Confidential. These materials, as well as all working documents of the committee, must be kept confidential. When a committee's work product is deemed suitable for public review, then all confidential materials shall be shredded, and all earlier versions of the work product shall be deleted from committee member's personal computers.
- Strict observance of confidentiality is required, and any breach may result in the removal of the individual from his/her committee seat by a majority vote of the Executive Committee.

## **Conflict of Interest**

- All committee members shall be bound by the USHJA Bylaws and policies regarding conflicts of interests and shall follow all disclosure and reporting procedures as adopted by the organization.
- A conflict of interest is any personal, family, business or financial relationship, whether direct or indirect, which could influence or be perceived to influence objectivity when

representing or conducting business for or on behalf of USHJA. For the purposes of this policy, a family member is defined as an individual's spouse, domestic partner, parent, child, grandchild, great-grandchild, sibling, half-sibling or spouse of sibling or half-sibling, ancestor or the spouse of the individual's child, grandchild, great-grandchild or sibling or any other individuals with a significant familial or familial-like relationship including in-laws.

• Conflicted persons may not be present at or participate in committee deliberations, discussions or votes on any matters giving rise to the conflict, and they are prohibited from attempting to influence such deliberations or vote.

# **Discharge of Duties**

Each member, by accepting a seat on a USHJA committee, shall be bound by and discharge his duties in good faith and in accordance with the applicable fiduciary duties, the USHJA Bylaws, policies, and Conflict of Interest Statement and Ethics Policy. Failure to comply with these standards may result in the removal from committee seat(s) that the individual holds pursuant to the policies approved by the Board of Directors

# Committee Planning Cycle

As a committee, you have the primary role of working closely with the USHJA staff liaison in the development of the committee plan (2-Year Plan) as it relates to any programs under the committee's responsibility. The Committee Planning Cycle should be such that when a committee is meeting in the current competition year, it is focusing on current program issues within the current year's budget and conducting committee/program planning for the following competition year and one additional competition year beyond. This Planning Cycle is imperative to the budget development cycle which is outlined below.

# **Program Planning Process**

Committee members should familiarize themselves with the Program Planning Guide (USHJA Policy GA106). The USHJA staff liaison, using the Program Plan Planning Guide, will take the lead as the project manager and assist the committee with the steps required for planning, developing and implementing a new or amended program. (Appendix B)

# Budget and Budget Cycle

The USHJA fiscal year is December 1 to November 30. Budget planning and development for the following year begins September 1 and is finalized with the approval of the budget at the November meeting of the USHJA Board. It is therefore essential that, in their 2-Year Planning Cycle, committees complete new program proposals and current program modifications, and receive all appropriate approvals prior to September 1.

# Process and Approval within the USHJA

The committee chairperson and members must understand when discussion topics need to be approved and how they are approved through the USHJA governance structure. The committee must work with the liaison to ensure all deadlines are acknowledged by the committee and necessary committee work is completed before established meeting deadlines. An approval chart has been developed to aid the USHJA staff, which clarifies the order in which items are originated, presented and previewed, and considered for final approval (Appendix E; USHJA Policy GA117).

# Rule Change Process

Committees often assume a significant role in the rule change process, which is multi-leveled and involves several steps at each level. Although formalized review and action on rule change proposals is not undertaken by committees until late fall of each year, the timeline for their creation and submission occurs much earlier in the year.

Any committee, or individual member, may draft and submit a proposal for a change, or clarification to a rule within the USEF Rule Book. Due to the multiple steps involved and the timeline necessary to facilitate the review process, an internal deadline of July 1 for all General Rule Change Proposals and September 15 for Working Groups and standing committees/task forces has been established for submission of all USHJA Standard Rule Change Proposals for all discipline rules. A brief description of the process is outlined below.

# Prior to USHJA Annual Meeting

- Leading up to the USHJA Annual Meeting internal rule change proposal submission
  deadline of July 1/September 15 (whichever is applicable for your Proposed Rule Change).
  USHJA liaisons will coordinate directly with task force, Zone committee, standing
  committee and/or Working Group leadership to facilitate the process of writing and
  submitting their draft rule change proposals. Volunteer leadership and USHJA staff may
  obtain assistance from relevant USEF staff as needed.
- Please note that each Proposed Rule Change must have been considered by the originating committee/task force with a documented motion, second, and approval by majority vote recorded in meeting minutes before it can be sent forward to the next step in the process.
- Approximately mid-October, these RCPs will be sent to the USHJA Rules Committee for the purpose of determining to which USHJA committees and task forces the RCPs will be referred for comment and committee action, as well as providing comment and feedback to the respective official proponent (i.e., Hunter Working Group, Jumper Working Group or standing committee) requesting revision or rework, if necessary. In addition to the RCPs originating from USHJA, these referred rule change proposals might also include additional RCPs originating from USEF Committees not previously seen or considered by USHJA.

- Throughout the month of October and early November, USHJA committees/task forces meet to consider proposals referred to them and provide official committee actions. At this time, all active Rule Change Proposals will be posted on the USHJA website
- Approximately late November/early December, USHJA will post on the USHJA website
  the "yellow book" of currently active rule change proposals to be considered at USHJA's
  Annual Meeting.
- At the USHJA Annual Meeting, any final revisions and review by Working Groups and standing committees are made, and the USHJA Board of Directors votes on all Rule Change Proposals.
- Occasionally, the Board may choose to refer a proposal rather than take action on it during Annual Meeting. All referred proposals are reconsidered at a meeting held after USHJA's Annual Meeting but prior to March 1.
- All approved Rule Change Proposals are entered into the USEF PRC System by March 1.

# During the USHJA Annual Meeting in December

- Following the rule change presentations at the Annual Meeting, standing committees and
  Working Groups will meet and revisit any proposals they feel need further attention.
  Working Group task forces and subcommittees may provide suggestions and input during
  Annual Meeting, but final determination with respect to making amendments to any
  USHJA rule change proposals rests with the Working Groups or proponent standing
  committees.
- Approved, disapproved and voting calendars will be created from the standing committee and Working Group actions.
- The USHJA Board of Directors will vote on approved, disapproved and voting calendars during the final meeting of the Board at the Annual Meeting.

# During the Final Meeting of the USHJA Board of Directors at the Annual Meeting

- Board of Directors will vote to forward the approved and disapproved consent calendars to the USEF recommending their approval or disapproval accordingly.
- Board of Directors will discuss and take action on the voting calendar proposals and approve their addition to the appropriate consent calendars following actions.
- USHJA actions are reported to the USEF National Hunter Committee (NHC) and the National Jumper Committee (NJC) through submission of the consent calendars.

Following the USHJA Annual Meeting, the RCPs are considered by various USEF committees and councils who provide comment and take committee action before all RCPs are eventually forwarded to the USEF in similar format – approved, disapproved, and voting calendars – for final vote by the Federation Board of Directors.

# **USHJA Program Specification Regulation**

In October of 2018, USHJA entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) regarding point calculation and Federation regulation of USHJA program specifications. This document ensures Federation regulation of the specifications thereby making language specific to USHJA programs within the USEF Rulebook unnecessary. The MOU also guarantees that USEF will calculate points specific to USHJA programs on behalf of USHJA.

# **Summary of MOU Components**

- 1. USHJA creates and publishes specifications for programs under its governance. USHJA is solely responsible for the content of the specifications, specifically the qualifying criteria for the program and the manner in which classes are to be conducted.
- 2. Specifications will be locked and must be provided to USHJA members and the Federation a minimum of 60 days prior to the beginning of the competition period.
- 3. Changes to specification point values must be provided to the Federation a minimum of 60 days prior to the beginning of the competition period.
- 4. Changes to specifications other than point values (formulas, calculations, etc.) must be provided to the Federation a minimum of 120 days prior to the beginning of the competition period. Within 30 days of receipt of these requests, the Federation will inform USHJA if the requested changes cannot be accomplished within the 120 days.
- 5. Specifications cannot be altered during the applicable qualifying period, except for instances of safety or welfare. However, amendments to specifications which do not alter selection, qualification or eligibility in a manner that may negatively affect participants may be made during the first year of a new program upon approval of the USHJA Board of Directors and the Federation CEO or his designee. Grammar, spelling and typos in specifications may be corrected providing they do not alter selection, qualification or eligibility. Any such corrections will be provided to the Federation immediately upon correction.
- 6. In the event specifications are altered, communication to all potential participants shall be the sole responsibility of USHJA.
- 7. Upon request by USHJA, USEF may tabulate points and maintain point records for classes held under the specifications. USEF may, in its sole discretion, deny USHJA's request to tabulate points should it be deemed infeasible as a result of limited staff availability, increased cost to the Federation, or any other reasonable deterrent. Upon acceptance of USHJA's request, USEF will tabulate and maintain such point records for the duration of the applicable competition year. USEF shall not unreasonably withhold its I.T. services from USHJA for purposes of maintaining points earned from classes held under the Specs. USEF will manage all point disputes in accordance with USEF rules.

- 8. I.T. services that are required to perform services under this MOU will be invoiced pursuant to the separate agreement between the Parties concerning such services.
- 9. USEF shall enforce the specifications through its Hearing Committee and provide individuals a forum to present arguments regarding the Specs, application of the specifications, and other grievances related to the specifications. USEF reserves the rights to intervene in the interpretation of the specifications, in its sole discretion.
- 10. The term of this MOU shall begin upon the full execution of the MOU and shall run perpetually. Either Party can terminate this MOU upon 180 days written notice.

# **USHJA Staff Organizational Chart**

In order to understand USHJA services and the respective staff members associated with them, please refer to the USHJA Organizational Chart (Appendix D). Your first point of reference, however, should always be your committee liaison.

# USHJA Logo, Brand Name and Fundraising

- In order to use the USHJA name, logo or brand in order to promote or support an event, program, activity or idea, you must obtain written permission from the USHJA and use a USHJA approved vendor if applicable.
- The process for obtaining this permission is very simple, easily accomplished and the USHJA staff will assist you with all your needs. If you should have any questions regarding the use of the logo or to obtain permission for use of the logo, please contact your liaison who will coordinate the request with the USHJA Marketing and Communications Department.
- Providing the USHJA logo to printers and embroiderers or using the USHJA brand name without USHJA's knowledge and permission, exposes the organization to an array of problems, challenges and potential legalities and is not permitted.
- Improper use of the USHJA logo or brand name may jeopardize the USHJA's nonprofit status and trademark.

# **Public Relations**

- You are an ambassador for the USHJA, and we encourage you to promote the work of the USHJA, while remembering that your actions and words impact the organization whether intentional or not.
- USHJA is here to help facilitate media opportunities, and if you are approached by a member of the media about a USHJA-related topic, we recommend the following steps:
  - O Ask the reporter about the topic they want to discuss.
  - o Ask for their deadline and when they expect the story to run.
  - o Ask if there is anyone else with whom they are speaking for the story.
  - Let the reporter know that either you or someone else will call them back as soon as possible.
  - o Note the answers to these questions and contact your USHJA liaison who will

coordinate with the USHJA Marketing and Communications Department. USHJA can help provide guidance on the best way to address the topic and even provide recommendations on possible other interviewees that may be helpful.

- If you are contacted by a media outlet to provide content, such as an article, for the outlet on a topic related to the work of the USHJA, we ask that you notify your liaison who will communicate the request to the USHJA Marketing and Communications Department. We request the opportunity to review any editorial materials developed by volunteers about the Association.
- If you have any questions concerning information released to a media source, please contact the USHJA for immediate clarification.
- All promotional materials for committee programs, such as banners, signs, etc., must be created through USHJA. This ensures the quality and consistency of the materials being distributed. Please work with your USHJA liaison to fulfill these needs.

# Sponsorship and Fundraising Activities

- All sponsorship and fundraising efforts must be conducted in accordance with Board of Directors approved policies and following the lead of the applicable USHJA Sponsorship and/or Development Department staff.
- Committees are prohibited from maintaining or operating bank accounts.

# **USHJA** Trademarks

You should be aware that the USHJA logo (flying horse) , the acronym "USHJA", the name "United States Hunter Jumper Association," and the "United States Hunter Jumper Association Foundation" and other properties of USHJA are all trademarks of the USHJA. As a committee member you have a duty to protect these marks. Use and reproduction of these marks for any purposes must first approved by the USHJA. Further, any production of materials, such as banners, signs, etc., must be created through the USHJA. This ensures the quality and consistency of the materials being distributed. Please work with your liaison for assistance.

# Additional USHJA Policies and Procedures Specific to Zone Committees

# Website

The USHJA provides a place for each Zone to publish any information the zone committee wishes to make available to the membership on our website at <a href="www.ushja.org">www.ushja.org</a>. USHJA Zones are not permitted to create or maintain their own websites. If you have any questions, please contact the Marketing and Communications Department at zonenews@ushja.org.

# Social Media Guidelines for Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc.

Zones are not permitted to create independent social media accounts. USHJA has created individual Zone Facebook pages to promote local, relevant information. USHJA staff will manage these accounts and administrative rights may be granted to individuals as deemed appropriate by both USHJA staff and Zone Committees. Zones may request additional social media channels, but USHJA will manage and create all accounts tied to the Association. Please see the USHJA Social Media Policy for more information.

# Zone Treasurer Responsibilities

- Manage the finances of the Zone Committee in coordination with the USHJA staff liaison and Finance Department and advise the committee regarding any fiscal matters related to the budget.
- Sign and submit the committee approved Funding Requests.
- Give Treasurer's report at committee meetings.
- Provide input and approval on all expense requests that are not included in the original budget.
- Provide directives to committee members and vendors to have all invoices, checks, et cetera... submitted to USHJA in a timely manner for payment.
- Provide directives to members to submit all Donation Forms for Cash, In Kind or Silent Auction Donations and Bid Sheets to USHJA in a timely manner.
- All invoices from vendors must list USHJA on the invoice for reimbursement.
- Provide directives to committee members when obtaining quotes for merchandise, awards, et cetera.
- Review all bids received and recommend to USHJA staff liaison which vendor fits the needs of the function in a cost-effective manner. If a bid is granted to a vendor that exceeds the USHJA supplier bid it must be approved, in writing, by the Executive Director before any orders can be placed.
- Coordinate with USHJA staff liaison to have all expenses that exceed \$1,000 approved, in writing, by the Executive Director.

# Zone Funding and Payment of Invoices

Each Zone must develop and receive approval for all Zone Funding Requests. The staff liaison and Accounting Department shall assist the Zone Chair and Treasurer with this process. Zone Funding Requests must provide the detail necessary for the Accounting Department to process and pay invoices. Example: A line item for Zone Finals must include the specific categories which have been approved for payment such as ribbons, awards, catering fees, etc.

- USHJA shall only approve payment of the approved expenses detailed in a Zone Funding Request.
- All invoices must include the name and contact information of vendor/service provider, the USHJA name on the invoice, a description of the goods and/or services and the amount of the expense. All budget expenditures must have appropriate receipts attached to check requests.
- All invoices must be received by the USHJA office no later than December 15 of the

# year in which the expense was incurred in order to be approved for payment. Invoices received after this date will not be paid.

• It is the responsibility of a host of any Zone event to contact the Zone Chair and staff liaison to determine whether there is an allocation for the payment of any expenses associated with the Zone event. It is the responsibility of the host to notify any potential vendor/service provider of the above requirements regarding invoices.

# Zone Chef d'Equipe and Coordinator

A Coordinator will be appointed by the Zone Committee and does not have to be a committee member. Listed below are some of the duties of the Chef d'Equipe and Coordinator for the North American Youth Championships, USEF National Junior Jumper Championships, USEF Pony Jumper Championships, USHJA Zone Team Jumper Championships and the USHJA Children's/Adult Amateur Hunter Championships. Equally important to these duties is the ability of the Chef d'Equipe and the Coordinator to work as a team. In addition, if a Zone decides to name one person to fill both positions, we recommend that help is provided in the form of an assistant.

# • Chef d'Equipe Responsibilities

- Attend technical and/or rider meetings for the competition.
- General management and fitness of horses entered in the competition including observance of drug rules for competition.
- General management, fitness and behavior of riders entered in the competition.
   Declaration and scratches of competitors and horses entered at the competition.
- Notifying organizer of order of go in which the team of horse and rider combinations have been selected to compete in the team competition.
- As needed, provide coaching assistance, e.g. with warm-up, walking courses, etc. A Chef d'Equipe may not perform any other official duties at the competition.

# • <u>Coordinator Responsibilities</u>

- Communicate Championship rules and Selection Procedures to interested individuals.
- Once standings are complete, coordinate with riders in order of their placement on the standings until a full team has been established.
- Conduct a meeting of the team members and their trainers for their recommendation of a Chef d'Equipe for the Championship to recommend to the Zone Committee for approval.
- Assist riders with required documents for entry into Championship (for example: passports, health certificates, entry blanks, accreditation requests, etc.).
- Send entries for riders to USHJA by date specified from USHJA and coordinate with Zone for any financial reimbursement.
- As needed, assist and/or coordinate transportation and housing.

# Award Requests for Zone Championships, Banquets and Other Events

Award requests for Zone Championships, Banquets or other events must be sent in writing to USHJA and the expenditure must be included in the current Zone budget.

- A host is not required to order the ribbons and awards through USHJA. If you purchase your own ribbons and awards, you must notify the USHJA in advance and the USHJA will provide your chosen vendor with the required language and logos for use on the ribbons and awards. Any reimbursement for ribbons and awards must be approved by USHJA prior to the host placing an order.
- A host may order the ribbons and awards through USHJA. The cost of the ribbons and awards will be paid for by the applicable Zone Committee within the budgeted allocation. If the total cost of the ribbons and awards exceeds the budgeted amount, the host competition is responsible for paying the balance due to USHJA within 30 days of the date the order is placed. If a host is interested in ordering the ribbons and awards through USHJA, the order must be completed on the Zone Championship Ribbon and Award Form and returned by the deadline. If the host does not return the completed form by the posted deadline, USHJA is not responsible for placing a rush order or for the cost of the ribbons and awards.
- There is a due date for award and ribbon requests. Requests are not submitted by this deadline cannot be guaranteed for delivery. Ribbons are non-refundable and cannot be returned for credit. In the event a competition has unused ribbons at the completion of the show, USHJA recommends donating the ribbons to an equine charity.
- For USHJA year-end Zone and Stirrup Cup Awards, USHJA will select coordinated awards for all Zones. Individual Zones will not have the option to select these awards. This does not preclude you from acquiring donations of additional awards for your events.
- If awards/items are not purchased through USHJA, without prior approval, USHJA may refuse payment.

# Zone HOTY Championship Event Stirrup Cup Championship Event and Special Equitation Classes

- USHJA Zone HOTY Championships, Stirrup Cup Championships or Special Equitation Class host competitions are determined on an annual basis by evaluating applications, geographical balance, variance of dates and host history. All applications are reviewed by the applicable Zone Committee and Working Group, with the USHJA Executive Committee making the final determination of host competitions. The purpose of conducting a bid process for host site selection is to provide the USHJA Zone Committee with potential venues from which to choose a site that offers facilities and amenities worthy of hosting a USHJA Championship competition. All applications must be presented and voted upon, by the Zone Committee before any action may be taken to plan the event.
- USHJA shall only approve payment of the approved expenses detailed in a Zone budget.
- It is the responsibility of a host of any Zone event to contact the Zone Chair and Staff

Liaison to determine whether there is an allocation for the payment of any expenses associated with the Zone event and the requirements for payment of invoices.

• It is the responsibility of the host to notify any potential vendor/service provider of the requirements regarding invoices.

In considering applications, the Zone Committee must be very aware of any perception of conflict of interest and remember that these properties are not intended to promote or assist a competition that is struggling or to reward a particular organizer, sponsor or member of the Zone Committee for service to the Zone.

Criteria to be considered in selecting a site shall include, but is not limited to, the following:

- Any bid that is not complete will not be considered. Application information must be addressed in detail.
- Each site will be considered on its own merits.
- All infrastructure required to host this event must be in existence at the facility at the time the bid is submitted. If the facility does not meet all the criteria set forth in this packet, the facility will not be considered to host this event.
- Consideration will be given to accessibility and affordability for potential participants.
- Consideration will be given to the knowledge and experience of potential host site organizers and management.
- Completed bids and any supporting materials must be received by USHJA by the posted deadlines.

The USHJA Zone Committee may request the committee liaison to obtain additional information from other parties regarding applications. All applications shall be reviewed by the applicable Zone Committee(s) and Zone Council, with the USHJA Executive Committee making the final determination of host competitions.

If USHJA, in its sole discretion, determines that no bids have been submitted that meet the criteria for selection, the USHJA may select and approve a facility that has not met the criteria or has not submitted a bid for consideration.

# Zone Banquets

Each Zone may host a Zone Banquet to recognize the award winners of the Zone Horse of the Year Awards Program. Each Zone must complete the USHJA Zone Banquet Form and return it to USHJA by the posted deadlines.

# List of Program, Scholarships, Fundraisers and Forums

- Zones must provide the USHJA office a complete list of Zone programs, scholarships, fundraisers and forums they plan to offer. The USHJA shall promote your Zone events through the USHJA website, USHJA eNews, USHJA In Stride and other media outlets as appropriate.
- Zones must provide the staff the necessary information they need to respond to member

inquiries within the established deadlines.

# General Guidelines and Criteria for Zone Scholarship and Grant Programs

USHJA Zone Committees may raise funds for and establish a scholarship program to benefit deserving Zone members.

- Only education grants and scholarships, used for college, university or other continuing education/advanced training may be awarded.
- Scholarship funds will be maintained through the USHJA Foundation

As a 501 (c) 3 organization, the USHJA is required to maintain and file criteria and documentation with the IRS regarding all scholarship programs. In order to protect our tax-exempt status, we have created the following general guidelines and criteria for our Zone Committees to use when developing their programs.

- All Zone Grant or Scholarship programs must receive written approval by the Executive Director and/or Executive Committee prior to implementation.
- To request approval, all documentation including criteria, selection process, scholarship amount, methods for solicitation, and the like must accompany the written request.
- Additional information may be requested by the Executive Director and/or Executive Committee before granting approval of the program.

# Criteria for Scholarship and Grant Programs

- Each Zone may award one or more scholarships.
- The total amount of funds distributed by each Zone may not exceed \$50,000.00 in any one USHJA fiscal year.
- Each Zone Committee may create their own criteria to determine those individuals who will be recommended as scholarship recipient(s) which shall be approved by the Executive Director. However, recipient(s) cannot be relatives of Zone committee members, USHJA Executive Committee members, Directors, or substantial contributors.
- Each Zone Grant Program, including selection criteria, will be publicized on the USHJA website. All Zones must use the standard application forms provided by USHJA.
- Full biographical, financial and academic information for each applicant must accompany their application and copies of same must be submitted to the USHJA.
- Applicants must be United States citizens/legal residents, USHJA members, residents of the awarding Zone and must meet the academic, leadership/work/community service, financial need and/or other requirements of their Zone Grant Program to be eligible for a scholarship award.
- Funds awarded to recipients will be paid by USHJA directly to the educational institution or service provider.
- If funds are paid to the educational institution per semester, recipient(s) must supply proof of continued enrollment.
- All funds raised must be accounted for and held in accordance with USHJA/Zone accounting and banking procedures.

# Funding Approval Process for Grants and Scholarships

- Each Zone shall recommend to the USHJA Executive Director and/or Executive Committee those individuals who they have deemed eligible for a scholarship and the amount requested.
- All materials and application shall be sent to the USHJA staff liaison.
- The Executive Director and/or Executive Committee shall review grant disbursement requests on a monthly basis.

# BYLAWS UNITED STATES HUNTER JUMPER ASSOCIATION, INC. (USHJA)

(The following language is taken from the USHJA Bylaws and Policy Manual)

# **Zone Structure**

Section 1. <u>General</u>. The Zone Committees are education based geographic committees which facilitate communication between members and leadership through the Working Groups, create Zone programs and educational opportunities for the benefit of their constituents. The Zone Committees shall make suggestions and provide member feedback to the applicable Working Groups regarding rules, conduct and programs within the disciplines.

a. Definition of Zones. The United States shall be divided into twelve (12) combined Hunter and Jumper Zones composed of the fifty (50) States and the District of Columbia as follows:

Zone 1 New England: Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island.

Zone 2 Northeast: New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Zone 3 Mid-Atlantic: Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, District of Columbia and North Carolina.

Zone 5 Southeast: Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Florida, South Carolina and Tennessee.

Zone 5 North Central: Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Michigan.

Zone 6 Midwest: Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota and Nebraska.

Zone 7 South Central: Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Zone 8 Mountain: Utah, Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona.

Zone 9 Northwest: Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

Zone 10 Southwest: California and Nevada.

Zone 11 Hawaii.

Zone 12 Alaska.

Section 2. <u>General</u>. The Zone Council. The Zone Council is composed of Zone Chairs and Vice Chairs. Its function is to share information regarding sport and education between the twelve USHJA Zone Committees.

# **Composition and Term Limits for Zone Committees**

Section 1. <u>Composition of Zone Committees</u>. Each Zone Committee shall be composed of fifteen (15) members of which 40% must be designated hunter and 40% must be designated jumper. Six (6) members (3 Hunter and 3 Jumper) will be elected by the members of each Zone. As pursuant to the Policy Manual, four (4) members will be appointed by the four (4) largest Affiliate Member Organizations. Five (5) members will be appointed by the President with Executive Committee approval.

Section 2. <u>Composition of the Zone Council</u>. The Zone Council shall be composed of the Chairs and Vice Chairs of each Zone. One must be hunter designated and the other jumper designated.

Section 3. <u>Term Limits</u>. The maximum service as an officer of the Zone Committees in any capacity, or any combination of capacities, for an individual shall be limited to two (2) Terms.

Section 4. Zone Committee officers not serving as an officer on the Zone Committee for a period of three hundred thirty (330) consecutive days or for the period of time between Annual Meetings of the Board of Directors, whichever is less, shall be eligible to again serve as a Zone Committee officer without consideration of prior service in determining Term limits.

## **USHJA Zone Election Timeline & Procedures**

# December

Each hunter and jumper zone shall appoint a Zone Nominating Committee (ZNC).

- Each of the Zone Committees shall hold a meeting to recommend three individuals for appointment to the ZNC and the USHJA President shall appoint a minimum of three additional members to the ZNC.
  - These appointments must be Senior Active or Associate members in good standing of the USHJA, reside within the zone per USHJA Bylaws and may or may not be members of the Zone Committee.
- The President shall appoint the Chairman of the ZNC.
- The ZNC will be responsible for insuring a minimum of three (3) and a maximum of six (6) hunter designated nominees and a minimum of three (3) and a maximum of six (6) jumper designated nominees has been met and that the nominees have met all requirements.

# January

- Nominations for Zone Committee members will open January 1.
- Nomination forms will be available on the USHJA website home page and also on each individual Zone's page.
- Recommendations for nominations may be submitted to the USHJA office by Senior Active or Senior Associate Members in good standing of the USHJA. Recommendations must be accompanied by the name and USHJA membership number of the individual

- making the recommendation, a short biography of the individual being recommended including their equestrian participation and governance experience.
- As nominations are received, each Nominee will be sent Nominee Packet which will
  include the USHJA Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest Policy, Zone Committee
  member job description, and a Nominee Response Form to be returned indicating the
  Nominee's understanding and acceptance of the conditions of service and indicating their
  willingness to serve if elected.

# March

- Nominations Close on March 1. Incomplete recommendations or late nominations will not be eligible for inclusion on the ballot.
- On or before March 1. Affiliates must have provided association membership data (senior active members or the AMO's highest equivalent member category) based on November 30 information to substantiate eligibility to serve as one of the four largest AMOs.
- The names of all nominees meeting eligibility requirements will be forwarded to the Zone Nominating Committee for their consideration.
- Zone Nominating Committees may add nominees to the ballot should the minimum required number of nominees not be met.
  - If additional nominees must be added, the Zone Nominating Committee must analyze the nominees with regard to: Zone level experience, geographic balance, technical expertise, governance expertise, constituency representation.
  - All additional nominees put forward for the ballot by a Zone Nominating Committee must meet the eligibility requirements and will be sent the Nominee packet and only those who return the completed Nominee Response Form by April 30, 2020 will be added to the Zone Ballot.
- If the number of nominees exceeds the maximum allowed, the Zone Nominating Committee shall analyze the nominees with regard to: Zone level experience, geographic balance, technical expertise, governance expertise, constituency representation and shall select the candidates who are best qualified to represent these interests and the interests of the zone members.

## May

- On May 15, the ballots and biographies will be posted on each USHJA Zone webpage.
- Members will be required to log in on a secure site and through log-in their eligibility to vote will be verified. The election materials will consist of the following:
- A ballot containing the names of candidates determined by the Zone Nominating Committee.
- A biographical statement provided by each candidate.
- The attendance record for Zone Committee meetings of each incumbent.

# $\underline{July-September}$

- On July 1, Zone Elections close and sign-in on the secure voting site will no longer be possible.
- On or about July 15, the USHJA office will notify each newly elected Zone Committee member of his or her election by email following the finalization of the election results.
- On or before July 31 the four (4) largest USHJA Affiliate Member Organizations in each zone, as determined by their number of members, will be contacted by the ED to recommend a candidate for appointment by the President to the Zone Committee. Notification shall include the names of the elected individuals.
- The Executive Committee shall meet and perform its duties with regards to the appointment of additional members to the Zone Committees.
- Once the seating of each Zone Committee is completed, the ED will conduct a call with each Zone Committee to receive their recommendations on Chair and Vice-Chair.
  - The Executive Committee shall meet and perform their duties with regards to the appointment of the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Zone Committees. In the event that the EC chooses to recommend to the Board individuals other than those recommended by the Zone Committees, the ED shall communicate their decision to the Zone Committee members by conference call.
- EC recommendations will go forward to the Board for their review.
  - Zone Chairs and Vice-Chairs will be seated following BOD approval.

# October

- Newly created Zone Committees will attend the October Zone Committee teleconference meeting.
- These meetings will serve to inform and educate the newly formed committees as to the progress of the Zone's work.

# **November**

- Newly created Zone Committees shall be seated.
- Following seating the Zone Committees shall elect a treasurer.

# **Zone Committee Responsibilities**

Section 1. <u>USHJA Zone Committee Duties</u>. The duties of Zone representatives shall include the following:

- a. Providing a forum to discuss and create nationwide Hunter and Jumper programs that tie the individual Zone programs together.
- b. Exchanging ideas across Zones, communicating with other Zones, and interfacing on a national level with other Hunter/Jumper constituents.
  - c. Communicating with the Zone's Hunter and Jumper constituency.
  - d. Providing Zone input for the Zone Championships and Finals.
- e. Recommending, creating, and coordinating education opportunities and programs taking place in each Zone.
  - f. Raising funds for Hunter and Jumper Programs.

- g. Providing input and feedback regarding the various USHJA Hunter and Jumper awards programs.
- Section 2. <u>USHJA Zone Committee Duties for Jumper Representatives</u>. The duties of Jumper Zone representatives shall include the following:
- a. Recommending two (2) individuals who have designated Jumper as his/her primary discipline for appointment to the Jumper Working Group.
- b. Participating in the USHJA Annual Convention on behalf of the Zone and its Jumper constituents, providing input and feedback on Jumper issues and Rule Change Proposals to the Jumper Working Group.
  - c. Recommending any Jumper education programs to the Jumper Working Group.
- d. Working with the USHJA staff and the USEF Jumper Liaison to develop Zone selection criteria for the FEI Junior Championship, FEI Young Rider Championship, National Junior Jumper Championship, and National Pony Jumper Championship in accordance with USHJA procedures.
- e. Coordinating and monitoring selection events leading to the team selection for the above championships.
- f. Working with the USHJA staff and the USEF Jumper Liaison to develop Zone Specifications for Children's and Adult Amateur Jumpers in accordance with USHJA procedures.
- Section 3. <u>USHJA Zone Committee Duties for Hunter Representatives</u>. The duties of the Hunter Zone Committees shall include the following:
- a. Recommending two (2) individuals who have designated Hunter as their primary discipline for appointment to the Hunter Working Group.
- b. Participation in the USHJA Annual Convention on behalf of the Zone and its Hunter constituents, providing input and feedback on Hunter issues and Rule Change Proposals to the Hunter Working Group.
- c. Working with the USHJA staff and the USEF Hunter Liaison to develop Zone Specifications for the, Children's and Adult Amateur Hunters in accordance with USHJA procedures.
- d. Submitting written proposals for administrative and program expenses to be reviewed by the Hunter Working Group.

## Alaska and Hawaii.

Section 1. Zone 12 Alaska and Zone 11 Hawaii.

These Zones will follow the provisions set forth in Article 1100 with the following exceptions:

- a. The initial elected size of a Combined Hunter/Jumper Zone shall be three (3) members, one (1) of whom must have designated Jumper as their primary affiliation.
- b. The Zone Committee will act as both the Hunter Zone Committee and the Jumper Zone Committee with regard to the provisions of Article 1100 wherever applicable.

## **AFFILIATE ORGANIZATIONS**

# **Affiliate Organization**

# Section 1. Definition of Affiliate Organizations.

Affiliate Organizations. Affiliate Organizations shall consist of any local, state, regional and/or national organization, club, association, including educational institutions which offer equine competitions and/or equine related programs, and corporations or other entities approved for membership by the Board of Directors. Affiliate Organizations are not eligible to serve as Affiliate Member Organizations on the Zone Committee or Affiliate Council.

# Section 2. <u>Affiliate Member Organizations: Definition and Eligibility to serve on Zone</u> Committees.

These organizations must be:

- Members in good standing with USHJA as per the requirements listed in the Policy Manual
- Have bylaws
- Be governed by a volunteer board of directors with a minimum of five (5) members
- Be either a non-profit or mutual-benefit organization recognized as such by both its home state and the IRS
- Hold a minimum of fifteen (15) sanctioned shows in at least three (3) different venues
- Hold at least one annual educational activity.

Geography. Affiliate Member Organizations will be counted for representational purposes by the Zone in which their principal place of business is located.

# **Affiliate Council**

# Section 1. Composition.

The Affiliate Council shall be composed of one elected Affiliate Organization member from each Zone plus a representative from the four (4) scholastic formats which include IHSA, NCEA, ANRC and IEA.

### Appendix A.1

### CONFLICT OF INTEREST STATEMENT AND ETHICS POLICY

As the Federation Recognized Affiliate representing and governing the hunter and jumper disciplines, the United States Hunter Jumper Association, Inc. (USHJA) must conduct all its activities and business in accordance with the highest level of responsibility and trust owed to its members and the sport. USHJA expects and requires its volunteers and staff to conduct all Association business with integrity and to maintain a standard of ethical conduct consistent with the values, spirit, and ideals upon which the Association was founded.

### ETHICS POLICY

Accordingly, the Association requires its volunteers and staff to observe the following Ethics Policy:

- Conduct all dealings with honesty, openness and fairness.
- Respect the rights of all volunteers and staff to fair treatment and equal opportunity, free from discrimination or harassment of any type.
- Know, understand, and comply with the laws, regulations, and codes of conduct governing the business and activities of the USHJA.
- Ensure that all transactions are handled honestly and recorded accurately.
- Protect information that belongs to USHJA, our donors, sponsors, suppliers, volunteers and staff.
- Avoid conflicts of interest, both real and perceived.
- Use USHJA assets and information only for the betterment of the organization and its members.
- Recognize that the appearance of misconduct or impropriety can damage the reputation of the USHJA and act accordingly.
- Maintain the confidentiality of committee business as instructed by the Committee Liaison or Chairman.

### **CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY**

The USHJA Ethics Policy provides a framework of integrity for interactions with or on behalf of USHJA. All Officers, Directors, Staff and volunteers of USHJA are expected to be familiar with and govern their conduct in accordance with USHJA By-Laws, policies and procedures.

Our Conflict of Interest Policy provides for the following:

(1) Circumstances. A conflict of interest is any personal, family, business or financial

relationship, whether direct or indirect, which could influence or be perceived to influence objectivity when representing or conducting business for or on behalf of USHJA. For the purposes of this policy, a family member is defined as an individual's spouse, domestic partner, parent, child, grandchild, great-grandchild, sibling, half-sibling or spouse of sibling or half-sibling, ancestor or the spouse of the individual's child, grandchild, great-grandchild or sibling or any other individuals with a significant familial or familial-like relationship including in-laws.

- (2) <u>Disclosure</u>. Conflicts or potential conflicts must be disclosed in accordance with the following procedures: Directors, Officers, Working Group members and Key Employees must complete, sign and submit annual conflict of interest disclosure statements to USHJA and, in the case of new Directors/Officers, prior to commencing term of office. Other Staff and volunteers shall acknowledge and disclose in their formal acceptances of either employment or committee seating. Conflicts and potential conflicts must also be disclosed accordingly as they arise.
- (3) <u>Participation</u>. Conflicted persons may not be present at or participate in Board of Directors or Committee deliberations, discussions or voting on any matters giving rise to the conflict and they are prohibited from attempting to influence such deliberations or vote.
- (4) <u>Documentation</u>. The existence and resolution of any conflicts must be documented in USHJA records, including the minutes of any meeting at which the conflict was discussed or voted upon.
- (5) <u>Related Party Transactions</u>. Related party transactions as defined in USHJA By-Law Article 1310 must be disclosed in writing to the Board of Directors upon occurrence. The Board of Directors must (a) consider alternative transactions to the extent available prior to entering into the transaction, (b) approve the transaction by not less than a majority vote of the directors present, excluding the related party, if applicable and (c) contemporaneously document in writing the basis for the Board approval, including its consideration of alternative transactions.

### **Appendix B.1**

### **USHJA COMMITTEE PROGRAM PLANNING**

This planning guide is a required tool for all USHJA committees to use as they consider the creation or modifications of programs. All new and modified programs if approved by the Board of Directors will be approved on a pilot basis of three (3) years, at which time the program will be evaluated for continuation, modification, or dissolution.

This planning guide is designed to assist the committee in determining if a program will help the organization fulfill its mission and serve its constituents, as well as the cost of both human and economic resources and the feasibility of implementation.

Program proposals submitted to the Board of Directors for consideration must address the following topics:

- 1. How would you describe your program? Provide your big picture vision and the purpose of your completed endeavor.
- 2. What are your Goals? (The What) What are your objectives? (The How)
- 3. A goal might be that visitors to the USHJA website will easily be able to find the information they are seeking.
- 4. Objectives to support this goal might include: all major programs will be immediately accessible from the home page, every program will have a colorful and informative brochure as a downloadable PDF on the program's front page and it will take no more than three clicks to find any piece of program information.
- 5. Who will benefit from your program? Define your target audience. Be sure to include all constituents who will be impacted and consider what percentage of our overall membership this program will benefit.
- 6. Will you be creating any products and/or will you be providing any services?
- 7. What is the program timeline for development and implementation?
- 8. Will you have an incremental implementation process or a pilot program?
- 9. Are there any critical milestones within your implementation phases?
- 10. Will you need specific information, advice, special systems, equipment or tools?
- 11. How will responsibilities be divided between volunteers and staff? It is extremely important that you consider what responsibilities will be handled by volunteers and those that will be passed on to staff.
- 12. What are the costs (capital, human, ongoing) for successful implementation and how will these be paid?
- 13. Will the program generate revenue and become budget neutral or show a profit?
- 14. Will the program require sponsors to be sustainable?
- 15. How will you evaluate success?
- 16. How might your program evolve over time?
- 17. What potential risks should you plan to manage?






**USEF Standard Rule Change Proposal Flow Chart**


# **Proposed USEF Rule Clarification Flow Chart**
